WORLD NEWS SEEN AT A GLANCE

Daily Events as Told by Cable Condensed For Easy Chronicle Readers

Thursday The Rev. Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick of New York, has declined an invitation to occupy the pulpit of the Union Chapel of Manchester, England, during the summer months, it was learned yesterday.

Justice Rowlatt, of the King's Bench Division of the High Court of Justice, in a decision given in London, Eng., yesterday, held that a man was not assessable for income tax on annual winnings derived from betting on horse races.

Dr. Walter Simons, former Foreign Minister, will be sworn in as acting president of Germany, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of President Ebert, today. The oath will be administered at noon by the Reichstag President, Paul Loebe.

Reports reaching official quarters in London yesterday indicated that the bombardment of the Wahabi tribesmen of Jeddah, the port of Mecca, had almost ceased. There were indications, it was added, that King Abd's troops, which are securely entrenched in the city, will be able to hold out several weeks without aid from the outside.

Captain Otto Sverdrup, Norwegian explorer, has consented to conduct the French Arctic expedition's ship to Franz Josef's Land. The expedition, under Lieut. Jules De Payer, will probably start this summer and will be gone a year. Airplanes will be used, and it is possible an attempt will be made to reach the Pole, but the main objects of the expedition are scientific.

A foreign loan of four or five billions of francs to enable the Treasury to pay its obligations promptly, is France's fundamental need in the present and approaching financial crisis, says Louis Loucheur in a long interview published by Paris Le Journal. The paper had appealed to him as an outstanding expert in finance, to suggest a way out for the country, facing the maturity of 23,000,000,000 franc's worth of securities this year.

Friday France's eight Cardinals and Archbishops have published a manifesto regarding "the so-called non-denominational laws and the measures to be taken to combat them." The document protests against the injustice of these laws, which it terms "an emanation of atheism."

The Rumanian Government is preparing a bill permitting the installation of wireless receiving sets in private residences. The bill will limit the issuance of licenses to Rumanian subjects only, and provide that the Government may seize all radio apparatus in case of mobilization.

Dr. Walter Simons took the oath yesterday as Acting-President of the German Republic, to succeed the late Friedrich Ebert. Like Herr Ebert, Dr. Simons did not add, "so help me, God," which is left optional in the oath as prescribed by the Constitution. The ceremony took place from the Reichstag.

Bulgaria has asked permission from the Allied Council of Ambassadors to mobilize 4,000 soldiers over and above the military establishment allowed in the peace treaty. The mobilization would be a temporary measure with the object of being prepared for a possible communist uprising. It is considered likely that the Ambassadors will grant the permission.

After three weeks of unsuccessful search, which took them across the Arctic Circle, the British light cruisers Harebell and Godetia returned to Aberdeen, Scotland yesterday, reporting that all hope must be definitely abandoned that the crews of the Hull travelers, Field Marshal Robertson and Scapa Flow, and the Icelandic steamer Leiferhepar, missing since late February, had escaped. The missing vessels were caught in a fierce gale which swept the Icelandic fishing grounds for four days. The Scapa Flow had fourteen men on board, the Field Marshal Robertson had 30 and the Leiferhepar, 40.

THINGS WORTH KNOWING

When making pie and any pie crust is left, do not throw away. Just sprinkle a little flour in the bottom of bowl. Pinch pie crust all together and put in bowl. Then sprinkle a little more flour over top of pie crust. Cover dish and put in ice box. This will keep about a week successfully.

Make Biscuits Early By adding a little more baking powder to biscuits, you can make them ahead of time. Then place on top of ice until ready to bake.

To Remove Fish Bone From Throat Cut lemon in two. Air-suck juice slowly. This should dissolve fish bone and give relief.

Sprinkling Clothes Hot water dampens clothes more easily than when sprinkled with cold water.
