

World News Seen At A Glance

Daily Events as Told by Cable Condensed for Busy Chronicle Readers.

Thursday

Five persons are known to have been killed and fifty others injured when the Bordeaux-Paris Express was wrecked near Paris early yesterday.

The London jury in the sensational Dennistoun case, which on Tuesday awarded £5,000 to Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun from her former husband, was discharged yesterday after Col. Dennistoun abandoned a counter claim regarding some furniture. Counsel then began legal arguments on claims for judgment.

Crowds yesterday morning in Tokio attacked the residences of certain peers who were prominent in opposition to the universal suffrage measure during Tuesday's session of the Japanese Upper House. Only slight damage was done, but the attacks have caused serious complications in the situation of the Upper House.

The Mohammedan and Christian Arabs in Jerusalem closed their shops yesterday and ceased work on the occasion of the arrival of the Earl of Balfour, as a protest against the famous declaration which he issued as Foreign Secretary committing Great Britain to the support of the establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine.

The speech made by Austen Chamberlain, the British Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in the House of Commons last evening, made a good impression in French official circles. The most reassuring feature of the British Minister's speech, it was commented, was the disclosure that the British Government realizes that it holds the key to the security problem.

Eight persons were killed and three others seriously injured when a heavy explosion occurred yesterday morning on the oil lighter Saturn in the harbor of Hamburg, Germany. The force of the explosion tore apart the lighter, a vessel 210 feet long, hurled her anchor weighing 400 pounds, over several nearby buildings.

The Government at Moscow has agreed to exchange the two former Polish officers, Baginski and Wieszkowicz, now held political prisoners here, for two Poles condemned to death by the Soviets. Baginski and Wieszkowicz were sentenced to death early last year on charges of belonging to Terrorist organizations and being concerned in the Warsaw citadel explosion of October, 1923, but President Wojciechowski commuted their sentences to life imprisonment.

Henry Tyrell Lane, formerly of Boston, lecturer and psychoanalyst, has been sentenced to one month's imprisonment and recommended for deportation by Magistrate Graham-Campbell of Bow Street, London, for contravention of the Aliens Act. Lane, who is 49 years of age, conducted at one time what he described as "a little commonwealth industrial school," and it was brought out in court that early in 1918, a young girl inmate had been mistreated, and that after an investigation, the school was closed. The Legislative Assembly in Sydney, Australia, yesterday passed the Marriages Amending bill, which was rejected by the Assembly last year. The bill provides that a fine not exceeding £100 or a year's imprisonment, or both, may be imposed "for alleging that persons lawfully married are not truly and sufficiently married."

Friday

The Japanese House of Peers yesterday passed the Manhood Suffrage bill. The measure, previously passed by the Lower House, fixes the voting age at 25 and abolishes Property qualifications.

The discovery that 20,000 Polish Catholic couples have obtained divorces by joining the Russian Orthodox Church is causing concern to the Polish Government. Measures are being considered to restrict the movement.

The London Morning Post reports that Prof. Richard Schorr, director of the Hamburg University Observatory at Bergedorf, on Monday discovered a comet of the eleventh magnitude in the neighborhood of the constellations Leo and Virgo.

The French birth rate continues to decline, according to the vital statistics for last year, just completed. The births numbered 752,101 and the deaths 679,885, the excess of births numbered 752,216, as compared with 95,000 for the preceding year.

Bachelors are being taught to cook at a school opened recently at Battersea, one of the London boroughs. The purpose of the authorities is to show unmarried men how to help themselves and be a bit more independent in the restaurants. The teacher is a woman.

The London Daily Mail says that David Kirkwood, Laborite member of Parliament, has received so many threatening letters in consequence of his attacks upon the Prince of Wales in the House of Commons and elsewhere that the Glasgow branch of the National Union of Railwaymen has taken up the matter with the Home Secretary.

The Italian foodstuffs commissioner, in agreement with manufacturers of flour products, announces a reduction in the best quality flour of from 242 to 230 lire, the new price, which is equivalent to about \$0.53 a hundred pounds, to become effective at once. Second quality flour has been reduced to 215 lire (almost \$0) per hundredweight. Several miners are believed to have been killed and many injured

when the cable of a lift bringing workers in the Merlebach mine, Metz, to the surface, broke yesterday afternoon, the lift falling 300 down the shaft. The day shift of 40 miners were on the lift at the time. Nine wounded brought out up to 5 o'clock reported there were many dead below.

The experts of Middlesex Hospital in London, the centre of British radium research, have announced an important discovery enabling the curative value of any given quantity of radium to be multiplied thousands of times. Briefly, the discovery consists in bottling radium gas, known as radon, in tiny glass tubes. Radium emits three kinds of rays, known as alpha, beta and gamma, but hitherto only the gamma rays have been harnessed. The present success concerns the beta rays which the experts now are capturing, purifying, condensing and confining in glass tubes a little thicker than a human hair, to which is given the name "seeds." These "seeds" they are prepared to distribute to other hospitals for curative purposes.

Saturday

July 26th has been fixed as the date of the elections for the constituent assembly in Chile.

By a vote of 208 against 143, the British House of Commons yesterday rejected a private member's bill which sought to fix a minimum wage for underground and surface workers in coal mines.

Advices received in Buenos Aires from Rosario, Argentina's second city, report a tornado swept over sections of the Province of Santa Fe on Thursday night, causing numerous fatalities and heavy property damage.

The Bank of Poland, which has been steadily buying gold in order to increase its reserve, has received its first shipment from the United States consigned there by a New York bank. The bars, worth \$1,100,000, were brought here from Rotterdam without guard in a sealed car, packed in barrels.

A suit for breach of promise and defamation of character against Lieutenant-Colonel Ian Dennistoun, defendant in the sensational London trial just ended, will be filed in London soon by an American woman who is now in the United States, it was announced yesterday in Paris by Dudley Field Malone, who will represent the plaintiff.

The nation-wide lockout in Sweden was called off yesterday, and the 130,000 workers involved will resume their employment. After an all-night session, the labor union delegates and the Government mediation committee reached a compromise, settling the entire labor conflict in the five important industries affected.

Two priests, Rev. Ferdinand Izard and Rev. Jules Puy, were fined 300 francs each and given suspended sentences on Thursday by the correctional court in France on charges of inciting resistance to execution of the law and using words likely to cause breach of the peace in speeches against the Government's religious policy, delivered at a Catholic Federation meeting recently. Gilbert Charles and Jaime de Zulueta Rena of Paris, France, who had quarrelled over a point of honor, fought their second duel in a week yesterday. They tried pistols last week, but their marksmanship was poor and nothing happened. They tried swords today, and during their sixth passage-at-arms, Charles put the point of his sword through his antagonist's forearm.

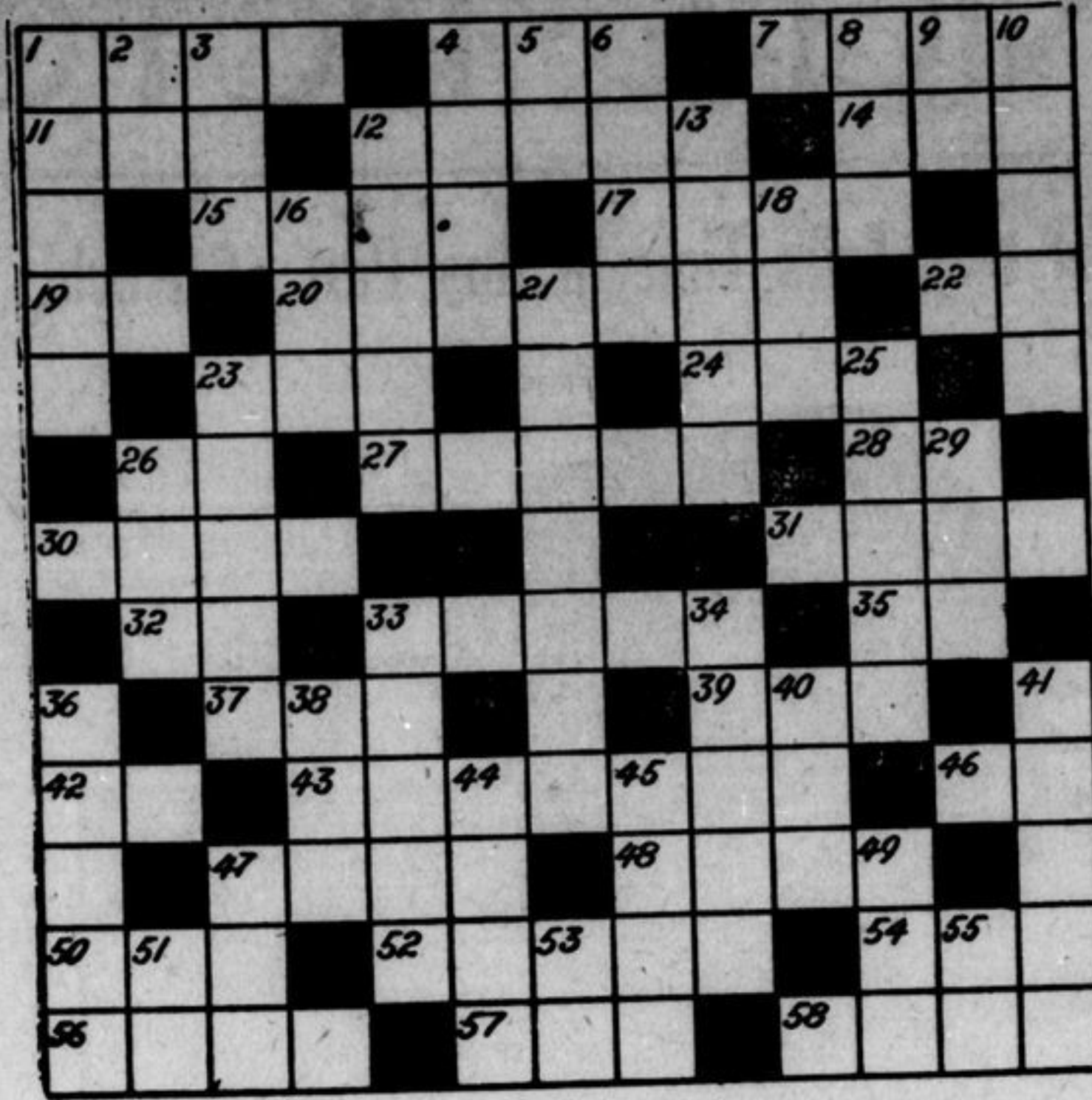
Officials of the radium institute in Manchester, England, expressed amazement upon learning of the announcement by experts attached to the Middlesex Hospital in London that they had succeeded in bottling radium gas. Sir William Milligan, secretary of the radium institute, says the gas was bottled there a decade ago and that the institute has been distributing radium "seeds" or tiny gas-filled tubes, to the Manchester Hospitals for the last six years.

It is understood in London, that the negotiations for the new emigration arrangements between the Imperial and Australian Governments will be satisfactory in all respects to the Australians. The outstanding new features are likely to be an increase in the amount allocated to emigrants to fifteen hundred sterling, per head, instead of one thousand, and an extension of the period during which the scheme will operate to ten years.

Girls Who Smoke Cigarettes

(Ottawa Journal) "I have just as much right to smoke as a man," is what the average girl maintains. And she has the same right. But her nervous system is more sensitive, more delicately adjusted. Therefore, it is influenced to a far greater extent by tobacco.

Smoking is habit-forming, which proves its harmful influence. You ultimately find yourself depending upon it. You especially need it after a meal. Your food digests better under its quieting influence, is the usual belief.

But smoking dulls those delicately adjusted instincts associated with the emotional nature. A girl who is wholesome and normal in every way has a natural longing for a sweetheart, a husband, home and children.

Cigarette smoking sometimes takes the place of home and children, though it takes the habit some time to affect materially the craving for a sweetheart.

Healthy, wholesome instincts of normal femininity will not long remain at their zenith under the influence of cigarette smoking. It quiets the nerves by numbing them. Your sensations, emotions, are not so keen. They are not so vibrantly alive after you have adhered to the cigarette smoking habit for a few years.

You will not make such an attractive sweetheart, and your chances for wifehood—and that divine associate, motherhood—are materially lessened.

No girl can remain clean and wholesome in a physical sense after a prolonged period of smoking. The natural fragrance of a wholesome healthy body is lost, and perfumes of various kinds are used to replace this exquisite aroma.

You may appear ever so devilish when you are smoking a cigarette. It may help to make you "companionable" in your "set," but you are slowly but surely destroying your finer sensibilities. The delicately constructed and minutely balanced

emotional nature will gradually be thrust into the background. And if you continue the habit long enough, you will ultimately be but little more than a dull clod of human flesh. No feelings, no emotions, the capacity to enjoy or even to suffer will be dead and beyond recall.

You will become but little more than a mere automatic human machine, with your soul lost in the hazy cloud of tobacco smoke.

towns of Boulanik and Melazerki. Workmen engaged in breaking up a scuttled German destroyer, beached in Mill Bay, have discovered under a mass of wood, which completely concealed them, the bodies of five German officers and sailors, who evidently were not warned at the time the fleet was sunk by the German crews.

The League of Nations has received a letter from Sir George E. Foster, president of the Canadian League of Nations Society, asking permission to file at Geneva an international peace petition signed by 80,000 children who are enrolled in the international good will society. The petition will be presented to the world court of justice on behalf of the parents' and teachers' federation of British Columbia.

The British Government has lodged a strong protest against a measure now before the Roumanian parliament for the control of emigration, declaring that if enacted into law, it will drive the British steamship companies out of Roumania. The bill gives a governmental department power to fix emigrant passenger rates and determine transit routes and prohibits the companies from carrying on propaganda among prospective emigrants.

For alleging that persons lawfully married are "not truly husband and wife" anyone may be fined in New South Wales, Australia, £100 or a year's imprisonment or both. The Government has accepted the Marriage Amending Act, which provides for this penalty, and which (Continued on Page 10)

The destruction to a road which can be done in one hour at this season of the year by an over-loaded truck or a high-powered passenger car travelling at excessive speed may take weeks of work to repair. Even hard roads suffer under heavy weights when water lurks in road foundations, as it does during wet spring months. Foundations become 'fractured' and road surfaces break. Wheels sink into gravel and macadam roads, which now are soft and porous. To prevent needless damage, The Highways Act provides that during March and April trucks (outside cities and towns) shall not be loaded in excess of one-half the carrying capacity of such vehicle as registered with the Department, without obtaining a permit as provided in Section 31. As the cost of repair of roads is falling more and more on the users, it follows that owners and drivers will consult their own interest by keeping their loads and speeds well within the legal limit at all times. They are here urged to do so. In view of this public notice of the provisions of The Highways Act, further notice is given that its penalties will be rigorously enforced against those who disobey.
