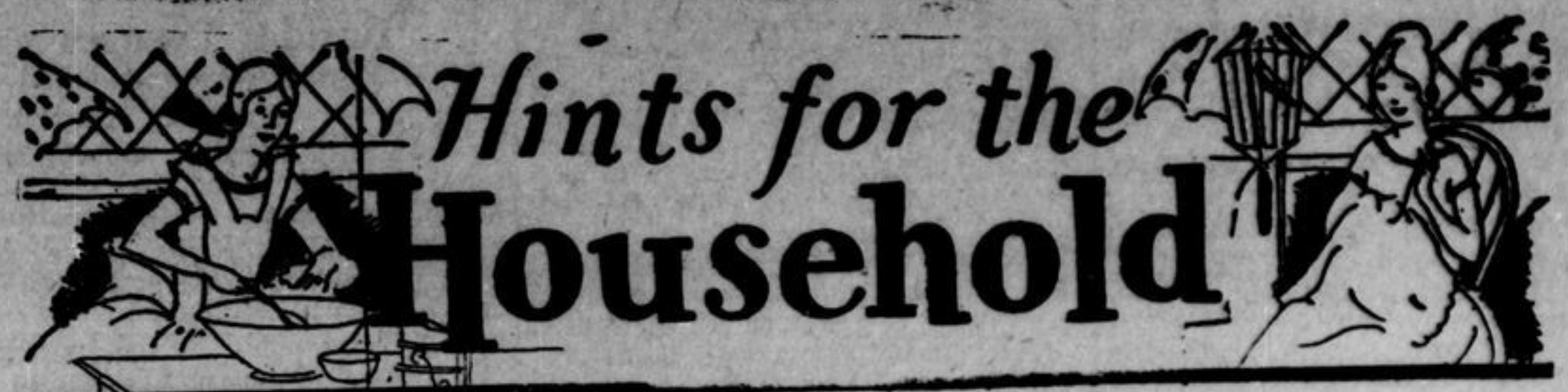

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Easter Party Suggestions

Easter Egg Hunt. These games are really for children but can be adapted to older people. Buy pretty candy eggs. Hide them anywhere in the house. Let the guests hunt for them. Have egg-shaped bags made of tulle to hold eggs. Give simple prize to one finding the most eggs.

Cob-Web Party.

Tie an egg-shaped card—which name of guest has been written—to end of string. Wind each string around banister. Then wind strings up and down stairs. At the hidden end of string have a gift wrapped in shape of egg.

Favors.

Favors can be given inside of eggs made of cotton. Wrap cotton around gift. Make it in shape of egg. Tie yellow or purple ribbon around each egg.

Chicken Hunt.

This is as good as the egg hunt for an Easter party. Buy little yellow chicks. Hide them. Playing loud and soft music to signify nearness to chicks makes this game a little different.

Egg Rolling.

If a party is given in the country or in a yard where there is an attractive hill, the egg rolling custom certainly makes a delightful amusement.

COOKING HINTS

Eggs For Easter Breakfast

I think that boiled eggs served in their shells in pretty egg cups are most appropriate for Easter morning breakfast. There are, of course, three kinds of these; namely—soft, medium and hard, but the most generally liked are the medium or

Four-minute Eggs. Method: Place eggs on stove in cold water. After water starts to boil, let eggs boil 4 minutes.

Poached eggs on toast make a tasty breakfast.

If the family is too large to bother with individual eggs for breakfast, scrambled eggs are always good and are easy to cook and serve. At all events, serve eggs for Easter morning breakfast.

Mushroom Soup

1/2 pound mushrooms. 1 quart veal or chicken broth. Little onion. 2 heaping tablespoons butter. 3 tablespoons flour. 1 cup of cream. Salt and pepper.

1/2 pound of mushrooms. 1 pint liquid mushrooms and onions cooked in.

1 pint milk. Little onion. 3 tablespoons of flour. 2 tablespoons of butter.

Method: Chop mushrooms. Cut up onion. Cook 20 minutes. Melt butter. Stir in flour. Add liquids slowly, stir until thick and season. Mix well.

Fish Dinner

Very Appropriate For Good Friday Soup. Broiled white fish. Mashed potato. Spinach. Salad (fresh tomato). Pie.

Method: For fixing white fish. Place white fish in a shallow pan. Dot well with butter. Season. Place on broiler under blaze. Broil slowly until done. Serve on hot platter. Garnish prettily with slices lemon, slices egg and some greens.

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Sardines 1 can sardines. 1 can tomato soup. Method: Pour oil from sardines into frying pan. Add tomato soup. When boiling, add sardines and serve on toast.

String Beans Cooked With Cheese 1 quart of string beans. 1 cup of grated cheese. 1/2 cup of cream. Seasoning. Little butter. Method: Cut up beans. Put in sauce pan and cover with boiling water. Boil 5 minutes. Simmer slowly for 2 hours. Drain. Put in baking dish. Season. Add 1/2 cup of the grated cheese and the cream. Then sprinkle other 1/2 cup of grated cheese over the top. Dot with tablespoon of butter. Place under gas flame and reheat until cheese is toasted.

BAKING HINTS

Hot Cross Buns

2 tablespoons of butter. 1/4 cup of sugar. 1 cup scalded milk. Salt. 1/2 yeast cake. 1/4 cup luke warm water. 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon. 3 cups of flour. 1 egg. 1/4 cup of raisins. 1/4 cup of currants. Method: Dissolve 1/2 yeast cake in luke warm water. Mix butter, sugar and salt. Add to milk. When luke warm, add dissolved yeast cake, flour, cinnamon and well beaten egg. Mix well. Add raisins and currants. Cover and let stand over night to rise. In morning, shape like large biscuits. Place in pan, 1 inch apart, let rise, brush over with beaten egg. Bake 20 minutes. Cool, and with ornamental frosting, make a cross on top of each bun.
