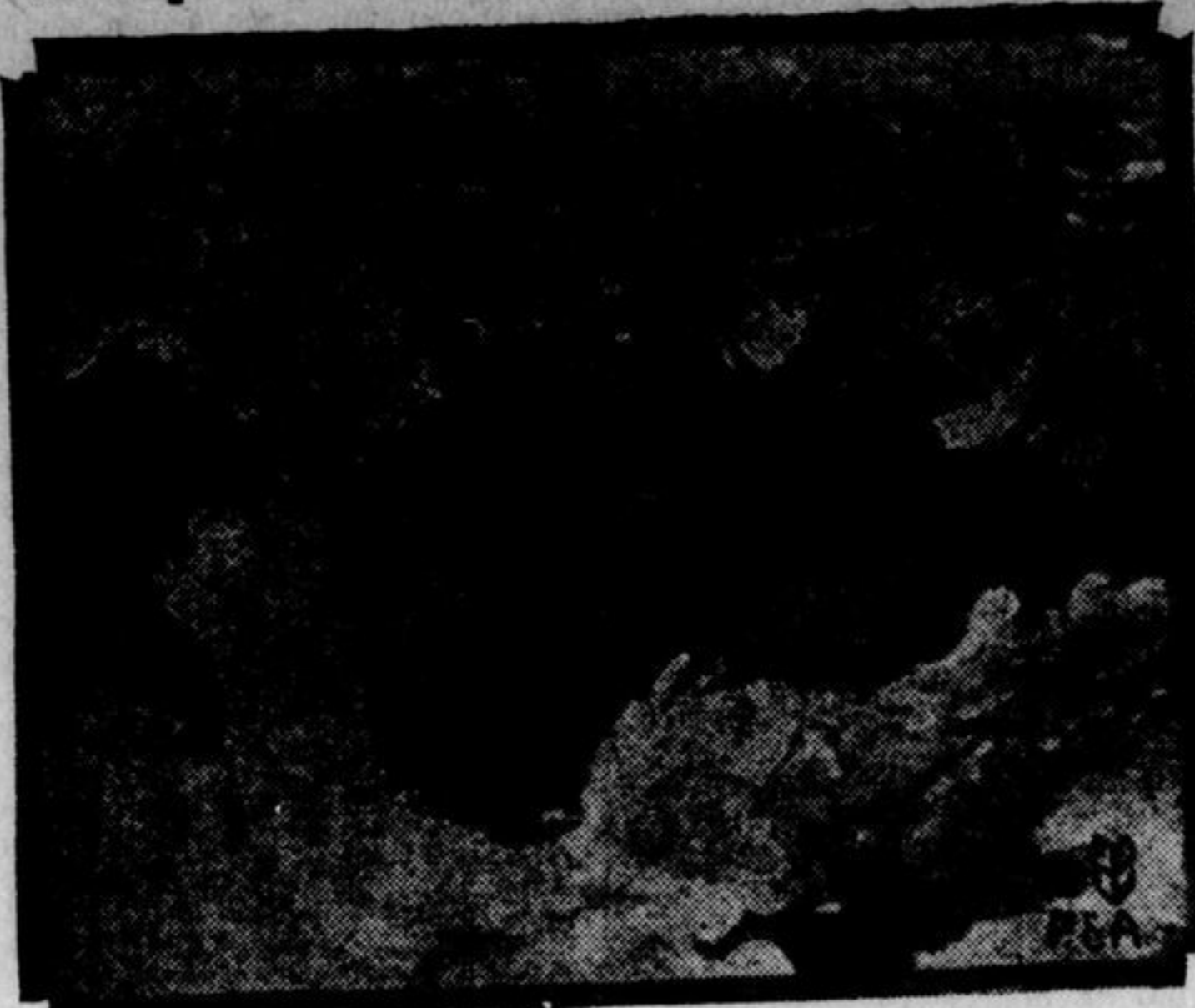

Oh! Look! What a Sweet Easter Surprise!



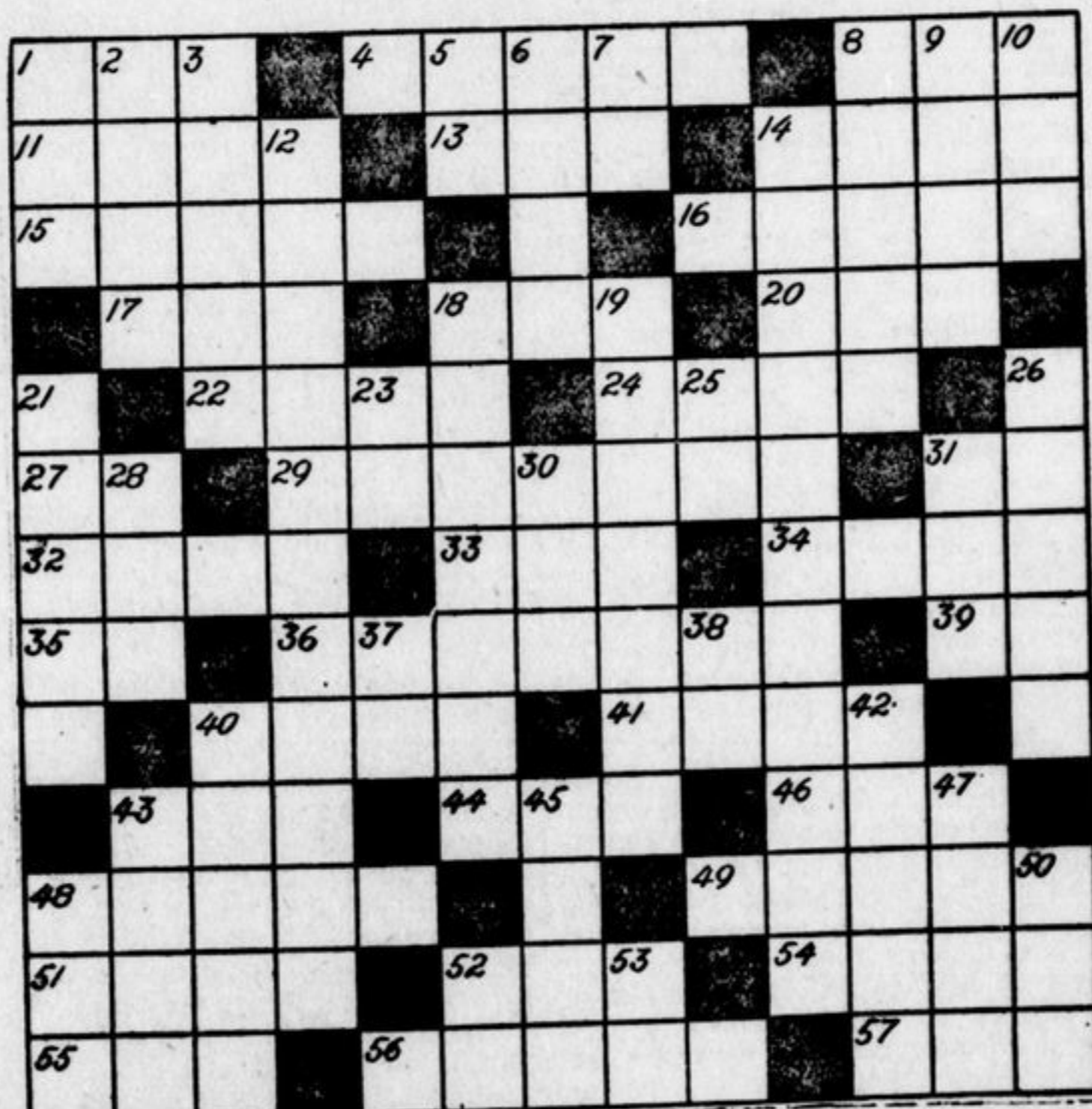

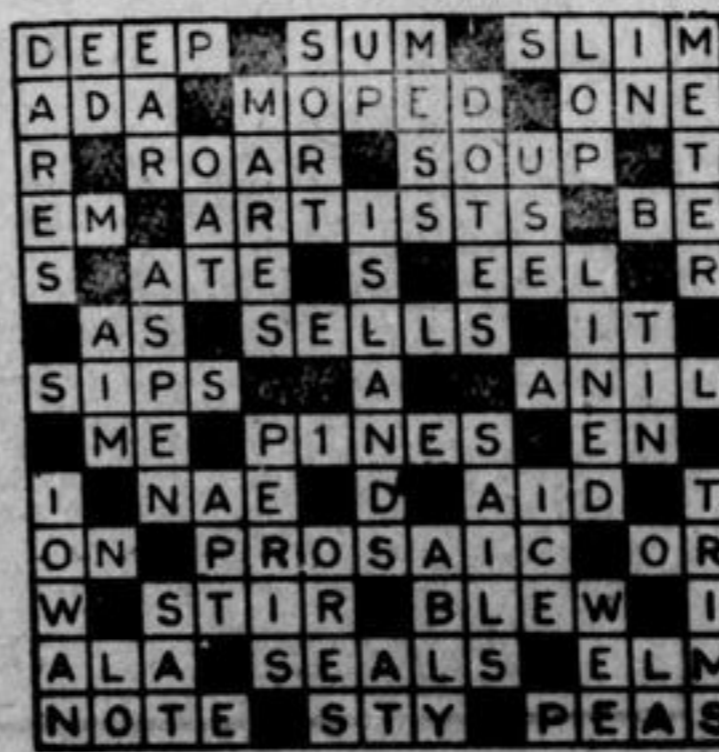
Cross Word Puzzle No. 2
