A Mermaid in a---Marcel Wave





In deed, the world plainly showed that "it had a heart" when the news first spread that the young explorer was caught in an underground cave passageway, more than 70 feet below the surface. Offers of aid, financial and otherwise, came from far distant points. When it was seen that Collins could not be rescued via Nature's natural tunnelthrough which he had first crawled-a shaft was sunk in hopes of bringing him out alive. The sinking of that shaft proved the "mettle of which men are made." Veteran miners, youthful college boys, seasoned engineers did all that was humanly possible to effect the saving of one precious life.
