One Church Goes Back In looking over the principal religions in Canada, according to the Sixth Census, we find that in the decade from 1911 to 1921 only one denomination went back numerically, and that is the Congregationalist which had a membership of 34,054 in 1911 and 30,730 in 1921. The Anglican Church in the same ten years made the largest increase of any Protestant sect, increasing from 1,043,017 to 1,407,994.

Snowplough on Toronto Line

The Ontario Department of Public Highways has an immense snowplough which it uses for the purpose of opening up the highways where the drifts are bad. It is the only one owned by the department and has been in use in certain sections of Ontario, notably between Hamilton and Guelph, and on the Dundas highway, during the greater part of the winter.

The Carrick Council is seriously considering the advisability of taking the policy.—Mildmay Gazette.

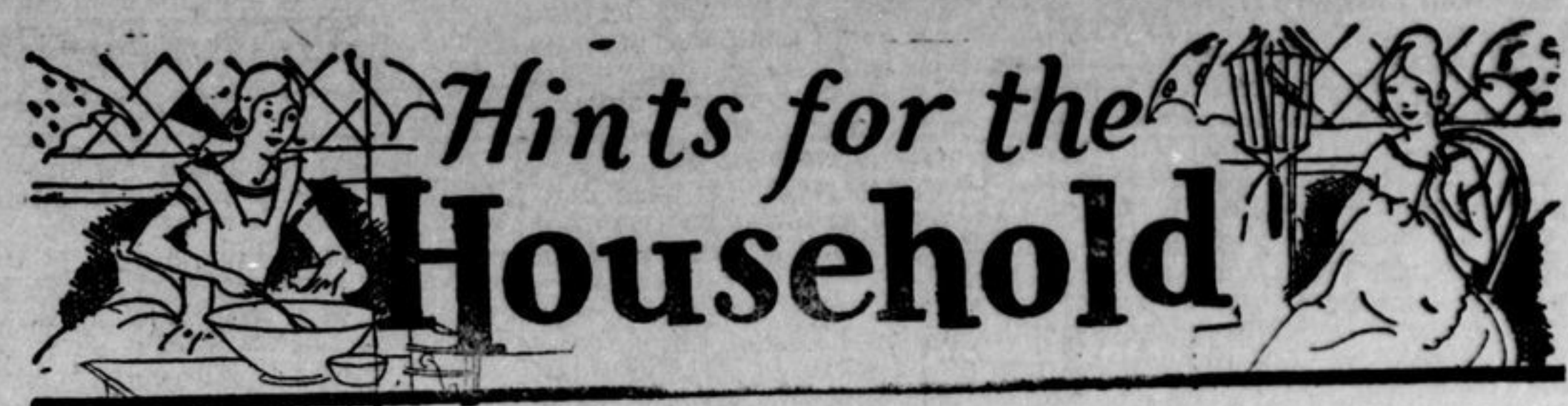

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Small bottle of stuffed olives, Cheese. Method: First make a cream sauce. Melt butter. Add flour and then milk. Stir until thick.

Scrambled Eggs and Tomato 2 tablespoons of butter. 1 tablespoon of chopped green pepper.

Creamed Eggs Eggs. Cream sauce. Method: Boil the desired number of eggs—hard. Cut eggs in two. Make a good cream sauce with plenty of butter. Mix with eggs. Pour into buttered baking dish. Dot top with butter. Heat in oven when ready to serve.

BAKING HINTS Baked Hominy With Cheese 2 cups of hominy. 1 tablespoon of butter. 1 tablespoon of flour.

Easter Tarts Filling. Whipped cream. Grated coconut. Chopped almonds. Strawberry.

Corn and Salmon Loaf 1 can of corn. 1 can of salmon. 1 tablespoon of butter. 1/2 cup of milk. 1/2 cup of water. 2 eggs.

A Real Delicacy 1 cup of flour. 1/2 teaspoon of salt. 1/2 cup of water. 3 tablespoons of baking powder. 3 tablespoons of grated cheese. 1 tablespoon of butter or fat.

Method: Cook the hominy in boiling salt water until done. Make a white sauce of butter, flour, milk and seasoning. Beat egg yolks. Mix with grated cheese. Mix well with cooked hominy. Then fold in the stiffly beaten whites. Bake in a moderate oven about 20 minutes. Serve with or without tomato sauce.

Method: Melt butter in pan. Add pepper, onion, tomato and seasoning. When hot, add well beaten eggs. Scramble together. When done, serve on toast.

Method: Boil the desired number of eggs—hard. Cut eggs in two. Make a good cream sauce with plenty of butter. Mix with eggs. Pour into buttered baking dish. Dot top with butter. Heat in oven when ready to serve.

Filling. Whipped cream. Grated coconut. Chopped almonds. Strawberry.

Method: Make a rich puff paste. Cool before filling. Fill with whipped cream. Over top put grated coconut and chopped almonds. For trimming, serve a large luscious strawberry.
