Hints for the Household

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To prevent moths from getting into rugs during summer months, rub a thin layer of camphor into the floor under your wool rugs, and the moths will not bother your rugs.

For Mending Tablecloths Save threads that are pulled when straightening edges. Wrap around an empty spool. Then, while tablecloth wears, use saved threads to darn, and the darn will hardly show.

COOKING HINTS

Orange Pudding This is a refreshing dessert after a heavy meal. 2 tablespoons of gelatin. 1 full cup of cold water.

Method: Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Add boiling water, fruit juices and sugar. Mix well. When this starts to cool and gelatin begins to stiffen, stir in 1 bottle of whipped cream.

cream. Pour in mold and set away to cool. Serve with sweetened whipped cream.

A French Soup 1 small lump of butter. 2 or 3 large onions. 3/4 cup of flour. 1 pin of boiling water (2 cups). 1 1/2 pints of hot milk. 2 or 3 mashed potatoes.

Method: Melt butter. When hot, add onions sliced thin. Stir and cook until red. Add water. Dissolve flour and add. Then add hot milk and mashed potatoes. Mix well. Stir and simmer a few minutes.

Salad Cabbage and pineapple together make a delicious salad.

BAKING HINTS Chocolate Nut Cookies 1 cup of sugar. 1/2 cup of butter. 2 squares of melted chocolate. 2 eggs. 1 1/2 cup of flour. 1/2 teaspoon baking powder. 2 teaspoons of vanilla.

Method: Mix well. Bake in a single crust.

Rhubarb Pie 1 cup of chopped pie plant. 1 cup of sugar. 1/2 cup of flour. 1 tablespoon of melted butter. 1 tablespoon of flour.

Method: Mix well. Bake in a single crust.

1 cup of chopped nuts. Method: Cream butter and sugar. Add the melted chocolate. Add 2 eggs well beaten. Then flour and baking powder. Last of all, vanilla and nuts. Drop small teaspoonfuls on buttered baking sheet. Bake until brown. Remove from tins before cookies get cold.

Flank Steak and Potatoes Flank steak. Little flour. Potatoes. Onions. Can of tomatoes. Method: Pound flour in steak. Place in bottom of casserole. Season. Slice potatoes on top of this. Season. Cut up a few onions. Add 1 can tomatoes over all of this. Bake slowly for 2 hours.

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Method: Mix well. Bake in a single crust.
