The Road To Better Health

BEWARE OF THE FLY!

This is the time of year to begin to swat the fly and destroy its breeding places. The latter is the more effective way of getting rid of flies!

Flies are scavengers. They are filthy. They breed in decaying vegetation, human excrement and manure. Any germs of disease that may be present in these favorite breeding places are picked up by the flies and may later be deposited on food. The contaminated food then becomes the direct means of introducing these germs into the body.

Typhoid fever, dysentery and infectious diarrheas can be conveyed in this way. It is possible that flies may be concerned in the carrying of some forms of tuberculosis. Some believe that flies are also capable of conveying smallpox and infantile paralysis from one person to another. One variety of fly is the means of spreading African sleeping sickness. So the charges against the fly are sufficiently numerous and serious to justify its destruction.

Preventive Measures

To prevent the breeding of flies, all garbage, waste and rotting vegetation should be either destroyed or removed to some distance from dwellings. Box-prives should be treated with unslaked lime. Liberal amounts should be used daily, at least during the warm seasons.

The United States Department of Agriculture advises putting in manure a solution of one-half pound of hellebore in ten gallons of water to prevent the breeding of flies. This amount is enough to treat about ten cubic feet of manure. It does not interfere with the fertilizing qualities. (But remember that hellebore is a poison.)

Homes and stores should be protected against the entrance of flies by screens or mosquito netting. Fly-traps placed near the doors are also of some help. Both in the home and in the shops, food should be kept covered.

Begin to swat now! Each fly killed now reduces by many thousands the number of flies there will be later on. And the fewer the flies, the less the opportunity for the spread of disease.

HEALTH QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Embolism

Mrs. O. M. writes: "I have a relative who has suffered from heart-disease for a number of years. He has recently had a bad attack and has developed a partial paralysis and has lost his ability to speak. The doctor says he has embolism of the brain. Would you mind telling me what embolism is? How is it different from a stroke? We thought he had a stroke. Any chance of complete recovery?"

Reply

1. The plugging of a blood-vessel by a clot, or other obstruction, which has been brought to its place of lodgment by the blood current, is called embolism. Most cases of embolism of the brain occur in heart disease.

2. The term apoplexy is more commonly used to designate the condition resulting from hemorrhage into the brain due to a ruptured artery.

Have Heart Examined

A. K. L. writes: "For several months, I have noticed that I get out of breath when I walk very fast or go up stairs or up hills. This did not worry me because I am too stout. But lately, I have been waking up at night and have trouble getting my breath until I sit up. What would cause this?"

Reply

There are several possible causes. Among these are heart disease, Bright's disease, anemia, and hardened arteries with high blood pressure.

CARELESSNESS SHOWN PASSING OTHER CARS

"Probably more carelessness is shown in passing other vehicles, particularly those going in the same direction, than in any other feature of automobile driving," states Chief of Police Zimmerman of Buffalo, N. Y.

There seems to be a small percentage of drivers who are unwilling to permit any other vehicle to lead them, and, in order to get ahead of them, very reckless chances are taken, frequently vehicles moving in the opposite direction being endangered, as well as those whom the road hog wants to pass.

"Another reckless habit of some drivers is to pass a vehicle going in the same direction at a street intersection, where there is always danger of collision with a vehicle crossing in front of the slower-moving vehicle which cannot clearly be seen."

INJURED IN EXPLOSION

"HUNCHBACK OF NOTRE DAME" IS LAEMMLE'S REPLY TO THE BETTER PICTURE MOVEMENT

Local Theatres Expected to Endorse Verdict of Hundreds of Thousands in Cities From Coast to Coast.

"The Hunchback of Notre Dame," the massive and much heralded film production of Victor Hugo's story masterpiece which swept into overnight fame in New York, will be given its local premier at the Veterans' Star Theatre Tuesday and Wednesday, May 5 and 6.

Never before, it is said, has there been offered a picture production representing so stupendous a cost—\$1,500,000—never a film presentation so exact in its details, so artistic in its conception, so wonderful in the acting of its seventy-five principals, two hundred sub-principals, and in the handling of the mob scenes in which more than 3,000 persons take part.

Lon Chaney, admittedly the finest interpreter of unusual character roles on either stage or screen, plays the stellar part of "Quasimodo," the deformed bell-ringer of Notre Dame, with Ernest Torrence as "Clopin," the underworld king; and Patsy Ruth Miller as "Esmeralda."

Carl Laemmle, who founded Universal City out in Southern California, it is said, has achieved something there which awakens the utmost admiration. He has taken Hugo's rather turgid melodramatic novel, and after building a replica of Paris' famous Cathedral, he has retold Hugo's story in pictures—vital, vivid pictures that hold the attention and excite admiration by their undeniable power and beauty.

The spirit of the story is "Quasimodo," the hunchback, an elemental creature, twisted in body and restricted in mind, who haunts the great church, "Quasimodo," as Mr. Chaney presents him, is said to be a grotesque monster, and yet under the forbidding aspect, the actor succeeds in making the character human and pitiful. His daring poses on the projecting gargoyles of the great church, his hazardous swinging on the bells at the risk of his life, the gruesome scene of his castigation in the market place, and the pathos of his final act as, dying, he rings his own death knell on his beloved bells, are features, it is said, that make "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" the most noted film production to date.

In constructing the Cathedral of Notre Dame at Universal City, an army of carpenters, masons and other mechanics were employed. The building is an exact replica in every detail of the famous Cathedral looked in 1482. It is declared to be an extraordinary feat and an architectural and technical triumph.

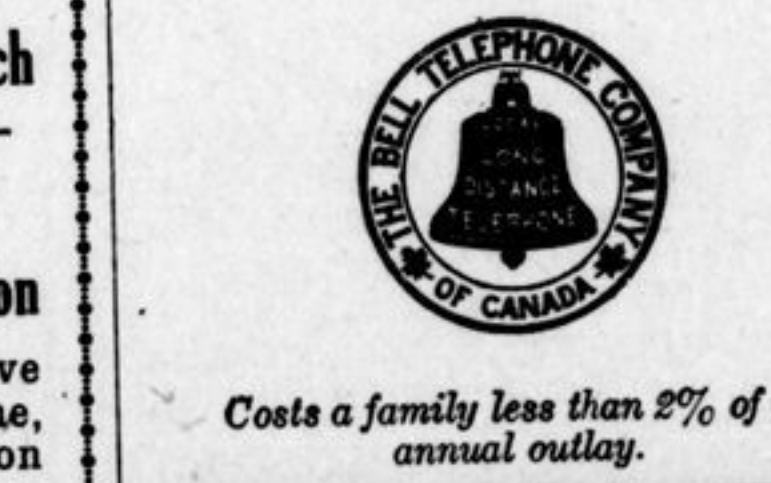
