

PRICEVILLE ANTIS HELD MEETING MONDAY

Continuing Body of St. Columba Church Held Enthusiastic Meeting on Evening of 24th Inst.

An enthusiastic meeting of the non-concurring Presbyterians of Priceville and district was held in Priceville on Monday evening, when the matter of forming a new church was freely discussed and many matters of interest to the continuing body were gone into.

The Presbyterians of Hillsburg on Sunday last enjoyed an opportunity of getting full and authentic information on the Church Union situation, the preacher of the day being the Rev. H. R. Horne of Toronto, who has taken an active part in the campaign for the continuation of the Presbyterian Church.

Particular interest centred in a meeting at the close of the evening service, when an opportunity was given to present questions on any points which have been causing difficulties or were not clear.

One of the questions was as to the right of a congregation to remain independent after June 10 and to retain possession of its property. It was pointed out that since the passing of the Ontario Act, this could not be done.

Perhaps something should be said about the temperatures. At ordinary temperatures during time in the window, annuals will grow quickly. In case of a sudden lowering outdoors, as for instance, on a frosty night, the window temperature must not be allowed to fall below 45 degrees F.

In reply to another question, the non-democratic nature of the United Church was pointed out. The Presbyterian Church is thoroughly democratic with power in the hands of the people.

The United Church retains many familiar terms, but it was pointed out that the dangerous thing was that it gives these familiar terms a new content and meaning. Examples of this were in the words, "Session," "Presbytery" and "Call."

The claim put forth that the General Assembly speaks for and binds the church was absolutely refuted. The assembly was the creation of the church and therefore could not possibly destroy that which created it.

RAISING FLOWERING PLANTS

There are a few annual flowering plants which now should be sown indoors to furnish a display of bloom in our gardens, such as Stocks, Asters, Zinnias, Cockscorns, Balsams, Caledula, Cobaea (Climber), Dianthus, Nicotina and Verbena.

It is essential to have good drainage in the boxes, thus four or five holes should be bored in the bottom of each. In the boxes should first be placed a layer of broken flower pots (corks) or broken clinkers, upon which should be placed a layer of leaf soil, or the coarse siftings from the soil.

Careful Watering Necessary Water may be applied to the soil either by immersion of the receptacles, or by overhead applications. The latter should be made by means of a can with a fine sprinkler.

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When about two inches high, the seedlings should be transplanted into other boxes, three inches each way being allowed between plants. Carefully watered and replaced in the window or greenhouse, they should in two weeks be ready to place in the garden frame to be hardened off for transplanting outdoors during the latter half of May.

Raising Seedlings in Frames To raise early flowering annual plants it is not necessary to make hot beds during April unless at northern points. The seeds should be sown upon finely prepared beds, preferably in lines. Precaution should be taken to cover the frames at nights if danger of frost is suspected.

In order that the plants, whether brought from the window or greenhouse, or those raised in the frame may become hardened off, that is become inured to outdoor temperatures, the sashes may be removed during the day, and as soon as danger from frost has passed, be left over night.

SYMPTOMS OF POISONING IN DOGS, AND THEIR ANTIDOTES

At this time of the year, the poison fiend begins his nefarious practice of scattering poison. The following hints are intended to be of assistance where a veterinary surgeon's aid cannot be obtained.

Arsenic is a common form of poisoning due in the majority of cases to dogs eating vermin bait. Symptoms: The animal is decidedly restless and anxious with convulsive action of the lips, increased salivation, vomiting, a dark colored diarrhoea and acute abdominal pain.

Antidote: Give an emetic as follows: zinc sulphate grains XV, water three ounces; one or two teaspoonfuls every ten minutes until vomiting occurs. Follow with one or two ounce doses of sesquioxide of iron every twenty minutes.

Strychnine is one of the most common forms of poisoning and very often proves fatal despite every effort. Symptoms: There is uneasiness, an anxious appearance, and panting, followed by acute muscular spasms at intervals which affect the whole body.

Antidote: Give an emetic as in Arsenic. Follow with from two teaspoonfuls to one tablespoonful of the following mixture every two hours: Chloral hydrate one dram, potassium bromide four drams, syrup auranti two ounces, water six ounces. Keep as quiet as possible.

Symptoms: When the acid has entered the mouth, white patches will appear wherever it has come in contact with the membranes; if absorbed generally, the animal will appear greatly distressed, and convulsions followed by paralysis of the hindquarters will occur.

Antidote: Give alcohol, gin, or whisky in one or two ounce doses. As a purge give sodium sulphate two drams, water four ounces. Follow with starch, oils, lime water.

Antidote: Give an emetic followed by one-half to two grain doses of calomel every half-hour until purgation commences. Hot applications to the abdomen are often beneficial. Mustard plasters may be applied. Finally give stimulants, wine, spirits of wine, brandy.
