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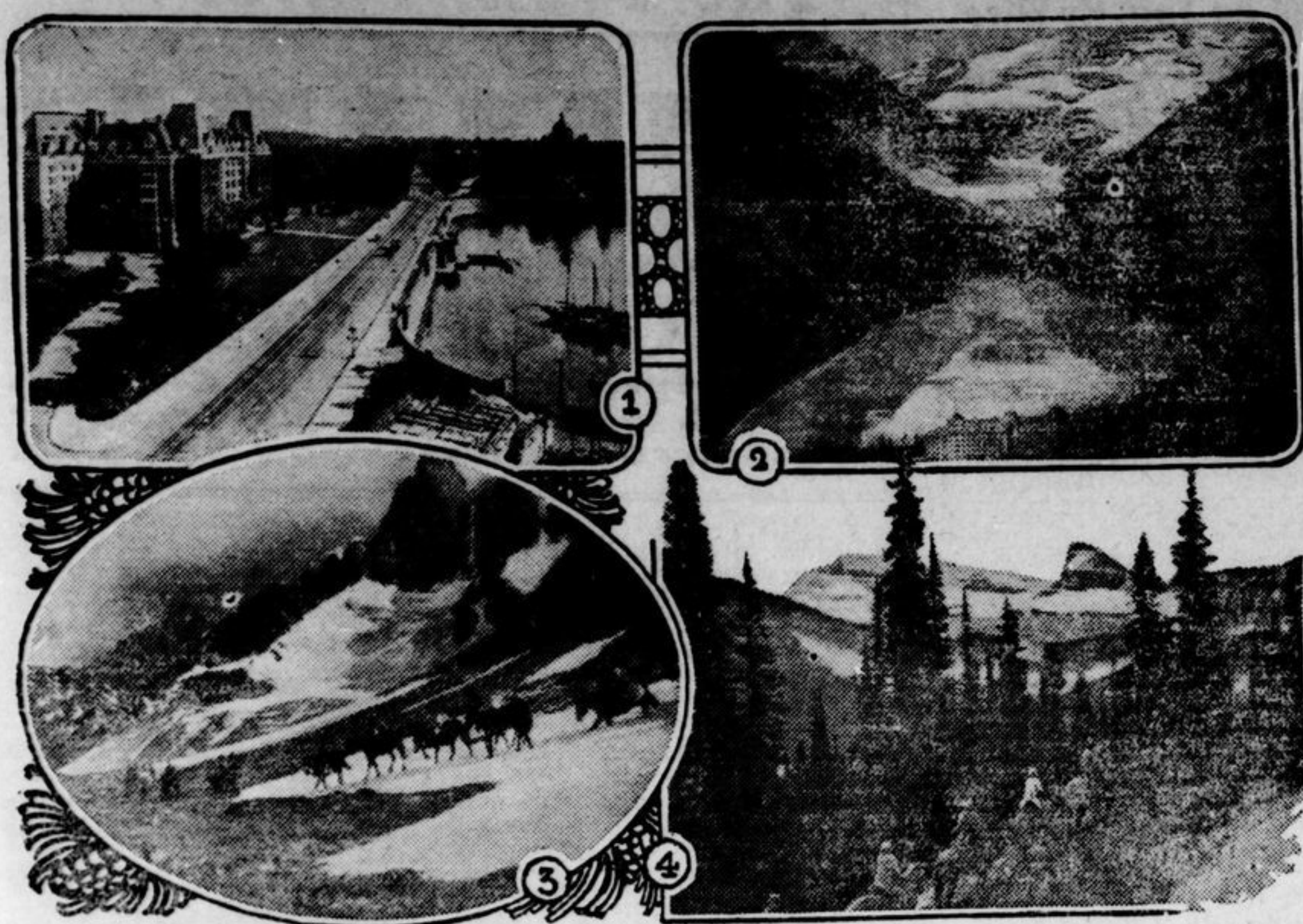

WESTERN ONTARIO NEWS IN BRIEF

Sixty miles of roadway will be eliminated from Oxford County road system under the new adjustment.

The mortgage of first Methodist Church at St. Thomas was burned by the secretary of the trustee board at a large congregational meeting.

Hamilton Town Planning Board at a meeting recently decided to await a conference with the restricted areas committee to fix the general theory of zoning.

Robert Duncan, four years old, of Windsor, was killed by an auto driven by C. H. Johnson of Detroit, and four-year-old David Felmar was probably fatally injured when run down by Louise Groppe.

Seven-year-old Arthur Vandusen of Hamilton, was drowned on Saturday night when he fell from the revetment wall of the sewage disposal works. The body was recovered.

High tribute was paid on Saturday to the work of the Mountaineer San. at Hamilton by the Deputy Minister of Health on the occasion of the annual birthday party of the institution.

Brant Dragons held their first church parade since the war, and were reviewed by the Lieutenant-Governor, who is honorary colonel of the regiment.

James Conley, 65 years old, of Hamilton, was knocked down on Saturday night by an auto driven by George Franks, and was rushed to the hospital in a serious condition.

Allan Braden, six-year-old son of J. A. E. Braden, barrister of London, succumbed on Saturday to injuries sustained in an auto accident last Friday.

Helma Martin, aged six, of Dorchester Village, is in the hospital with slight chance of recovery the victim of a similar accident.

The body of an unidentified man was taken from the river at Sandwich. It is believed he fell or jumped from a passing vessel.

All records for auto tourists at Windsor were broken on Saturday. Four hundred permits to drivers were issued.

When three-year-old Helen McElbome of Tillsonburg was pushed over an embankment on Saturday by playmates, a piece of wood pierced her mouth, but missed the jugular by a hair breadth. She is expected to recover.

The auto of Mrs. James Conley of St. Thomas, was struck broadside on by another auto, the driver of which did not stop, and was hurled into the ditch, all the occupants suffering from cuts and bruises.

Hamilton Board of Control reaffirmed their recommendation of S. K. Watt, of St. Catharines, as City Treasurer. C. S. Walters retired provisionally till the question of the reinstatement of the resigned treasurer has been determined.

World News

Trouble is again brewing in southern Albania, according to despatches from Tirana, the capital. Insurgents are gradually forming groups and attacking the regular forces, it is declared, and the capital is in danger.

The Vienna authorities ordered the University Engineering School and some other colleges closed for the remainder of the term because of the frequent street fights and disturbances between Pan-German, Socialist-Democratic and Jewish students.

Thirty alleged members of the Red Legion, a communist organization charged with having been implicated in recent insurrectionary movements, were placed aboard a cruiser for deportation to Portuguese Guinea, in Africa.

The London Daily Mail says the Soviet Embassy in London has been granted the protection of an armed guard day and night. The embassy the paper understands, received a letter threatening violence against certain of its officials, and this was sent to the British authorities with a request for protection.

Further details were received in Peshawar, British India, of the recent executions of 56 rebels near Kabul, Afghanistan. The Emir of the Khost district of Afghanistan, where the rebellion occurred, held a full durbar, or native celebration for the occasion. The condemned men were led out and shot in the presence of a great crowd gathered from all the district.

The train carrying the press correspondents who are reporting the Prince of Wales' tour in South Africa, narrowly escaped being wrecked as it was nearing Theunissen station on the way from Bloemfontein, capital of the Orange Free State, owing to the breaking of two tie-rods

WONDERS OF MODERN SCIENCE

Sitting in the home of a friend the other evening we heard the strains of a pipe organ over six hundred miles away, says a writer in one of our exchanges. The room in which we sat had every window and door closed, and the home was weather-stripped. There was no aerial or outside connection with the radio cabinet from which the strains of the pipe organ were coming.

A brick house, weather-stripped and closed tight as a drum, and yet the pipe organ played six hundred miles away, was heard distinctly. Talk about your fairy stories, your Aladdin's wonderful lamp and the goose that laid the golden eggs.

The other night we saw a picture that moved on a screen. For a moment it was still—something had happened to the machine. It was still, like the old magic lantern pictures of twenty years ago, then the people began to walk, the birds began to fly, and the whole scene was in action.

A few days ago a big bag filled with gas and driven by motors, brought thirty-two people from Germany to America in 81 hours. It

took Christopher Columbus months to make the trip. And so it goes. Science prevents pestilences, surgeons make new faces, physicians prolong life, inventors send ships into the air, and under the seas and the human voice speaks across vast distances, miles are obliterated until a man crosses the continent between daylight and dark. This is a wonderful age in which we live.

We have witnessed the expansion of steam from Watt's tea kettle, through the monster turbine engines into the marvelous work of the dynamo. Today scientists tell us there is power enough tucked up in a tumbler of water to propel an ocean liner from New York to Liverpool—that a few quarts of water some day, will run factories and furnish the necessary power of transportation.

And yet some folks are worrying over the possible exhaustion of wood, coal and oil. Better worry for fear some inquisitive scientist touches the wrong atom and blows us all into space. Some seeker after knowledge is apt to do just that very thing, and when he does, we won't even have the time to say "good-bye."
