PTE. A. J. PUST DIED IN TORONTO LAST WEEK

Former Member of 147th Grey Co. Battalion Passed Away in City Street Hospital Friday, terred Sunday With Military Honors.

After an illness extending a period of upwards of seven weeks, Mr. Anthony J. Pust, son of Mr. Pust of this place, passed away Friday at noon in the Christie Hospital, Toronto, at the age years.

Mr. Pust was a native of Bohemia having been born at Allan where he grew up to young hood. About seventeen years he went West and took up a stand at Colonsay, Sask., where he remained until the outbreak of the Great War in 1914, when he East and enlisted in the 147th Grey Co. Battalion. Though discharged in the physically fit, he was far from the effects of the gas poisoning him in indifferent health, loving his discharge, he came here and lived in Bentinck city until last December when contracted tuberculosis and transferred to the Christie Street Hospital, Toronto, where condition became gradually and he passed away last about noon.

Besides his father, three and four brothers survive: J. Tattle, Rock Lake, N. J. Peter McIntosh, Sarnia, N. B. George Handford, Snowflake, John, Edmonton; William, Ezra, in Nova Scotia and St. Durham.

The remains were brought here Saturday night, and funeral with military honors, from the Baptist church, afternoon, the pastor, Rev.
