

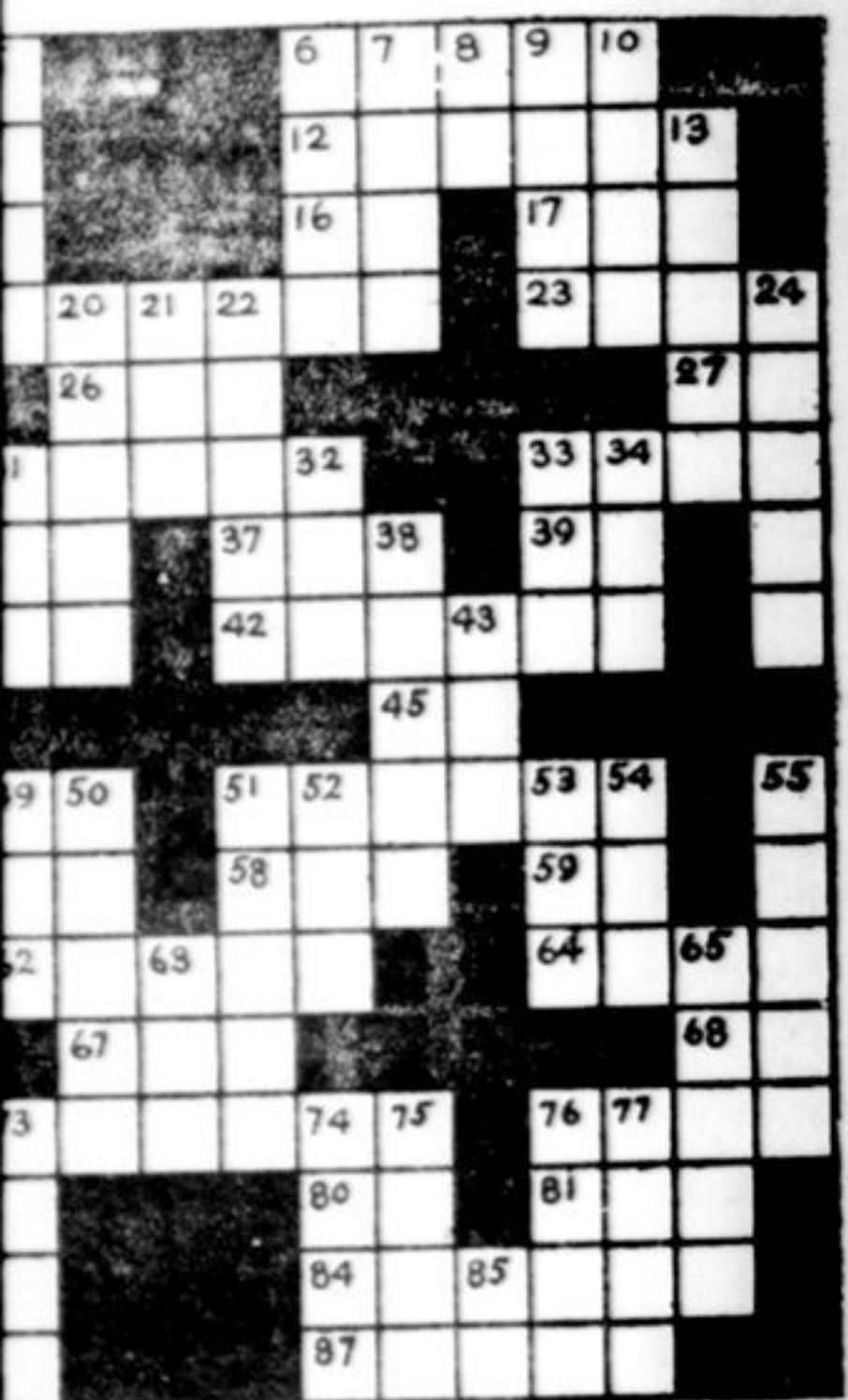

Spray Service

Ere this issue of the paper is published, the third or Calyx spray will have been applied. It has been a rush, but Mr. Hamilton and the Department of Agriculture, Markdale, have done their best to get to all applicants' orchards previous to and during each spray. Undoubtedly some have been missed. This the supervisors regret exceedingly. However, they have done their best and requested all applicants to telephone if any assistance was required. Some have done so, and appreciation of such is herein expressed.

Although the three most important sprays are applied, weather conditions will be watched very carefully. Should the weather indicate the necessity of further applications of spray, due notice will be given every fruit grower.

Permanent Sheep Dipping Tanks
Mr. W. J. Howard, Paris, Junior Sheep Promoter of Western Ontario, is in Grey County installing permanent Sheep Dipping Tanks. Altogether twenty-one applications for these have been received. It is hoped to install at least one per day so that in the course of a month, all applications will be filled.

Girls' Household Science Judging Competition
The announcement of the second Household Science Judging has just come to the local branch of the Department of Agriculture, Markdale, from the Director of Agricultural Representatives, Toronto. The competition will be conducted again this year, only enlarged.

There will be an inter-county competition with teams of three girls from each county. These, of course, would be trained if demonstrators are available. An open competition will also be held in which any young lady under 25 may enter provided she has never attended a Home Economic School for over three months. She can enter any two classes, but only win one prize. It costs 50 cents to enter.

The classes are as follows: (1) Baking, which includes bread and cake; Nutrition—school lunches and family menus; Sewing—house dresses and making buttonholes and hemming; Good Dressing—Dress parade and country girl's wardrobe.

The prizes given will be as follows: \$10.00, \$9.00, \$8.00, \$7.00, \$6.00, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00, \$2.00, \$1.00. These are substantial and worthy of trying for. Every girl in Grey County should try this competition. The Department of Agriculture, Markdale, will give any information the young ladies may desire.

Canadian Bacon Shows Improvement
Ontario's Agent General, stationed at London, England, writes as follows: The writer continues to hear very good reports on the present quality of Canadian Bacon from leading men in the trades, and there cannot be any doubt that Canadian bacon is steadily becoming more and more popular on this side. Last year (1924) Canada sent this country 1,190,249 cwt. of bacon, compared with 834,284 cwt. in 1923. Every month figures keep on the upgrade. In March 119,999 cwt. of bacon were received from Canada, compared with 83,188 cwt. in the corresponding month of the previous year. For the first quarter of 1925, the figures were 341,246 cwt., as compared with 203,291 cwt. for the corresponding period of 1924.

These figures are all the more gratifying because the market for bacon this spring has been so much better than was the case last year. For example, the value of the imports of Canadian bacon during the first quarter of 1925 was \$1,589,267, as compared with \$890,741, for the first quarter of 1924. In addition, Canada received \$220,253 for hams during the first quarter of 1925, as compared with only \$91,425 in the corresponding period of 1924.

The improved position of Canadian bacon is due entirely to the improvement of the quality of bacon. This improvement is the direct result of the grading system inaugurated by the Canadian Government when requested by the Canadian Bacon Producers two years ago.

The improvement is reflected by the enhanced value of hogs. Farmers are directly benefiting by it. Yet in the face of this, some criticize the work undertaken. Such attitude is wrong and should be discouraged.

A pretty wedding was solemnized at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Sewell, 7th Line, Euphrasia, when their daughter, Alma Evelyn, was united in marriage to Roy Elmer Kirkpatrick. The ceremony was performed by Rev. H. V. Ellison.

Another of the early pioneers of this district passed away early Saturday morning, May 31, in the person of Mrs. Andrew Walker, Sr., who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Rowe, Chatsworth, at the age of 75 years.

The annual Sunday School Convention of Euphrasia Township was held at Victoria Church, Rockyln, on May 27.

Alex. McEachnie of Flesherton has purchased the Madill butchering business here which was advertised for sale some time ago.

On Thursday, May 28, one of the most successful oratorical contests ever held in Markdale was conducted under the auspices of the Young People's Societies of the Methodist Churches when Flesherton won the debating shield.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To Remove Mud

When you get mud on your silk skirt—do not brush. Let mud dry. Wrap piece of velvet or velveteen around your finger and rub off dried mud. If mud has left a stain, carefully rub it with a cloth dipped in ammonia and water.

Make Use of a Sunny Kitchen Window

Build a shelf and place a window box on it. Fill it with rich earth. Plant in it mustard, chives, parsley and cress. This way you will have a pretty window box, enjoy the greens and have the fun of raising them.

One Way To Store Blankets

Blankets not in use during summer months should be thoroughly washed or dry cleaned. Then before putting away, sprinkle plentifully with dry yellow soap flakes between the folds. This will keep the moths out.

COOKING HINTS

General Rules for Making Ice Cream

Use three times as much ice as salt for freezing. Use four times as much ice as salt for packing. In freezing ice cream, turn crank slowly and steadily. In freezing sherbet, turn crank fast and steadily. When mixture is frozen, remove ice and salt from around top.

BAKING HINTS

Nut Bread (Splendid for Picnic Sandwiches)

1 egg.
1/2 cup of sugar.
1 cup of milk.
2 cups of flour.
2 teaspoons of baking powder.
1/2 cup of chopped nuts.
1/2 teaspoon of salt.

Method: Mix thoroughly. Grease small bread tin. Pour into tin and let stand 20 minutes. Then bake in moderate oven. This recipe makes quite a fair-sized loaf.

Macaroni Loaf (Slices Prettily)

1 package of unbroken macaroni.
3 tablespoons of butter.
4 tablespoons of flour.
1 cup of strained tomatoes.
Season with salt, pepper and onion juice.

Method: Cook macaroni in boiling water. Make a thick tomato sauce using butter, flour and tomato. Add seasoning. Pour in slowly slightly beaten egg. Butter a baking dish. Over the bottom, sprinkle a layer of cracker crumbs. Fill pan alternating a layer of macaroni and layer of tomato sauce. Top with crumbs. Dot it with butter. Bake 20 minutes in hot oven. Cheese is a tasty addition.

Strawberry Mousse

2 cups of whipped cream.
1/2 cup of powdered sugar.
Little salt.
2 cups of mashed berries.

Method: Whip cream stiff. Add sugar gradually. Fold mashed berries into cream. Add pinch of salt. Turn into mold. Cover with greased paper. Have greased side up. Pack in rock salt and ice and let stand.

Messrs. Frederick Heimbecker and Christian Weis were fishing at a nearby lake recently and secured 17 pike weighing 70 pounds.

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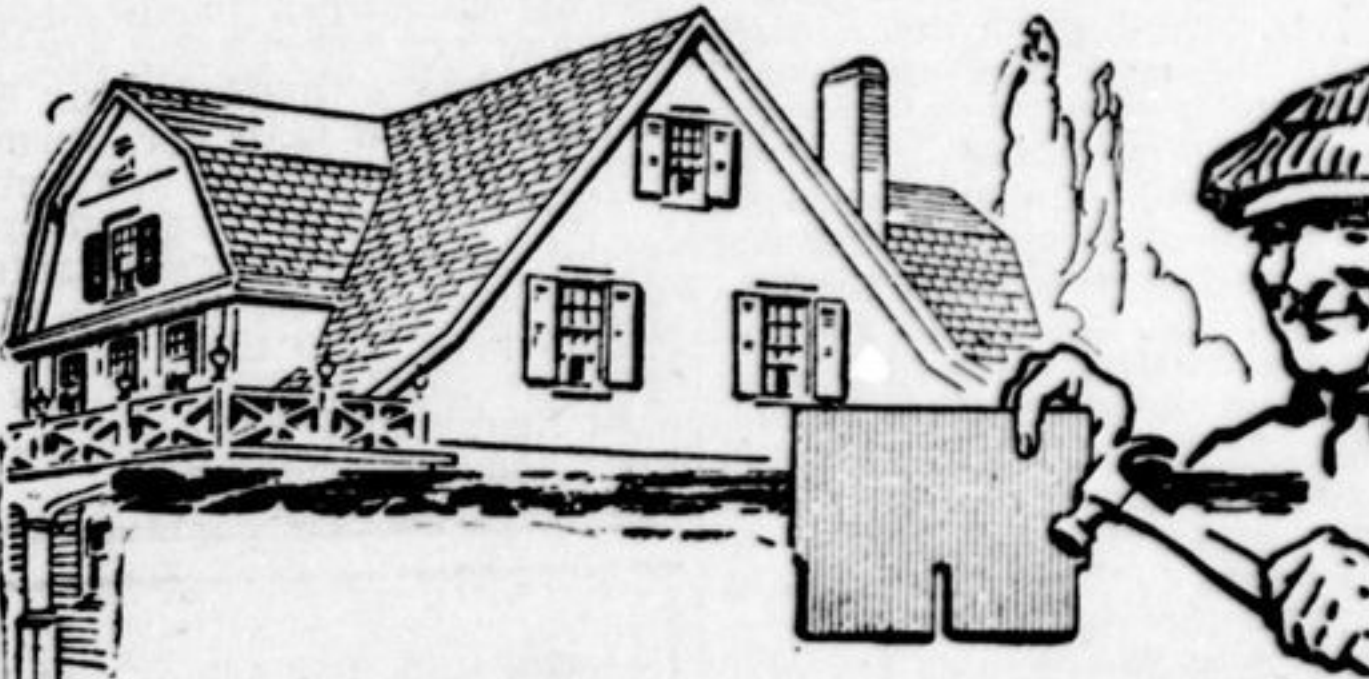
