A RECENT ISSUE OF THE CANADIAN CHURCHMAN CONTAINS a powerful and timely article by Archbishop Matheson, the Primate of Canada, that is worthy of wide publicity. It is a strong plea to Christian women chiefly to make the home the centre of Christian influence and to preserve of the Lord's Day. Pleading for the maintenance of the religious tone in the home, the Primate stated:

King George said a short time ago that the foundations of England's greatness were laid in the homes of England. And this is true. In the biographies to which I have already referred, I was struck by two features in the life of one of them. He was a great man, giving promise too of the great future which he subsequently filled. He was offered a most important post which had great attractions for him. After praying over it, he declined it, and he gave this reason: "My first duty is to my home, from which this position will take me largely away. My children are at a critical age, and they need me. Their whole future will depend upon the next few years. I must not leave them." The other feature was referred to by his widow when she stated that her husband never went to his public duty on a single morning of his life without first kneeling before his prayer desk and remembering each child of his by name before God, and asking for God's blessing upon him or her. My dear friends, I might say much more about this, but there is no time, but, as I have said, let me enlist very specifically and pointedly the support of the W. A. in making their homes centres of spiritual light and leading Bethels houses of God. And let me tell you that no one can do this more effectively than the devout mother, the devout wife, the bright Christian sister. In this rushed, busy, competitive age, men have to be very much out in the pulsing current of life, away from the home, and as a result, much more responsibility devolves upon the women of the home. What I desire is that they realize that and more than ever endeavor to measure up to that responsibility.

TRAIN YOUR BOY TO TELL THE TRUTH. TEACH HIM TO seem to tell a lie. Explain to him the value of a promise. Tell him that a gentleman, a man of honor, never, for any consideration, breaks his word—Truth and honesty, then, are the fundamental parts of a great character, and these qualities can most effectually be taught in childhood.

WHEN NOT TO PRAY.—WHEREFORE CRIEST THOU UNTO me? Speak unto the children of Israel, that they go forward (14:15). Dr. Adam Clarke, the great commentator, was a slow worker, and he could only produce his wealth of literary treasures by long and patient toil. He therefore made it his custom to rise early every morning. A young preacher, anxious to emulate the distinguished doctor, asked him one day how he managed it. "Do you pray about it?" he inquired. "No," the doctor quietly answered; "I get up." Mr. Moody used to tell how once he came upon a group of wealthy American Christians praying for the removal of a debt of \$500 on their church building. "Gentlemen," said Mr. Moody in his incisive way, "I don't think, if I were you, I should trouble the Lord in the matter."

THE GROWTH OF CIRCULATION OF THE SCRIPTURES IN Italy has been marked of recent years. This is partly credited to the zeal and ability of agents and others. Another factor to be taken into consideration is the fresh interest in religion. Among Italians, there is a widespread dissatisfaction with the anti-religious sentiments hitherto prevailing among them. Italians say that the Fascist movement is more than political; it is religious. Still another contributing cause is undoubtedly the publication of Giovanni Papini's "Story of Christ." It has inevitably led people to read the Gospels for themselves.

IN CONNECTION WITH THE CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR PLEDGE, President Francis E. Clark sent forth a stirring message.

"If I could never send another message to Christian Endeavorers, I would say, Hold fast to the pledge, not in a slavish spirit, but with the freedom wherewith Christ makes us free. Hold fast to it because it emphasizes our high ideal to do only what Jesus Christ, our Master, would like to have us do."

"Hold fast to it because it adds to our weakness, trust in His strength, in which alone we can achieve success in any work for Him and our fellow men."

"Hold fast to it because it demands loyalty to the church as well as to Christ, for without definite and strenuous loyalty to the people of God with whom we have associated ourselves, we shall disastrously scatter our influence and our power."

"Hold fast to it because it enforces the duty of testimony and outspoken allegiance to Him whose we are and whom we serve. Expression is as necessary to religious growth as the impression of truth. A plant cannot grow unless it expresses its life by its leaves and flowers. Strip off the leaves of a tree for three successive years, and it dies. A bird if it lives will surely express itself in song. Every honest word for Him in the prayermeeting, every simplest service on a committee, is an expression of our love. A Christian, if he would grow strong, must express his love for Christ in words and songs and deeds."

"Hold fast to the pledge because it has been and is the main cable of devotion to the prayermeeting, which is the powerhouse of our movement."

"Hold fast to it because it has been the inspiration of all our many committees, and of our multifarious welfare work for soldiers and sailors, for prisoners and shut-ins, for children in fresh air camps and for peoples in all conditions of distress."

"Hold fast to it because it is the bond of our worldwide fellowship; in a hundred different languages, in more than a hundred different denominations, in every contant ad in all the great islands of the sea, simple, reasonable, practical in spirit and purpose if not in exact phraseology."

"Condensed into a line, it is to strive, not boastfully or vain-gloriously, but to strive earnestly, persistently, humbly to do whatever Jesus Christ our Lord would like to have us do."

"This is the gist of Christianity. This is the pith of Christian Endeavor. This, please God, will give strength and perpetuity to our movement in the long years that stretch before us."

THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY HAS NO INTENTION OF relaxing his hold on the doctrines of the Reformation. "The doctrines we stand by in the church we love, a church catholic and reformed, are a sacred heritage. We mean that heritage to be safe, please God, in our keeping!"

arrived, the Canadians were the spear head of the Allied army—a glorious day for Canada.

The churches have a world campaign on their hands and are gradually coming to believe that they must pool their resources and plan a new world effort. Two thirds of the whole human race are Unchristian, and their population is increasing at a higher rate than the conversions. One hundred and twenty-two million people have no Protestant work in touch with them.

At home, there is one minister to 507 people; abroad one to 50,000; at home, one doctor to 647, abroad, one to a million. What a disparity!

The church's task is the "others." "For Their Sakes"—the Y. M. C. A. was organized; the Salvation Army was inspired outside ordinary church methods but backed by all the churches. The Protestant churches are moving out of the ward. The task will have to be faced by a larger organization. The outposts in the West, great blocks of new Canadians are out for a larger plan and a more united effort to Christianize Canada.

In 1875 the Presbyterian churches in Canada united to banish the old world heritage of division and bitterness and to undertake a greater work for the new Canada. We thank God that in Durham there was a minister, the Rev. William Park, who saw the vision and had the faith and courage to carry this church into the larger work. Who today would want to go back to the old conditions? Then Canada led all English countries in the re-union of Presbyterianism, and now in the new union of different denominations, the Canadian forces are the spear head of the armies of the Lord against the forces of evil. Today we will renew our covenant vows, and re-dedicate our lives to the great task of Christianizing Canada and winning the world for Christ.

Many in the congregation declared it was the finest address Mr. Smith ever made, and certainly the congregation was deeply moved by his appeal.

After the sacrament, Mr. Peters spoke briefly on the significance of the Lord's Supper as a sacrament, a communion and a thanksgiving. It was a memorable day for the Union churches of Durham and for those who have seen the vision and declared they will not be disobedient unto it.

During the day and far into the night, the members of the local Ladies' Bowling Club catered to the visiting bowlers, serving refreshments from a tent erected on the ground.
