WARDEN MCKENZIE OPENS COUNTY COUNCIL

Warden's Address Reviews Conditions in Grey County Now—Look Forward to Successful Session of County Body During Week.

The opening meeting of the June sessions of the Grey County Council was held Monday evening at seven o'clock at the County Court House, Owen Sound, and the opening ceremonies of the sessions were concluded. Every member of the council was present with the exception of three, Mr. Bothwell, who is at present on an extended trip in the Old Country; Mr. Filsinger, who is at present ill with appendicitis, and Mr. Smith.

The council regretted that these members were unable to be present. Warden T. R. McKenzie occupied his position as chairman of the council, and he first called upon Rev. John Locke to open the session with prayer.

Mr. Locke delivered a short address to the members also and wished them the best of everything during their sessions this week. He was very glad to address the gathering of the representatives from the County of Grey and considered it a great honor to be asked to deliver an address at their opening meeting.

Mr. Locke intimated that he considered the County Council one of the most important bodies of men in the county. He stated that they were made up of men who represented a township or village and must necessarily be men of intelligence as well as of high Christian character.

The Warden thanked Rev. Mr. Locke for his address and advice and hoped they would have the pleasure of hearing him again. Warden McKenzie then addressed the Council, welcoming them at the sessions, and although there was a fairly heavy docket, he thought everything would run smoothly and harmoniously and would conclude before the week ended.

It is indeed with pleasure that I greet you at this mid-year session of the County Council. I trust that you have all returned enjoying the best of health and prepared to transact the business coming before you in the most intelligent manner.

At the request of Mr. Squire, Deputy Minister of Highways, your Warden, Mr. Holm, Chairman of the County Roads Committee, Mr. Johnston, County Road Superintendent, and Mr. Parker, County Treasurer, met with his engineering staff and several members of the Advisory Committee, in Toronto on the 28th ultimo.

The death of Mr. Gilbert McEachern, a former Reeve of the Township of Egremont, and a much respected member of this County Council, came as a shock to those who were associated with him for some years, and had learned to esteem him for his estimable qualities of head and heart.

Agriculture Although the early part of the season has been somewhat cold and backward, the recent warmth and copious rains have wrought a welcome transformation, and the fields now present an encouraging appearance, clothed in a rich garment of green, and we look forward with confidence that He who has given us the seed time and promised that "Harvest shall not fail" will bid mother earth yield her increase and provide a bountiful harvest which would gladden the hearts of all classes of our citizens.

Equalization of Assessment The report of the Finance Committee respecting the equalization of the assessment of the various municipalities for county purposes having been adopted by the County Council at the January Session, it will be therefore necessary at this session to pass a by-law to confirm this equalization and also a by-law to strike a rate to provide for the expenditure of 1926.

Finances In accordance with a resolution passed at last session, a by-law will be submitted authorizing the issue of debentures to providing sufficient funds to meet the expenditures on the Provincial Highways. As this is the financial session of the year, the treasurer will attend and present the estimates of amounts necessary to be raised for the expenditures of the following year, and I would again urge the various committees the absolute necessity of keeping within the amounts appropriated.

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from the Highway Department a copy of a standard by-law for our guidance, and maps will be submitted for your consideration.

An act to amend the Highway Improvement Laws, which was passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, and which will come into force at a date to be named by the Lieutenant-Governor by proclamation, makes some very radical changes in our existing highway scheme. One effect will be (quoting the clause of the Act)

"Where a street in any urban municipality not separated from the county, is an extension of or connects different portions of roads included in County Road Systems, the Council of the County shall include in the county road system the construction or improvement of the roadway on such street to the extent of twenty feet, and shall assume the cost thereof."

All agreements between urban municipalities and the County, respecting such extensions, shall be approved by the Minister of Highways. The County Roads Committee and the Suburban Area Commission will no doubt submit reports outlining the work laid out for the present season.

History of the County I understand that your committee appointed to compile a history of the county are making good progress, having already received many valuable papers from various sections of the county. I would respectfully urge upon the members of the County Council, the importance of the co-operation in the work.

In conclusion, gentlemen, I trust that all your deliberations may be tempered by the spirit of harmony and that fair play to each other and to every part of the County may dominate all your discussions and decisions during the session.

BORROWED PHRASES

(Stratford Beacon-Herald) Who was the original author of the phrase about government "of the people, by the people, for the people?"
