After the death of her husband, Mrs. Sugg came to reside with her daughter, Mrs. Stephen Seaman who was faithful in caring for her in her declining years. She leaves to mourn her demise, Mrs. T. R. Tebe, Alberta, Mrs. S. Seaman, Holstein, Mrs. Huzemeyer, Saskatoon, Mrs. Rowland, Alberta, George Sugg, Alberta, Richard Sugg and Mrs. J. Veach predeceased her. She also leaves one sister, Mrs. Goodman of Brantford and one brother, Mr. Robert Morrell of Montrose. The funeral took place on Monday, the 22nd, Rev. L. E. West conducting the services. Interment took place in Clifford cemetery.
