## Now They Got The Tigers Playing The "Moaners" Too!



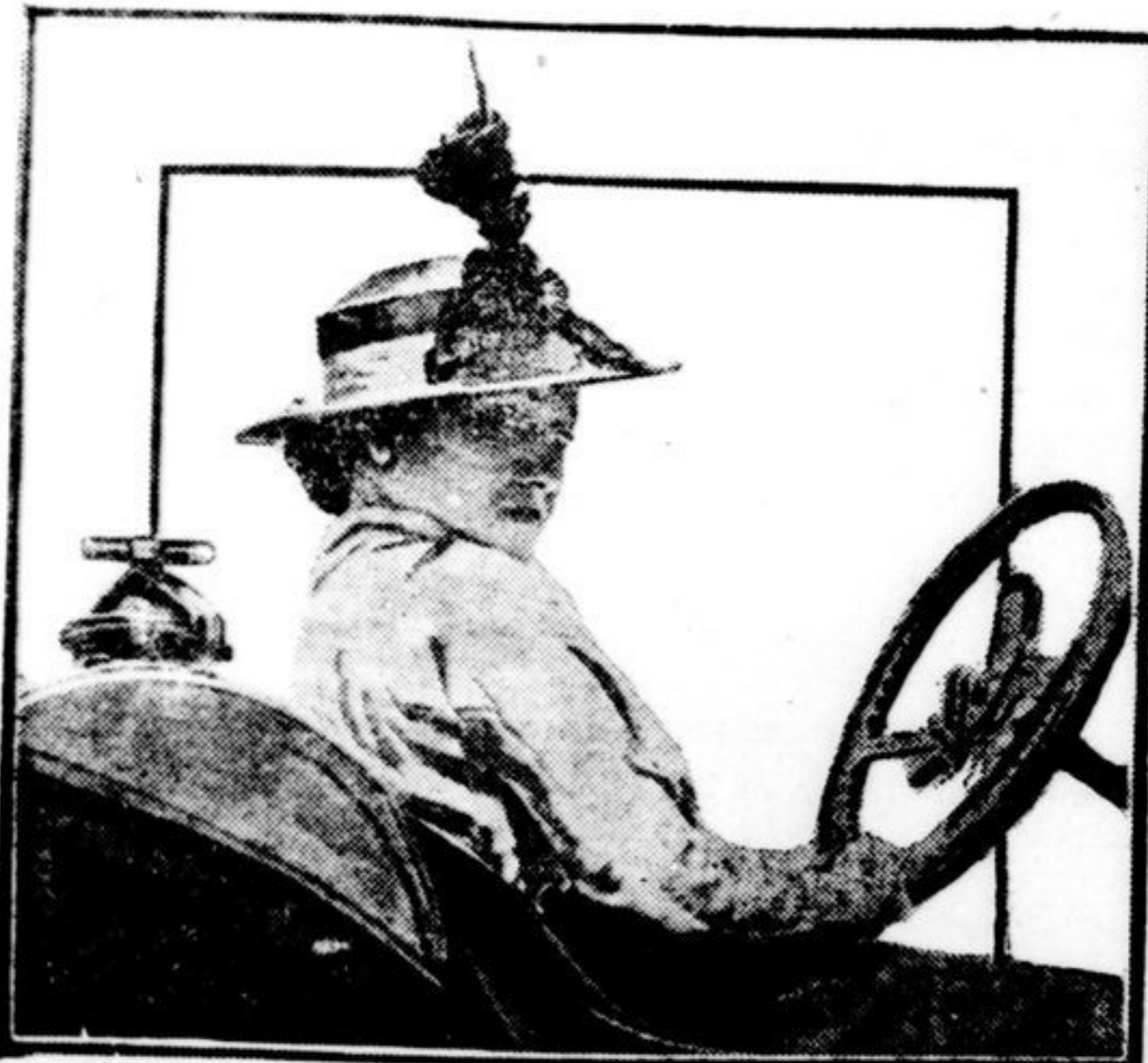

## Entire Dress Of Exquisite Lace Made By Hand



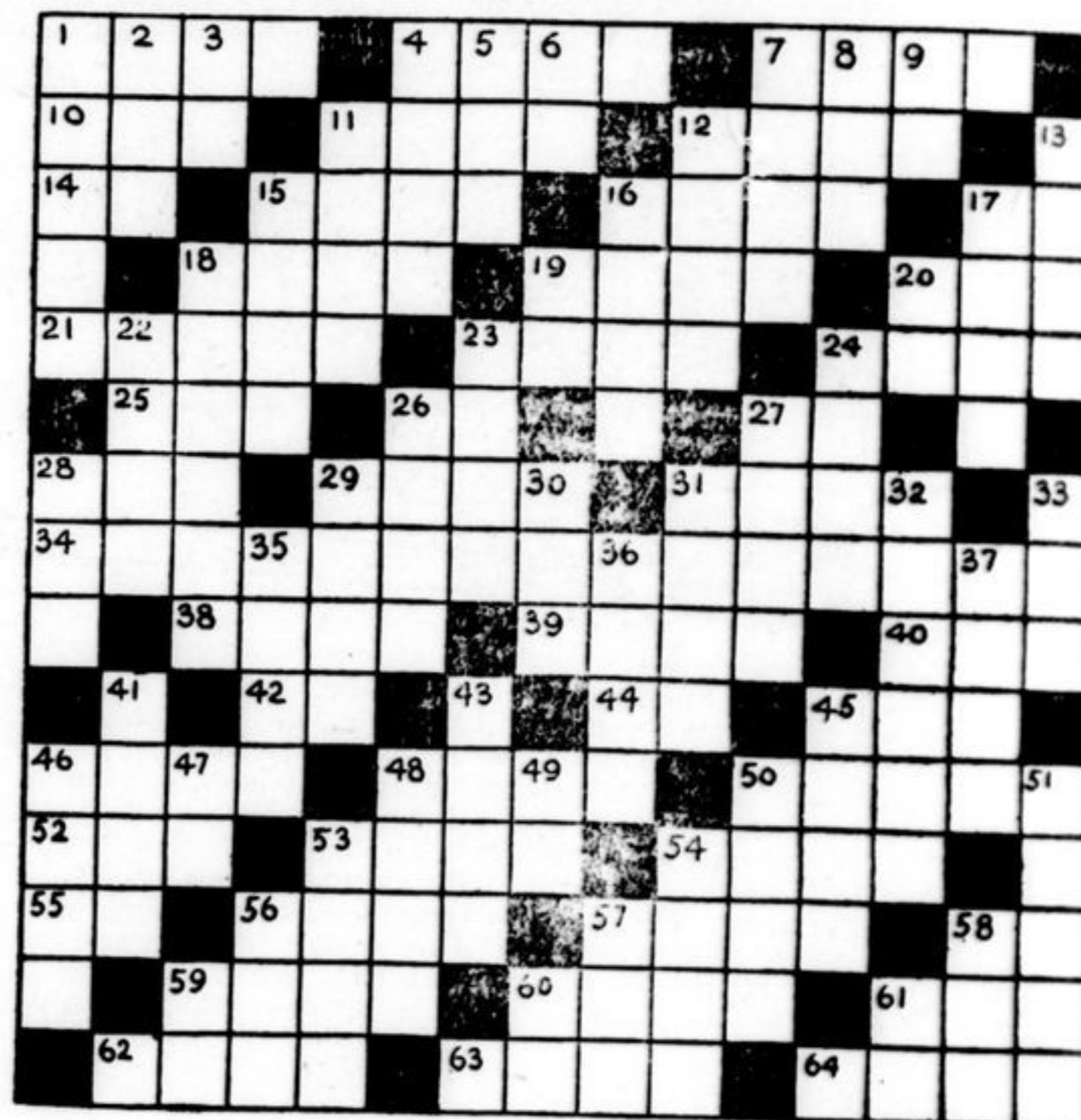

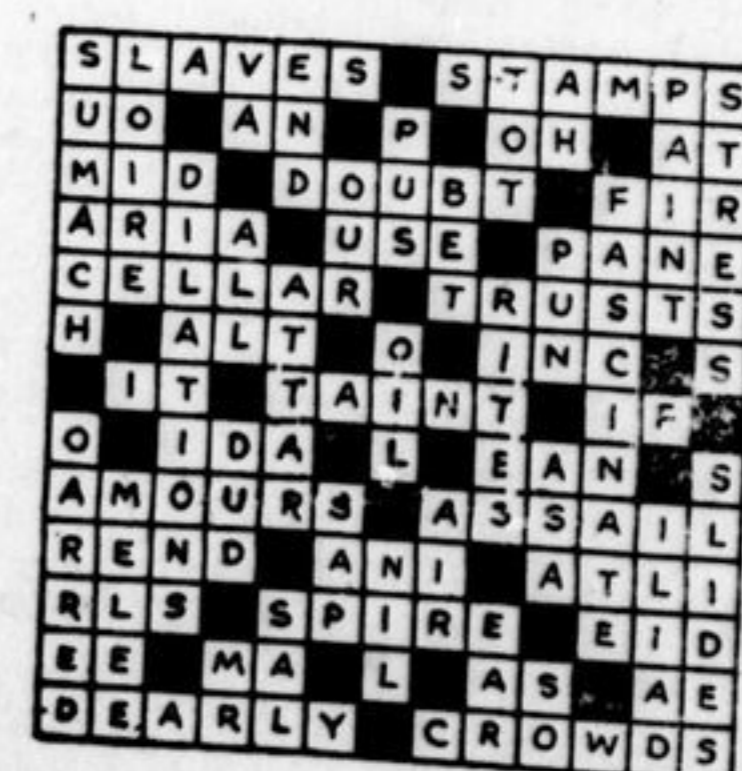
