"One Tooth" Difference Between Jointed Twins



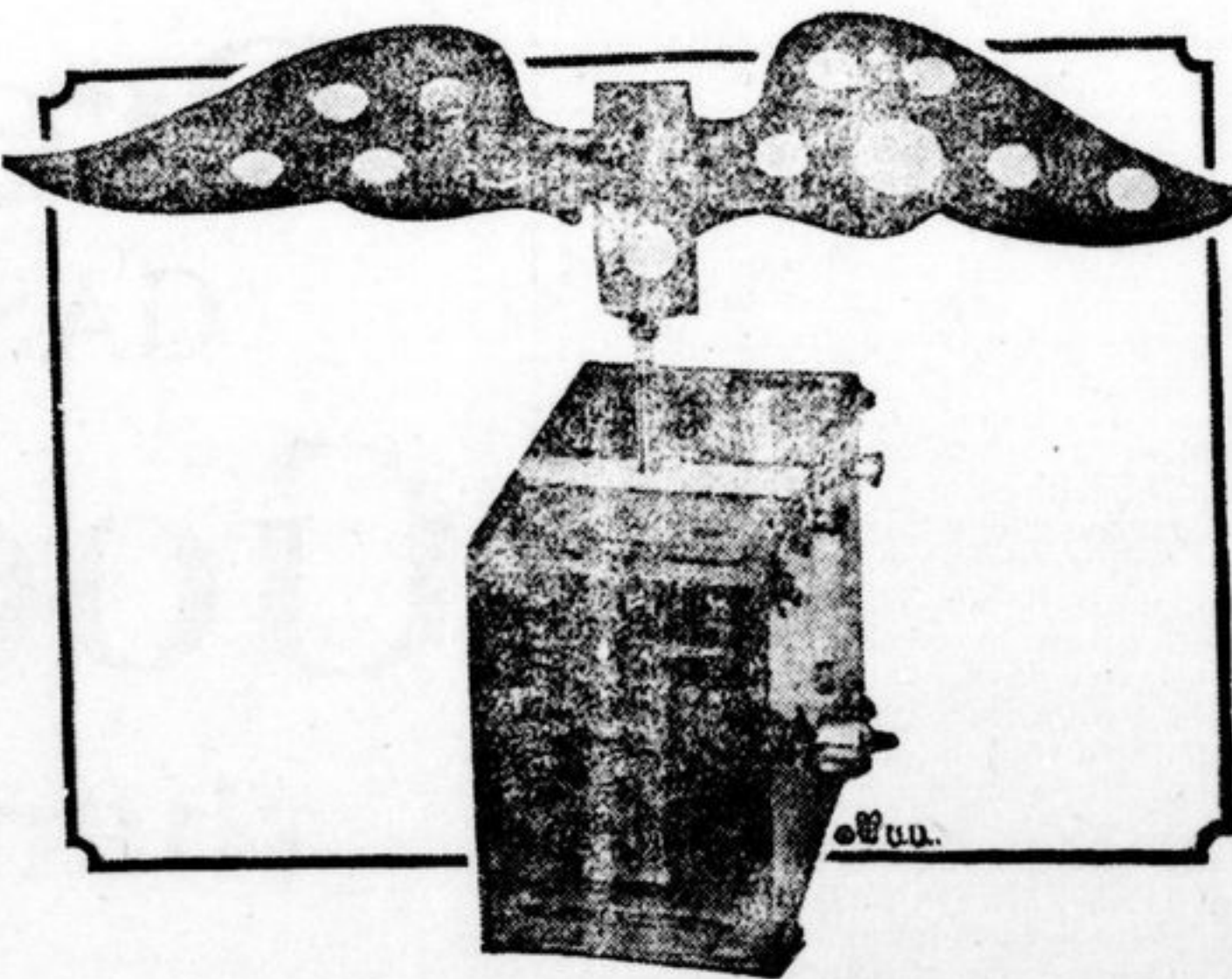

A "Lark Mill" That Dooms The Song Of The Lark



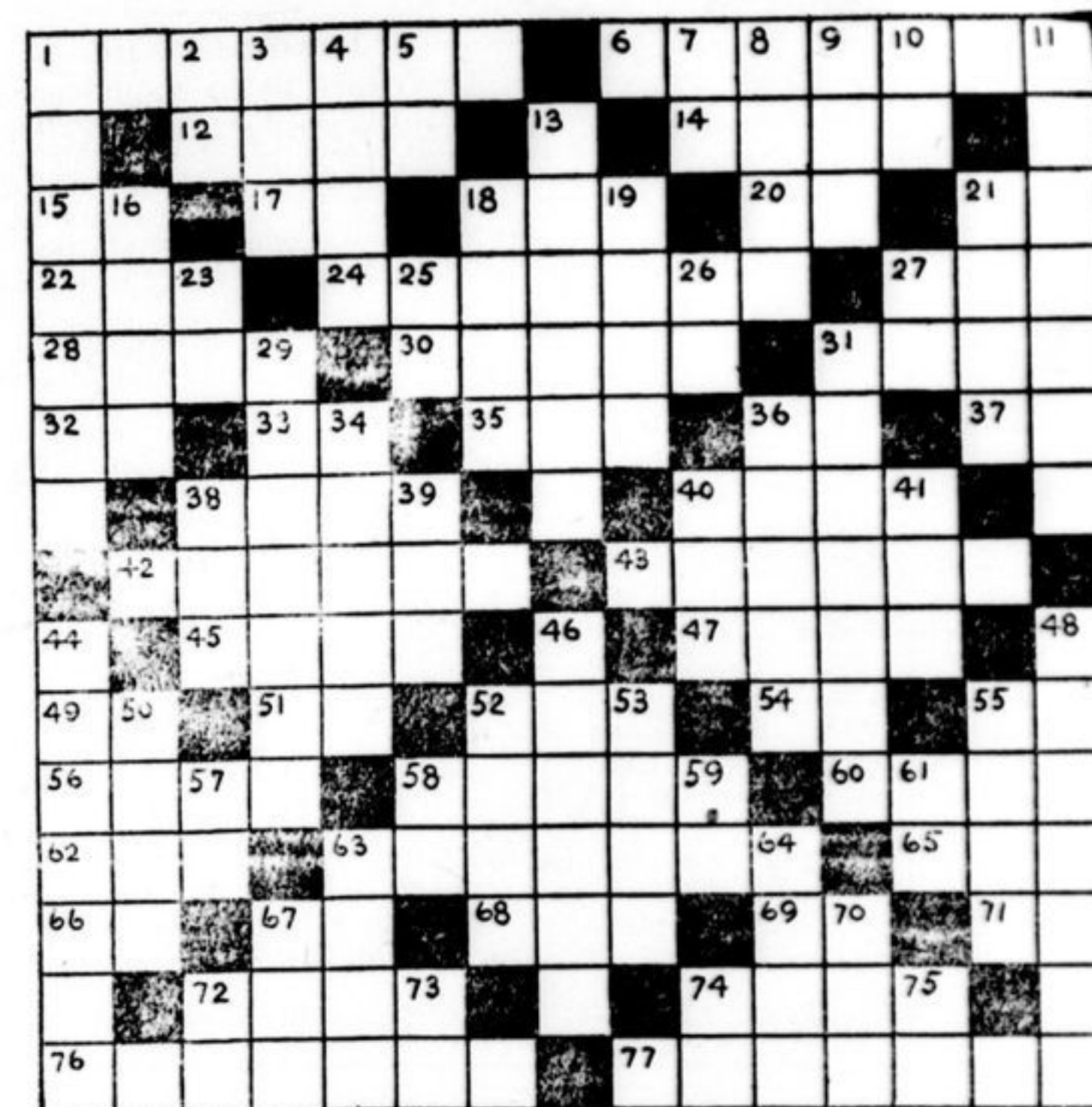

Ford's Commercial "Air Line" Proves Success



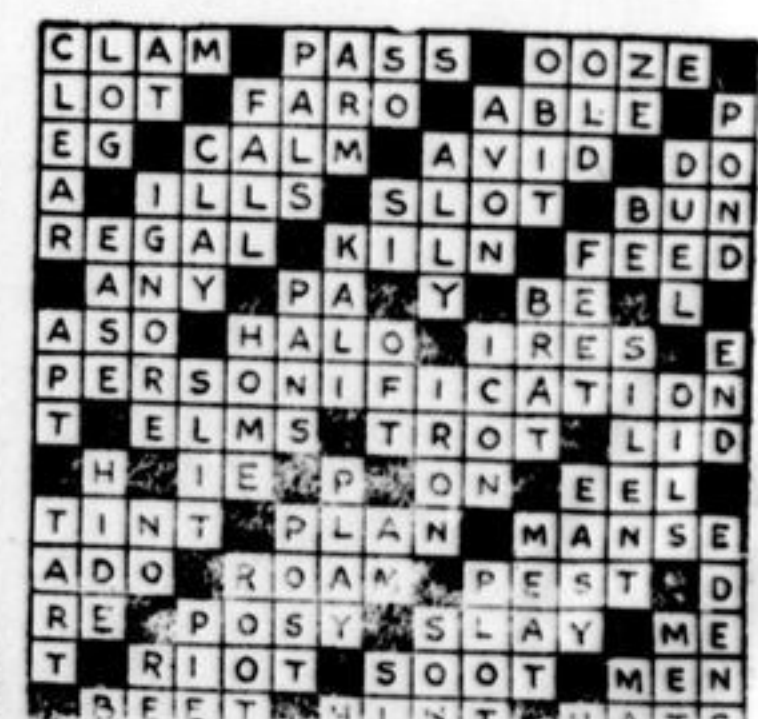
