M. L. S. asks: "How long should dry cells which are used on the filaments of UV199s last? Also, will these tubes be damaged if more than 100 volts is used on the plates?"

Ans.—With two such tubes, you should get about two months of normal use out of the usual No. 6 dry cells. For short intervals, a higher plate voltage would not hurt the tubes.
