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DIED IN TORONTO FOLLOWING OPERATION

Miss Florence C. McKinnon, Born at Rocky Saugeen, Was Well-Known to Many in Durham and Vicinity.

The funeral of Miss Florence C. McKinnon, daughter of Mrs. McKinnon and the late John McKinnon, who died at the Victoria Memorial Hospital, Toronto, on Wednesday of last week, was held Monday afternoon to the Rocky Saugeen cemetery.

Miss McKinnon, who was twenty-three years of age, was born at Rocky Saugeen, but the family moved West to Castor, Alberta, eighteen years ago.

Following a service at Toronto, conducted by her former pastor, Rev. Mr. Anderson of Burlington, the remains were brought to Durham on Saturday last and taken to the home of her uncle, Mr. Alex. Fletcher, from whose home the funeral was held Monday afternoon to the Rocky Saugeen cemetery.

JACOB LEVINE DEAD AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Passed Away Early Monday Morning in Mount Forest Hospital Following Week's Illness.—Interment Took Place in Chicago Yesterday.

The news Monday of the death at 6 o'clock that morning in the Mount Forest Hospital of Mr. Jacob Levine was a great shock to numerous friends of the family here, none of whom knew he had been ill.

A week ago Sunday, Mr. Levine complained of a soreness in one of his shoulders, and despite prompt medical treatment, on Thursday his condition became so serious that he was admitted to the hospital suffering from double pneumonia, and while he showed signs of improvement at times, his physical strength was not equal to the demands of his illness, and he passed away at 6 o'clock on Sunday morning.

Mr. Levine, who was 58 years of age, was born in Minsk, Russia, and came to Canada 30 years ago, living for a time in Toronto and other places in Ontario.

Mr. Levine was a member of the I. O. O. F. here, and following receipt of the news of his death, four of the brethren, Messrs. A. Bell, W. C. Vollett, A. C. Kinnee and J. F. Irwin left immediately for Mount Forest where they, with two members of the Mount Forest lodge, were pall bearers at the funeral which left by motor to Toronto from where the remains were taken to Chicago for interment, on the train leaving the Union Station at 6 p. m.

Arriving at Chicago at 8 a. m., the funeral was held yesterday afternoon from the Weinstein Chapel, 3646 West Roosevelt Road, to Valley Cemetery, interment being made under I. O. O. F. auspices under arrangements made by the Durham Lodge.

Simeon Wilder Dead in 65th Year - Lifelong Resident of Egremont Township, and Vicinity. Passed Away Thursday.

Simeon Wilder, a lifelong resident of the Township of Egremont, died on Thursday of last week at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sealey.

Mr. Wilder was born in the vicinity of Wilder's Lake and was a member of the formerly well-known family of that name from whom the lake derived its name.

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EDGAR BIRR KILLED; MEETS SUDDEN DEATH

Expired Two Hours After Admission to Durham Hospital Suffering From Fractured Skull Received While Working on County Road at Hutten Hill.

Edgar Birr, son of Mr. August Birr of Normanby, about two miles south-east of Hanover, was so badly injured Saturday afternoon last when he was struck on the head by a piece of rock from a blast that he died two hours after his admission to the Durham Red Cross Memorial Hospital.

So far as The Chronicle can find out, the County roads gang, under foreman Joseph Whiteman, was blasting out a rock at the top of Hutten Hill west of town preparatory to cutting down the grade. The young man was standing about seventy-five yards east of where the blast was set and apparently did not notice a good-sized piece of rock which was sent high up in the air when the blast was fired. This descended on top of the young man's head, crushing his skull.

He was immediately rushed to the hospital here and an emergency operation performed, but to no avail, he passing away a couple of hours after the accident, not having regained consciousness. The young man is said to have been of a jolly disposition, was a great favorite with the road gang, and the accident is very much to be regretted.

Saturday night at 9 o'clock, Dr. D. H. Jamieson empanelled a jury to investigate the case, which, after viewing the remains at the Kress undertaking parlor, adjourned till 10 o'clock this Thursday morning.

The jury were: George McKechnie (foreman), V. Hahn, R. Whitmore, G. S. Burnett, A. McClocklin, W. R. Clark, Hugh McDonald, J. McKechnie, Jr., and R. L. Saunders.

The remains were later removed to the home of his father in Normanby, and interment was made Tuesday in the Hanover cemetery. Besides his father, two brothers and three sisters mourn their loss. The young man was a cousin of the Misses Zetta and Mary Birr of town.

KNOX UNITED CHURCH ANNIVERSARY SERVICES

Usual Garden Party Postponed Until Later Date Owing to Tragic Death of Archie MacDonald, Whose Chair in Choir Was Draped in Black.

Knox Presbyterian church, Normanby, held its annual anniversary services on Sunday last, the morning service at 11 o'clock and the evening at 7:30 drawing full houses, many being forced to stand.

The services were in charge of the Rev. Wallace Johnstone of Holstein whose morning text was "Conversion." In the evening, his text was on "Redemption," and the big congregation was highly delighted at his discourse on both occasions.

The pastor, Rev. W. J. Burnett, was in attendance in the evening and during the service, spoke feelingly of the late Archie MacDonald, of his great interest in the church and in the choir especially.

Mr. MacDonald's chair was draped in black in his memory, being further decorated with flowers, a tribute to the affection in which he was held in his own community.

There was a good crowd and an excellent choir, and the Rev. Wallace Johnstone congratulated the congregation on the appearance of their church, newly and fittingly decorated and used for the first time last Sunday.

This year, the usual garden party at Watson's school house, held on the Monday evening following the anniversary services, has been postponed to a later date owing to the deplorable motor car accident last week in which Mr. MacDonald lost his life.

Just when the party will be held we have not been informed, but the committee felt that they simply could not go on with the affair so soon after the death of one of their most prominent members.

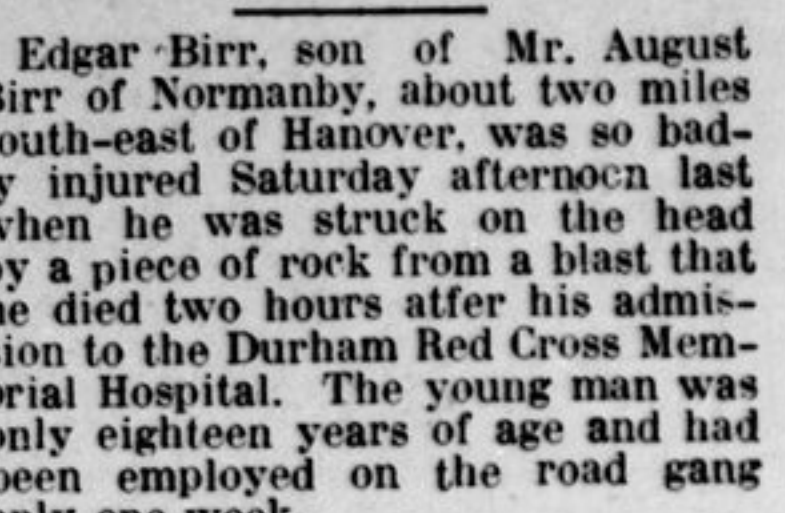
Funeral Held Friday to Maplewood Cemetery - Remains of Late John Sanders Laid to Rest in Cemetery Five Miles South of Town.
