AN INTERNATIONAL SPANISH EVANGELIZATION COMMITTEE has been formed in London, consisting of representatives of the seventeen Protestant missions now carrying on work in Spain. These missions are projected from England, Scotland, Ireland, France, Holland, Germany, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Switzerland and the United States. Through the new committee they hope to co-operate in support of the Federation of Evangelical Churches in Spain. "In a country where evangelical work is so small," says The Christian Century, "every move, however slight, toward an amalgamation of the Protestant forces must be hailed with delight. It is said that churches of Presbyterian, Wesleyan, Anglican, Lutheran and American Methodist antecedents are included in the new body."

THE RECTOR AND PROFESSORS OF THE PONTIFICAL BIBLE Institute in Rome, with the assistance of other scholars and with the Pope's sanction and blessing, have been engaged since 1921 in making a new translation of the Bible from the original texts into Italian. The first volume of this new translation, the Pentateuch, is now issued. It is published in Milan by the Society of Life and Thought (Vita e Pensiero). This version is printed without the Latin text of the Vulgate. The notes are not polemical.

DR. JOHN B. MOTT REPORTS THAT A FRIEND OF THE Y. M. C. A. has given \$40,000 for a modern Association building in Jerusalem. He attached two conditions to his gift: one, that his name should never be known, and the other, that there shall be a tablet erected for the glory of God and in memory of His only begotten Son, our Lord. When this incident was mentioned, a day or two later, another Christian, who, in the same spirit, will not let his name be mentioned, promised to give as much as \$25,000 toward providing a pipe organ for the building. That from this Christian centre overlooking Jerusalem and the Holy Land, there might ascend praises to the Redeemer. His example led another friend to make a gift of \$12,000 to provide chimes for the tower of the building. When these gifts were reported to one of the leading Jewish lawyers in New York, he was so deeply impressed that he promised to secure by April 1 for this building enterprise \$50,000.

AN INTERESTING STATEMENT HAS COME FROM A PARLIAMENTARY committee of Great Britain, which has recently been investigating English prisons for the purpose of finding what denominations are represented there. The prisons investigated represented a population of 100,000 persons, men and women. The investigators made the following discoveries:

Salvation Army, two; Congregationalists, three; Baptists, nine; Methodists, ten; Presbyterians, forty-six; Church of England, 118; Roman Catholic, 247.

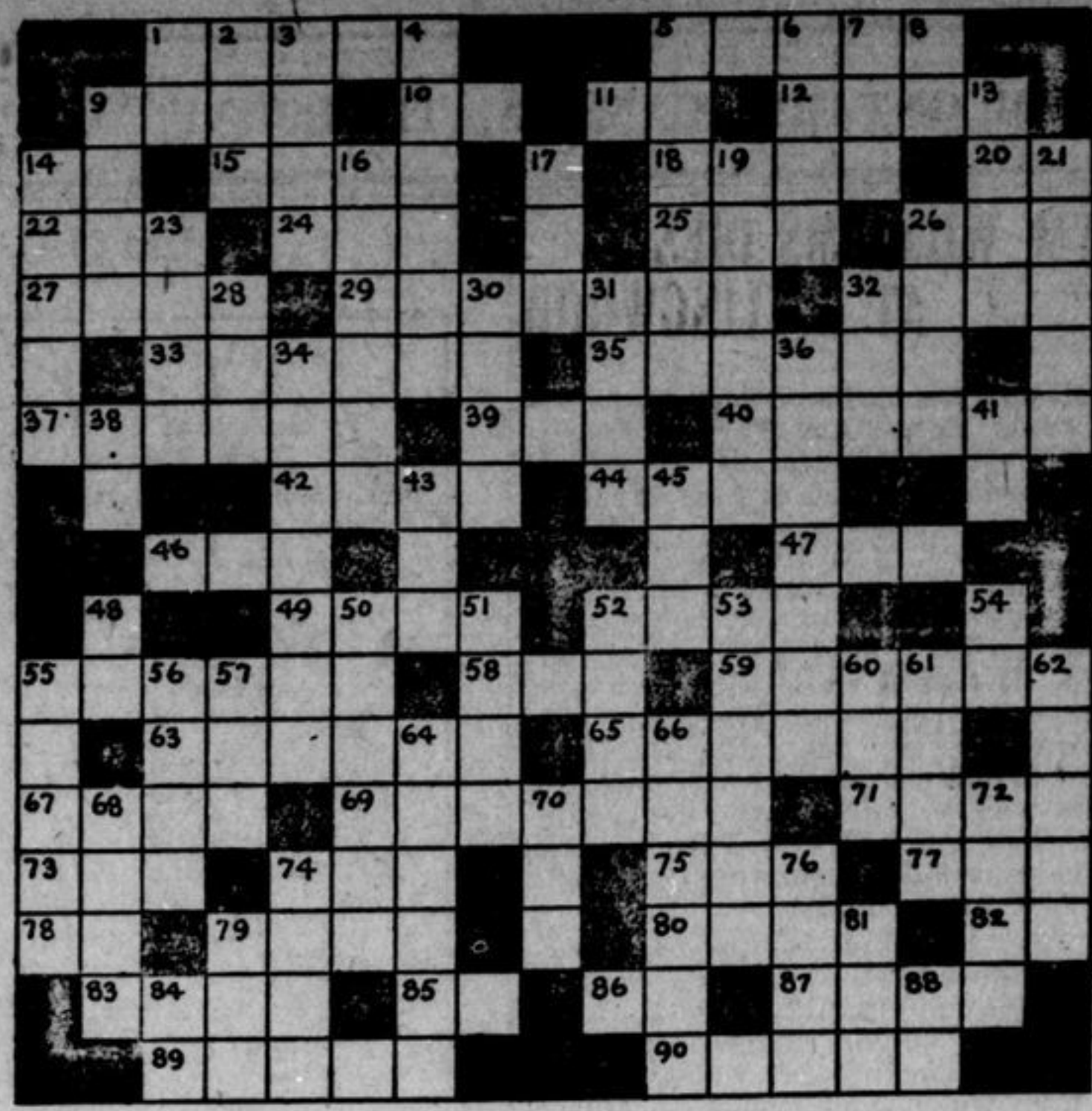
These figures, of course, cast no reflection on the teachings of the various communions, but it is deserving of note that the Salvation Army, though recruited from the lower classes, and having in its ranks many who were once desperate characters, was found to have only two of its members in prison.

MISS E. E. MASSEY, A MISSIONARY OF THE CHURCH MISSIONARY Society working at Fuchow, in the Fukien Province of China, writes of an instance of answered prayer in the deliverance of a demon-possessed woman. Miss Massey was called to go with a Bible woman to pray with a poor woman who was devil-possessed. Her little boy and girl had died within a few days of each other. The woman went to the idols and became possessed. For four months, she had disturbed the neighborhood, and when the missionary arrived, the woman was found chained to a post and had been beaten and burned about the mouth. A number of Christians went with Miss Massey and her helper, and after much prayer, the demon was cast out. Now the woman, her husband and remaining little girl attend church regularly and take every opportunity of "learning the doctrine."—C. M. S.

IN A SERMON PREACHED IN A CITY CHURCH RECENTLY, a minister told the following story. Some years ago, he said, a professor in one of the colleges took the annual report of one of the largest Protestant denominations in Canada and made a study of it. From some calculations, he deduced these facts: It took at that time one minister, seven office-bearers, fifteen Sunday school teachers and over one hundred church members to make one Christian. The point that the preacher wished to stress was that many churches produced a bountiful supply of leaves, but very little fruit. The same thing, he contended, was true of individuals and of nations. If churches exist for the glory of God, and if the chief end of man is to glorify God, surely that end can be accomplished in the bearing of fruit, not leaves. "Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit."

OVER 1,000 WON FOR CHRIST IN PORTO RICO IS THE RESULT of a three months' evangelistic campaign conducted by Rev. and Mrs. Fred J. Peters of The American Baptist Home Missionary Society. In San Lorenzo, 174 were converted. Services everywhere have been attended by people of all social ranks, and the converts include teachers and lawyers. Families have become re-united. A temperance movement has accompanied the revival with the result that still have been closed and their owners brought to realize their dependence upon God. In other localities not visited by the American evangelists, revivals have sprung up to strengthen the churches. In many places, the services have been carried on in the face of persistent and organized opposition.

#### EVILS THAT MENACE SOCIETY

In one of our largest Canadian cities, when six young men were placed on trial for statutory offences, startling revelations were made of the path whereby youthful "butterflies" brought disgrace to themselves and their families, says Rev. J. Phillips Jones, M.A., B.D., Social Service Council of Canada. It was a night of revelry which included childish play on Ferris wheels and merry-go-rounds, followed by a drink called "gin," as the girls told the court. They were also given beer in a room in a downtown hotel. One of the girls is 13 years of age, the other 15.

This raises the question—are we living in a fools' paradise? What of the evils of society that are rampant among us today? For instance, the modern dance-hall! Are our young women properly chaperoned at such places? Are these places frequented by the type that we wish our young men and women to associate with? Serious charges are made against many such places and not without cause. It behooves our fathers and mothers, for the safety of their sons and daughters, to know beyond peradventure that the dance their children delight in, is under proper auspices, with no shadow of doubt as to its moral influence.

Another evil is that of pernicious literature. In spite of all vigilance, trashy magazines and periodicals find their way to our bookstalls. One minister says, "It is coming in by the ton." If so, then a campaign of suppression is the call of the hour. Nothing so inflames the passions and dulls the moral sense as gloating over pictures and sketches that have a salacious suggestion. What is your boy reading? What magazines delight your girl? And not all literature that is even allowed by law is the type your boy and girl should read. What they read, reacts on their lives. I think of a conversation I heard recently by a group of young women at a summer picnic. What were they talking about? Just the things they had been reading—of photoplays and vaudeville artists and the life at "Hollywood." These girls were light, zippy, irresponsible, empty. What they were reading was reacting on their interpretation of life. There is a world of difference between insipidly and so-called Puritanism. There is a wealth of happy, pure ideals for virile men and wholesome young women between these two extremes.

"It's high time someone started to clean things up," said one who knows of conditions. What he referred to was the joyride after the dance. About the evils in question, it was said, "The police knew, and the doctors knew and hospitals knew." What are we to do about them?

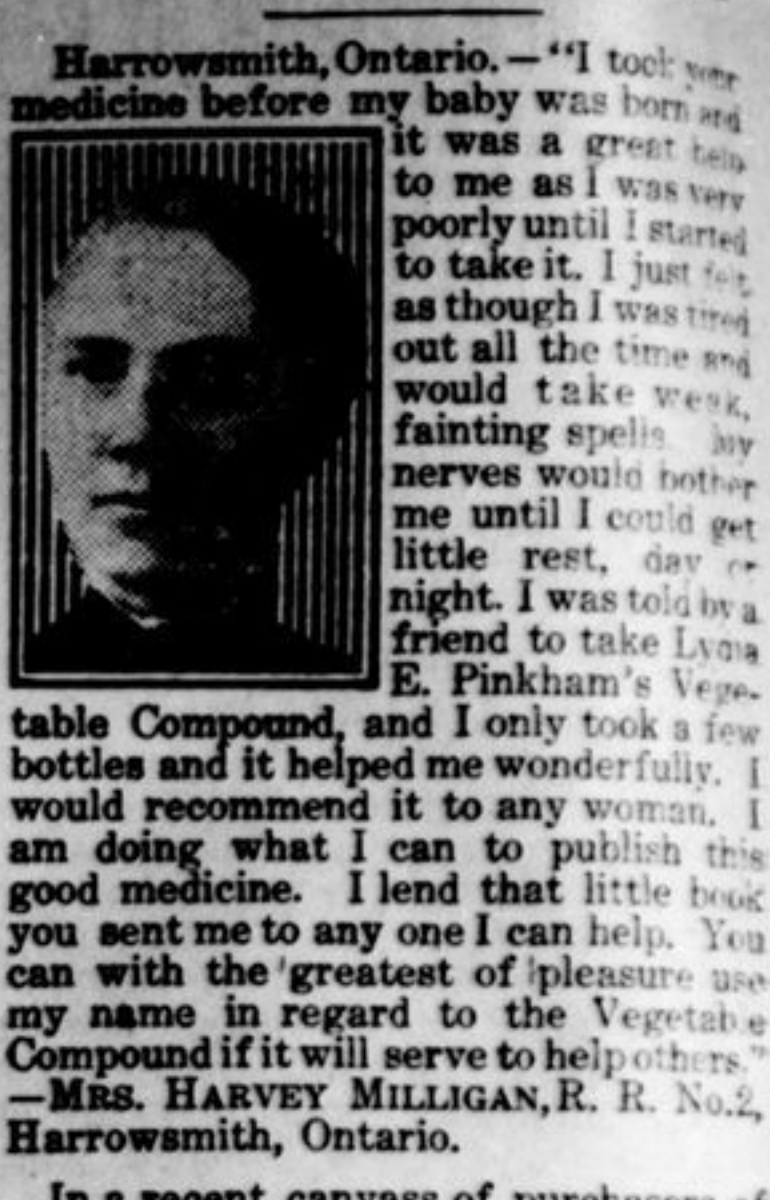
And then there is the orgy of gambling that goes on at the horse races throughout the land. "I won \$200 last week," said a young woman who had been beguiled into the ensnaring evil of betting. "I won \$200!"—she little thought she had lost more than she had won. She had lost her sense of moral values. She had lost the finer idealism of life. She had lost that true perspective which always regards "others." No one wins without someone losing. And the tragedies of lives ruined by gambling would fill volumes.

Whenever our young women, to say nothing of our young men, are thus led on, what shall we say of our future citizens? Are we to raise a race of gamblers? The immoral and deteriorating effects of gambling are beyond question. These and other evils are rampant disease spots in our national life. It behooves all true lovers of our country to arise and wipe them out.
