SANITARY ASPECTS OF FARM WATER SUPPLY

It is a well-known fact that with the introduction of public water supplies in cities and towns which had previously been dependent on domestic wells, the death rate from typhoid fever, the most serious of water-borne diseases, has decreased to a remarkable extent, says A. G. Lochead, Dominion Agricultural Bacteriologist.

In our country districts, however, where the scattered population makes the establishment of a public water supply system impossible, the farmer is forced to depend upon his own domestic source, which, in most cases, the shallow well. That such a well can be a source of positive danger from typhoid, dysentery, diarrhoea and other disorders has been amply proven, but still many farmers do not realize fully the importance of a pure, unpolluted water supply, or the danger to their families and their stock lurking in contaminated water.

The location of the farm well is frequently faulty and denotes a lack of knowledge of the danger to health from such sources of pollution as barnyards, cesspools, privy, manured fields, sink drains etc. Not only should the well be placed at a reasonable distance from such sources of filth, (say 40 to 50 yards) but, also, if possible, on higher ground. The more porous the ground, the greater should be the distance from a contaminating source.

Even when the well is removed from any source of pollution, the ground water should be made to filter through at least 12 to 15 feet of soil before entering the well. Soil tends to remove germs and impurities from surface washings. The water, however, should be made to really filter through the soil by insuring that the sides of the well, for a depth of 12 to 15 feet, are tight and impervious to water. The top, naturally, should be so constructed that no contamination can possibly enter.

Water may be seriously polluted without showing this by its taste or appearance. A bright, sparkling water is by no means a guarantee of a pure supply. When, however, water from a well becomes cloudy or turbid after a heavy rain, there is evidently some defect, for this condition indicates that surface washings are entering without proper filtration.

The Divisions of Bacteriology and Chemistry at the Central Experimental Farm will analyze water samples submitted by farmers living within a reasonable distance. Application for instructions as to taking the sample should first be made.

SUBJECTION OF WEEDS
In a statement on "Effective Methods of Controlling Weeds," Mr. E. S. Hopkins, Dominion Field Husbandman, brings out three salient and important points. The first is that the most effective method of controlling weeds is thorough and frequent cultivation of the land. The second is that the basic principle in killing weeds which have underground rootstocks is to prevent their sending up top or above-ground growth, and the third, the longer the delay in eradicating the weeds, the greater the amount of work that will eventually be necessitated. One other point made by Mr. Hopkins in giving definite advice as to the subjection of couch grass, mustard and other weeds, that cannot be too much emphasized is that it is important to use at all times, clean seed grain, clover and grass seed.

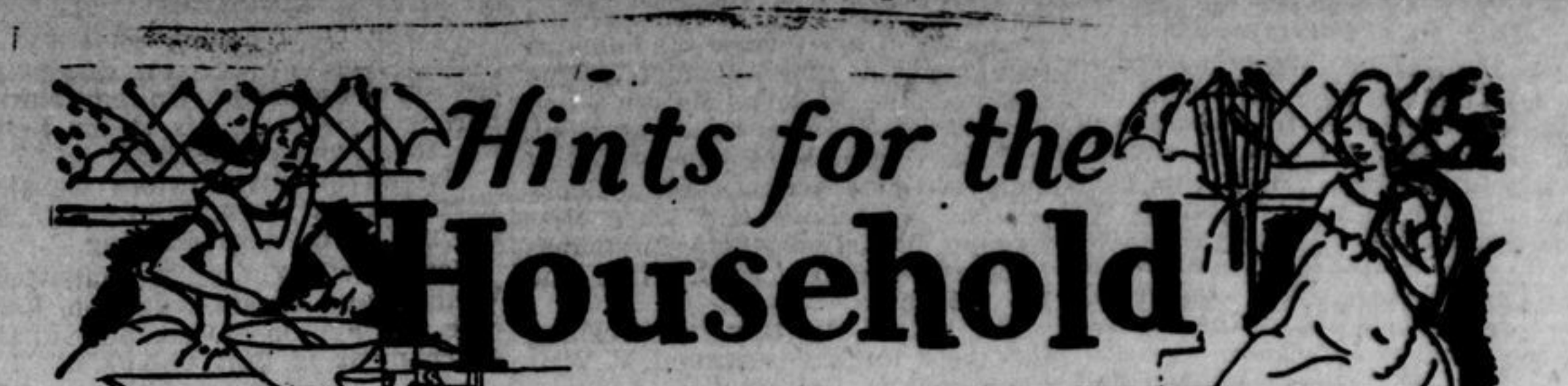

Hints for the Household For August By BETTY WEBSTER

HOUSEHOLD HINTS
Porch Meals
Show your family a good time. Nowadays, young and old crave the outdoors. The porch meal is sure to please all. Of course, some kitchens are so far from the porch that serving a meal on the porch is really work. But, by making use of the old saying—"Let your head save your heels"—the labor can be lessened and the joy and pleasure from so dining will make the housewife feel amply repaid.

COOKING HINTS
Horseradish Sauce
4 tablespoons of cream.
3 tablespoons of horseradish.
1 tablespoon of lemon juice.
Some cayenne pepper.
Method: Whip cream stiff. Add other ingredients slowly and mix well. This is good served with any number of cold meats.

Raspberries in Canteloupe
A refreshing dessert:
Raspberries.
Sugar.
Cantaloupe.
Method: Wash and chill raspberries. Halve the cantaloupe. Fill with berries and chill. Sprinkle powdered sugar with them.

Summer Desserts
A Simple Frozen Dish
Freeze your fruits right in the can for Ice Cream or Salad. This pertains to Peaches, Pears, Pineapples, Cherries, Raspberries, Fruit salad, etc.
Method: Pack can in ordinary pail. Use equal parts of ice and salt. Let it stand 3 hours. Unpack when ready to serve. Dip for a few seconds in hot water. Cut off top of can at one end. Take out fruit. This makes a pretty cylinder of frozen fruit.

Blackberry Pot Pie With Molasses Dip
1 1/2 pints of flour.
2 heaping teaspoons of baking powder.
2 heaping tablespoons of lard.
Little salt.
Milk.
Washed blackberries.
Method: Mix dry ingredients. Stir in milk until mixture is thick enough to drop. Put in pan (iron kettle or preserving kettle preferred). Put a layer of fruit and then a layer of biscuit dough—alternating. Cover with boiling water and let cook 15 to 20 minutes. Serve hot immediately with either hard sauce or molasses dip or both. An easy way to make this is to start it cooking when one first sits down to dinner, and it will be done when ready to serve.

Molasses Dip
1 cup of molasses.
1 heaping tablespoon of butter.
Method: Let it boil thoroughly but not quite as much as for candy. Serve hot.
