# Old "Tote" Methods

There were only a few settlers along the road to Alpena at that time. The road was what was then known as a "tote" road, and where it turned south toward the Farrier homestead, it dwindled to a mere trail. Along this old trail for a distance of three miles, Mr. Farrier walked, carrying a sewing machine on his back when they first moved here. The nearest post office was at Alpena where they had to go to mail a letter or get food. Many of foot, a distance of thirty miles, which was made in two days.
