THE BRITISH WEEKLY RECORDS THAT ONE YOUTHFUL speaker from Cambridge at the recent session of the Church Congress summed up his indictment against the Church in these words: "We are darkly and deeply suspicious that the church is being run by the middle-aged for the benefit of the middle-aged, and until the misunderstanding is cleared up, there is no chance of the church really recapturing the mind of youth." And in discussing the arraignment, the periodical points out that the church is but the individual multiplied. She cannot escape the temptations of her members. She, too, must stand on guard against the things that darken the vision and numb the purpose. She must not be too proud to listen to counsel, even when it comes from those who may scarcely seem as yet to have earned the right to speak. Young eyes often see clearly what is right. It is their glory that they have not yet taken the measure of what is possible. And all the churches will do well to take their young people as much as possible into counsel and confidence. In most churches, there is an eager desire to see young people more generally in office, and to have no body of office-bearers without at least its representatives of the younger point of view. These things may help to save the church from stiffening and from withering. Yet there is a deeper secret—the cultivation, among Christian folk of all ages, of the spirit of discipleship. For, after all, the task of the church is not to interpret the mind of middle age, nor even that of youth, but to interpret and uphold the mind of Christ. That is high above us all and far ahead of us all. And the plain truth is that the young have no time to waste in rebuking the old, nor the old in censuring the young, when we are all alike so far behind that Supreme Example.

Let it pass.

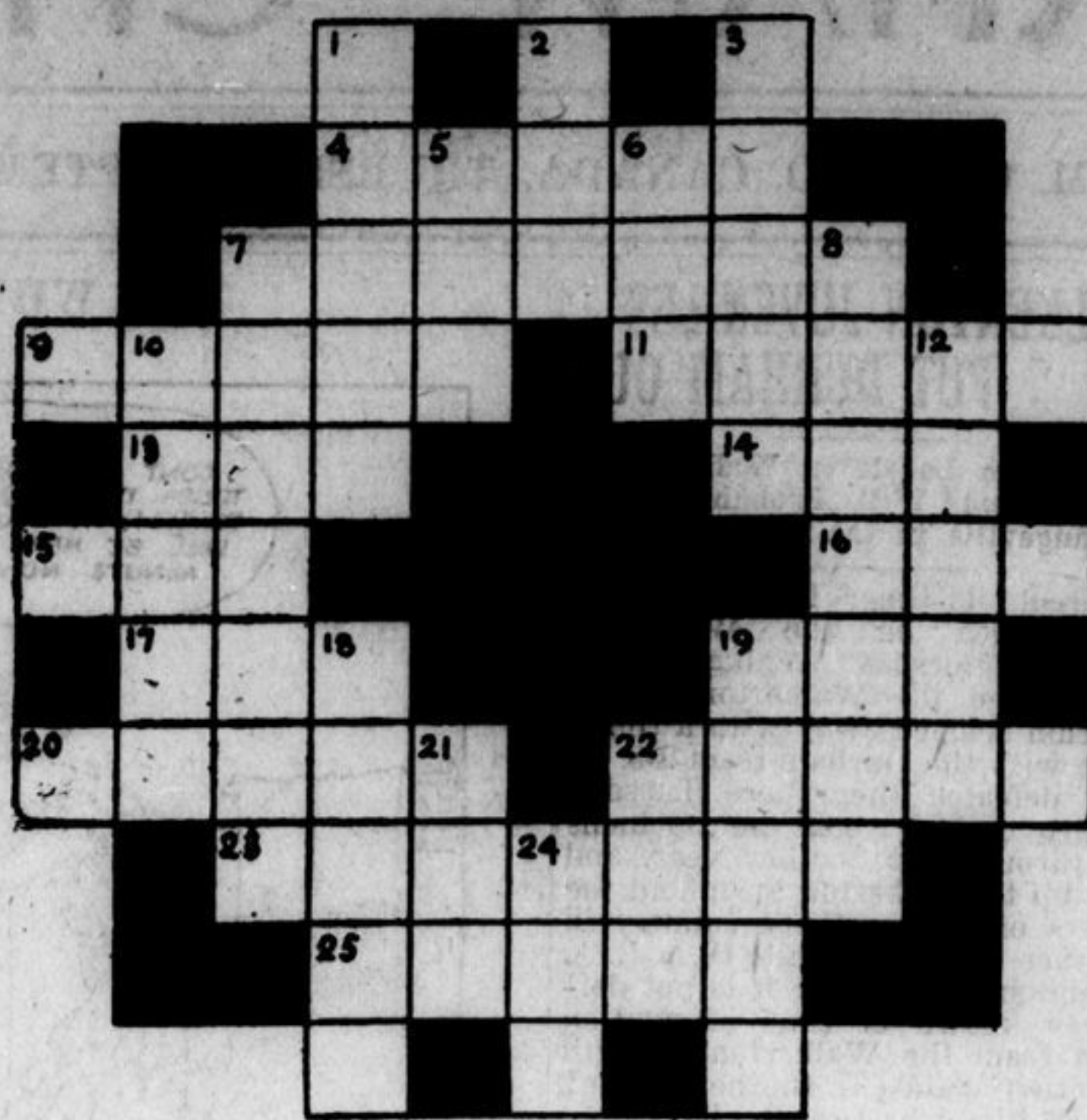
AMONG THE DECISIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS ARRIVED at by the Congress for Christian Work in South America, which held its sessions recently in Montevideo, perhaps there was no more significant suggestion made to the several component denominations than that all Protestant churches be named "The Evangelical Church of Brazil," or of Chile, or other national division within which it is located; and that the North American denominational name, "Presbyterian," "Methodist," etc., be placed underneath in parenthesis. This is in line with the policy of developing a Protestant church within each republic, and with a policy of not continuing in other lands those subdivisions of evangelical Christianity which have their foundation back in the history of another age and civilization. It is looking towards the day of a united Protestantism.

THERE IS A GRAVE IN A LONDON CEMETERY WHICH IS still sometimes visited by those who remember. A stone is over it erected by a great preacher to the memory of a dearly-loved wife. But when he came to prepare the inscription, he could not write "Died." He chose the word "Ascended." When he himself passed over, those who were left remembered his chosen word and used it of himself: "Joseph Parker. Born April 9th, 1830. Ascended, November 28th, 1902."

That is how some souls are able to think who have seen the end of their faith, the ultimate meaning of their redemption. But they would not have been so sure of their own upward track if they had not seen their Lord go up before them.—British Weekly.

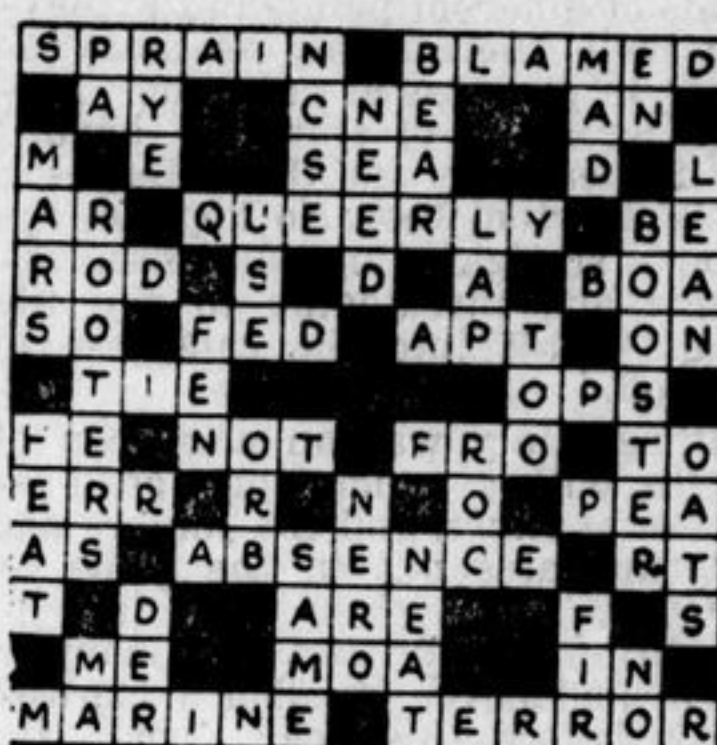

GREY HOLDS LEAD IN GRADING LISTS

Stands at Top of Past Two Weeks.—Improvement in Kent.

The Globe Says: Grey County, which has consistently been near the top in the grading list among counties shipping over 500 hogs per week, was again at the top during the past two weeks. The government graders' figures for the last week in August show Grey leading with 33 per cent selects out of a total shipment of 1,065. For that week, Huron, which shipped 1,219, secured second place with 31 per cent selects, and Dufferin, which shipped 688, third, was 30 per cent. For the first week in September, Grey retained its lead, this time with 35 per cent, while Waterloo moved up into second place with 34 per cent. Huron, Dufferin and Oxford were tied for third place with 33 per cent. Since with 32 per cent on a shipment of 583, which is much below the average for the county, and Perth, with 31 per cent on a shipment of 1,853 were also in the first flight.

The difficulty of judging county standings from one week's grading is illustrated by figures for Oxford, which in the last week of August turned out 25 per cent selects, and in the following week 33, and for Elgin, which had 15 per cent one week and 19 the next. These fluctuations are minor, however, and if the figures are followed for only a few weeks, a good general idea may be obtained.

The figures for the past few weeks seem to indicate considerable improvement upon the part of Kent. For some months, the average for this county ran from 5 to 8 per cent, but during the past four weeks, it has ranged from 9.5 to 13. Ship-

ments for the Province as a whole are rather light, although not so much as during the harvest rush.

Rev. Mr. McCullough of Kincairdine preached a very able sermon. Rev. Mr. Wilson of Salem reported the steps leading up to the extending of the call to Mr. Smith to fill the vacancy caused by Rev. Mr. A. Graham's removal to Grande Prairie, Alberta. United church. Rev. Mr. Sinclair read the ordination service. Rev. T. Bird Holland of the Anglican church brought greetings from the Ministerial Association. After meeting Rev. and Mrs. Smith, the congregation passed into the school room. A bountiful lunch was then served by the ladies, and a pleasant hour was spent.

On Sunday morning, Rev. Mr. Smith preached, taking for his text, Exodus 3:3, emphasizing particularly, the "burning bush," the symbol of Presbyterianism. In the evening he gave a heart-to-heart talk from pastor to his congregation. On both occasions, a well-filled church welcomed Rev. Smith.
