BRITAIN'S KING AND QUEEN SPEND THEIR FIRST EVENING AT A PICTURE SHOW

The King and Queen just spent their first evening in a picture palace recently. For several years past, the Royal Family has interested itself in the movies, all command performances have been given at Balmoral and elsewhere in private rooms specially fitted up for the occasion with a small screen, a portable projector and an orchestra composed of a piano and a few strings. The Prince of Wales has sponsored the British cinema as patron, star and spectator in one. The King and Queen have played their parts in a hundred capitals.

But for the first time, their Majesties attended a public performance in a picture-house and sat amongst the audience in a box cunningly constructed with anterooms and connecting passages from the back rows of the stalls.

A film reproduction of the attack on Zebrugge in 1918, made with great care and vigor by a British Admiralty, and fully approved by the Admiralty, was the core of the entertainment, and there followed an animated cartoon of Bonzo, the study dog, and a number of scenes of the arrival of the King and Queen at the theatre just one hour and thirty minutes earlier.

The best seats, according to the custom of the movies, being placed as far as possible from the screen, their Majesties enjoyed for at least

one evening of their lives, an undisturbed and unaccustomed view of the Englishman's back registering pleasure in seats which cost a guinea a piece and which could have been sold a dozen times over before the performance began.

"Zebrugge" will be shown at the Veterans' Star Theatre for three days—September 17, 18 and 19.

THE NEW HYDRO CHAIRMAN

Hon. Howard Ferguson is to be congratulated in his selection of a chairman of the Hydro Commission to succeed the late Sir Adam Beck. In choosing Charles A. Magrath, Chairman of the Canadian section of the Internal Waterways Commission, Mr. Ferguson has secured a big man and a man in whose integrity and ability the people of Ontario will have confidence.

As chairman of the International Waterways Commission, Mr. Magrath has had experience with many of the very problems with which he will have to wrestle on the hydro board. He has already in his present position had to study the St. Lawrence waterways problem, which is the most pressing immediate question under advisement. Mr. Magrath, in his long public experience, both in Western Canada and in the East, has shown himself a man of sound common sense, cautious and careful until he was convinced on a question, and then a man of courage and action.

Mr. Magrath was Canadian fuel

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controller during the war. Those who were in touch with the situation at Ottawa at the time appreciate the work done by Mr. Magrath. If it had not been for his diplomacy and tact, as well as ability in dealing with Washington, Canada would not have fared as well during those winters when there was a shortage of coal. Mr. Magrath has a heavy undertaking ahead of him. He succeeds a man of exceptional ability and great driving force, and he takes hold at a rather critical period in the history of hydro.

C. A. Maguire, ex-mayor of Toronto, is the other appointee to the board. Mr. Maguire is an enthus-

iastic public ownership man and always a supporter of the policies of Sir Adam, although a Liberal in politics. His selection will have the approval of the municipalities of the province, whose champion he has been on many occasions.—London Free Press.

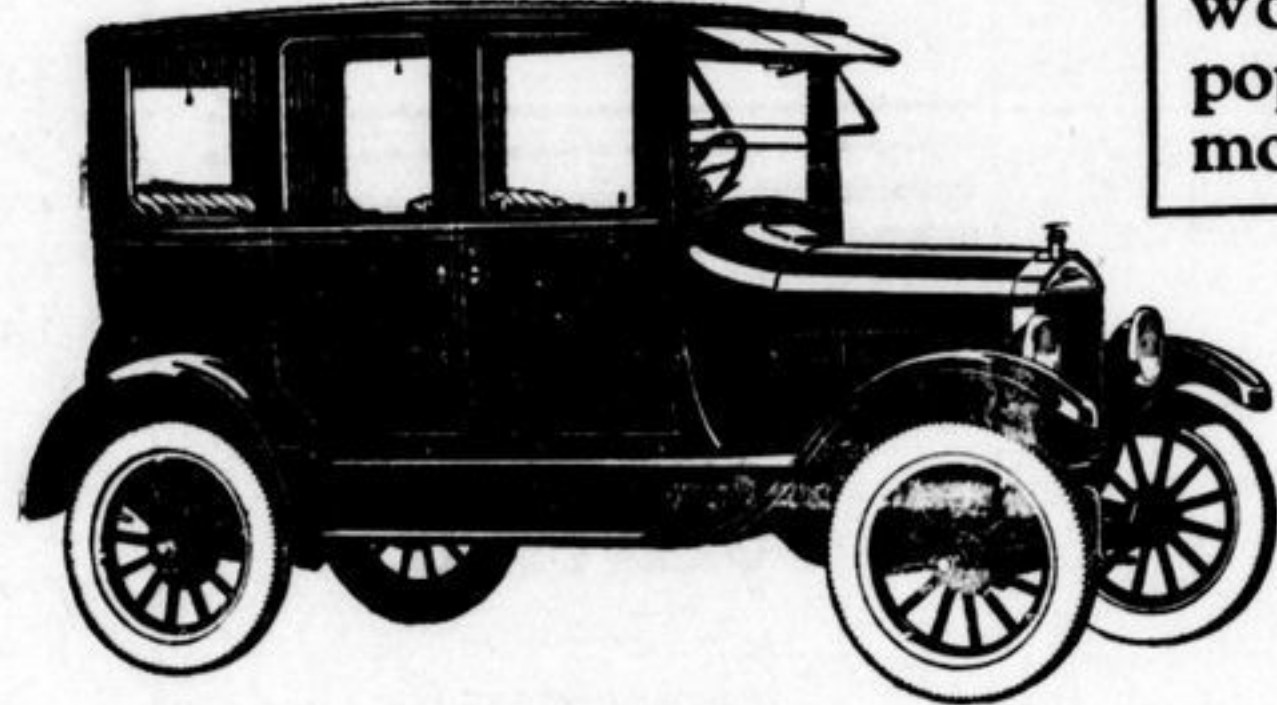

The prolonged dry spell has left the woods unusually dry. The tourists and campers should be doubly careful just at this time.—Peterboro Examiner.

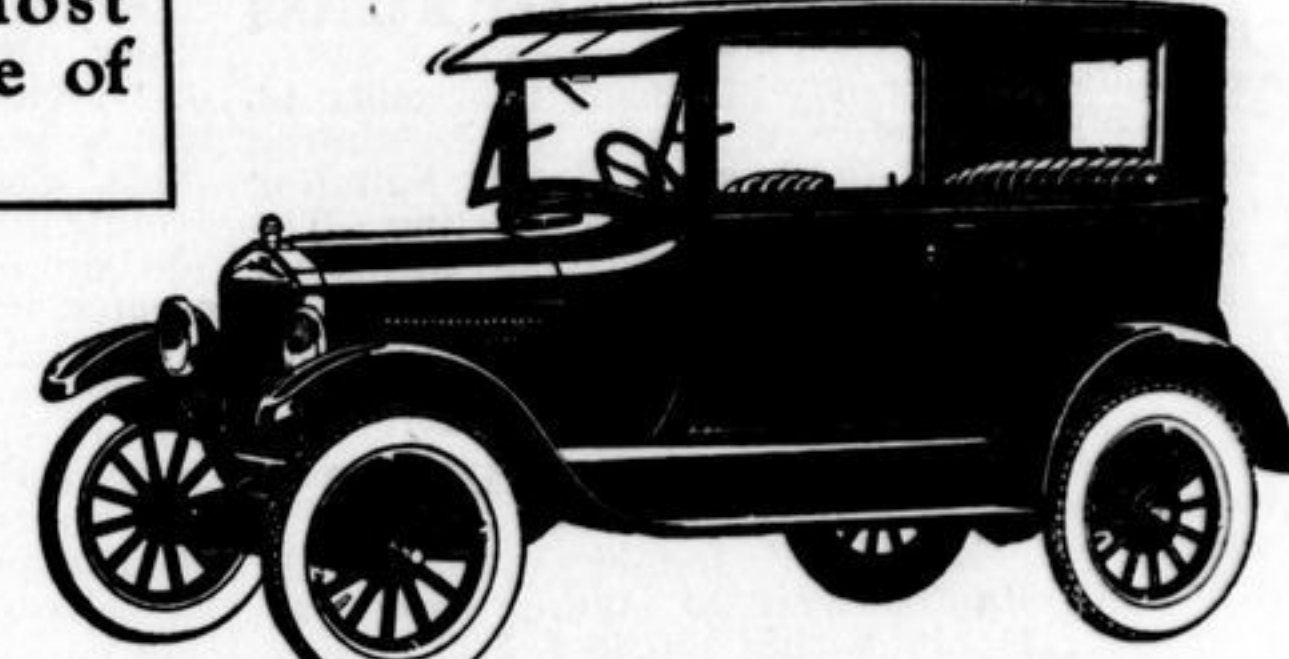
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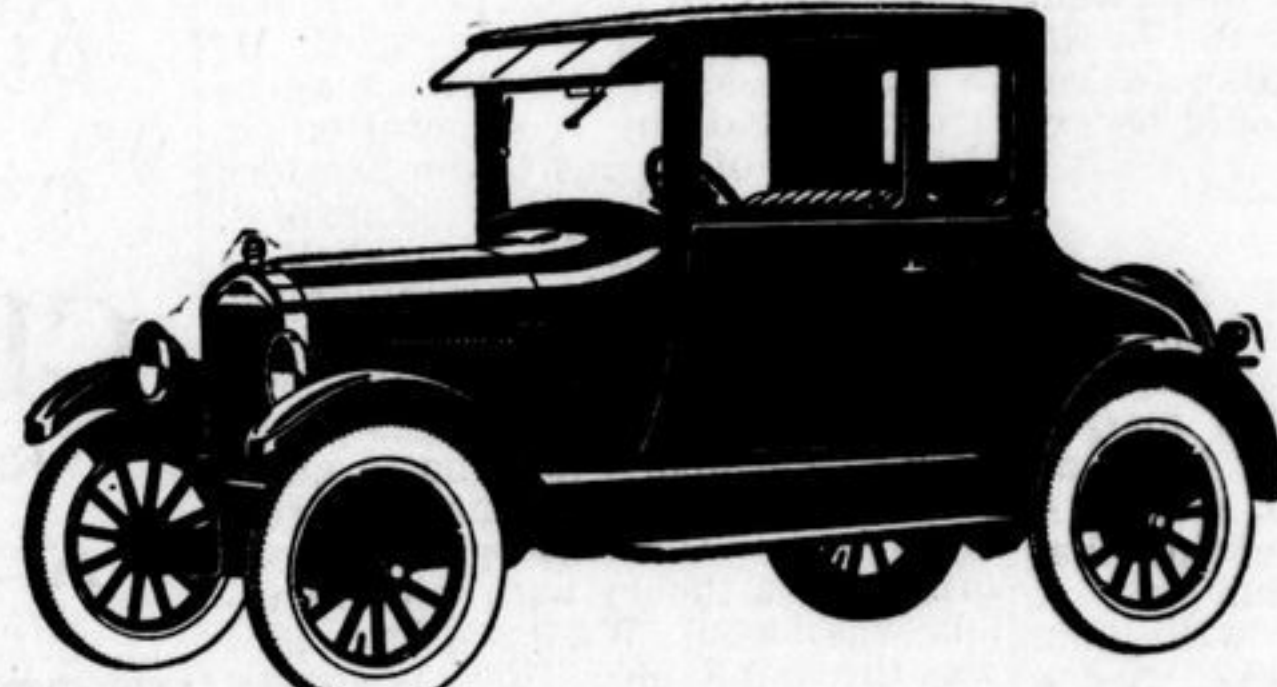
