On Friday last, Mr. John Vollett had quite a tumble from which he will feel the effects for some time. He was working on a scaffold venturing a house for Councillor Moran when the underpinning gave way, and he was precipitated from his position near the top of the building. Some of the timbers fell on him, and he sustained a sore gash or two on the head.

Mr. William Livingston left on Friday last for Flesherton where he has been transferred as cashier of the new branch of the Standard Bank opened up in that place.

Mr. B. B. Moore of Victoria, B. C., is visiting with friends here, and we had a brief interview with him last week.

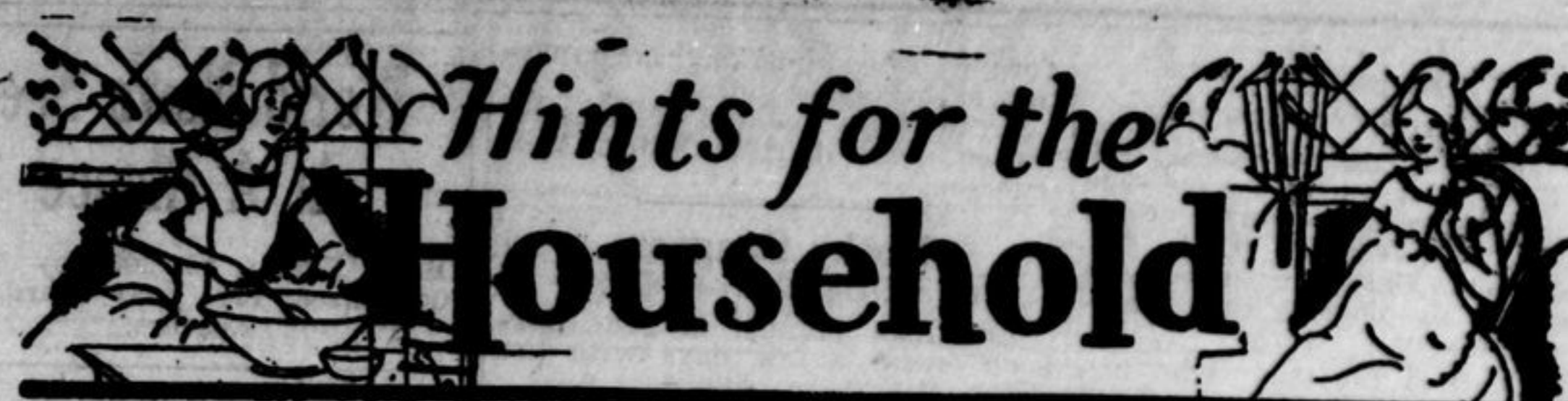

Hints for the Household

For September

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To clean soiled wall paper—take a clean duster and rub in dry powdered borax. Then rub it over soiled spots on paper.

To Take Off Lacquer

When freshening a brass bed where part of the lacquer has worn off, the rest of the lacquer may be removed by sponging with alcohol.

COOKING HINTS

Serve New Beets Prettily and Differently

Method: Cook the beet greens until tender. Cook the beets until tender. Chop the greens very fine. Season with butter, pepper and salt. Press well into a buttered ring mould. Unmould on platter. Fill center with small, new beets, seasoned well. Trim outside edge with thin slices of hard-boiled eggs.

Good for Soup

Cut the rib-end off of a rib-ribs. This makes delicious soup. When the end is roasted with meat, it is practically wasted.

Peach Butter

Peaches—Peck or 1/2 peck of loes. Scoop out centers. Cut corn helpful while baking a berry pe.

Sugar—Little less than peach bulk. Method: Stone, skin and mash peaches. Add little less sugar than peach bulk. Cook very slowly 3 or 4 hours until done. This is easy to tell as they become darker and more settled looking in the pan. This peach butter is excellent for short cake or as a sauce for ice cream. Children love it on their bread and butter.

Grape Jam

4 cups of sugar. 2 pounds of grapes. 2 little water. Method: Make a syrup. Cover sugar with just enough water to moisten it. Cook until syrup threads. Then add grapes (seeded) and boil until transparent.

BAKING HINTS

Tomato Cups

Tomatoes. Corn (uncooked). Butter. Bread crumbs. Bacon if desired. Method: Slice off ends of tomatoes. Scoop out centers. Cut corn helpful while baking a berry pe.

off cob. Cook for a few minutes

with little tomato pulp. Fill centers with corn moistened with tomato. Top with bread crumbs and butter. Bake in hot oven until crumbs are brown and tomatoes are cooked. Serve on rounds of buttered toast. Pour over any pan tomato juice. Garnish with crisp bacon if desired.

Easy Oven Meal

1 cup left-over meat (chopped). 1 cup of tomatoes. 1 cup of boiled rice. Seasoning. Method: Mix well. Pour in buttered baking dish. Sprinkle top with crumbs. Top with cheese if desired. Bake in moderate oven.

To Insure Flaky Pie Crust

Add small tablespoon vinegar to cold water when mixing pie crust. Then there is no fear of soggy pie crust.

To Prevent Juice From Running Out of Pie

Stretch a strip of wet cloth about one inch wide tightly around the rim of a pie. This is especially helpful while baking a berry pe.
