

The matter of the new robing room in the division court room, as ordered by the judge at the last session, was gone into, but was left over until it could be ascertained if the surrounding townships could not be required to pay at least part of the cost. The judge also ordered that a proper witness box be erected.

The only dissension of the evening occurred when Reeve Calder presented a bill from the A. W. Conner Company of Toronto for \$25 for plans for the proposed new Town Hall. When this matter came before the council some time ago, Councillors Croft and Macdonald were appointed a committee to look after the securing of these plans and did so. The bill amounted to \$50, and as the Council in their resolution had stipulated that they cost not more than \$25. Reeve Calder, as chairman of the Finance Committee, refused to pay it. It was afterwards paid on motion of the Council.

In the meantime, a set of plans arrived in town from the A. W. Premier William Lyon MacKenzie King, and ex-Premier Arthur Connor Company, evidently ordered Meighen who are marshalling their forces for the election contest on by the Reeve, and this the Council tee, and if he ordered them, did so without the authority of the Council.
