Judging Competitions

Next week will witness the judging competitions at the Guelph and Royal Winter Fairs, the former on Monday while the latter will be held on Thursday. Unfortunately owing to the backward conditions of the work, Grey County has only two men instead of three on the team from Guelph.

The Effect of Grading

Canadian bacon on the British market is claiming greater attention. During the first eight months of 1925, Canada shipped 860,200 cwt. of bacon, while during the same period of 1924, only 748,515 cwt. were exported.

On the other hand, Canadian cream for butter manufacturers is not graded. The result is that while Canadian butter is selling in England at 190 to 216 shillings per cwt., Danish is selling at 228 to 230 and New Zealand butter is selling at 228 to 234 shillings.

A glance at these figures would indicate something wrong with Canadian butter. The whole truth is that the New Zealand and Danish governments have adopted a strict system of grading. Because of this, our butter is not in demand.

Wool Prices... In a recent letter sent out by the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers Limited, they have the following to say:

"We are confident you will be interested in a brief summary of the wool market. First, it is fairly certain that final settlement for wool cannot be made until such time as the market becomes more active and wool can be placed with the mills more readily. Since the early part of January, when peak prices were reached, there has been almost a steady decline in wool values. The market has been dull and inactive with prices in buyers' favor. We have therefore, only met the demand of our customers for their regular requirements of wool, and have not attempted to force sales at the sacrifice of prices."

"During the past three weeks, there has been a general improvement in the market. At the London sales, opening September 15 and closing October 11 all wools were well taken up and at hardening rates as compared with the July sales. In the United States, the turnover of wool is on the increase at slightly better prices. In Canada there will hardly be much interest manifested until after the elections."

NOT USELESS

The League of Nations does not represent perfection; but to say that it has accomplished nothing and is incapable of accomplishing anything of lasting value is to be reckless in the use of language. Its restraining influence seems likely to be effective in keeping Greece and Bulgaria from disturbing the peace of Europe. And then there is Locarno. Those who complain that the League lacks the power to physically force seem to forget the moral influence of public opinion. It may be doubted that any important question is ever finally settled by physical force. Fortunately there are moral forces which may succeed when the right of might has failed.

Hints for the Household

For November

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To Prevent Candles From Dripping... Either paint your candles with water colors or varnish them with plain shellac. This will prevent wax from running down the sides of the candles and will also make them pretty.

To Clean White Furniture... Dissolve 1 teaspoon soda in 1 pint warm water. Rub on furniture with a clean, soft cloth. Then dry with a clean, dry cloth.

Rebake Cold Baked Potatoes... Dip potatoes in hot water before placing in oven. Then put them in a warm oven. Rebake slowly.

COOKING HINTS

Peanut Brittle Fluff... 1/4 pound of peanut brittle. 1/2 pound of marshmallows. 1 bottle whipping cream. Method: Grind peanut brittle. Cut up marshmallows. Whip cream stiff. Mix peanut brittle and marshmallows with whipped cream. Either

chill or place in mold and pack in salt and ice.

Cucumber-Pineapple Salad... Either 1 package of jello or 1 envelope of gelatin. 2/3 cup of cold water. Salt. 1 cup of boiling water. 1 cup of canned pineapple cut in pieces. 1 cucumber (cut up.) 1/2 cup of sugar. 1/2 cup of chopped nuts. Juice of 1 lemon (if gelatin is used.) Method: Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Add boiling water, salt, sugar and lemon. When it starts to stiffen, add cucumber and pineapple. Put in mold or individual molds and chill. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise dressing.

ALL YEAR RELISH

(Quite Different and Good) Cut up fine—red and green peppers. A little onion—cut up fine. Mix altogether with lemon juice, a little sugar and desired seasoning. Serve with any kind of meats.

BAKING HINTS

Quick Cake... 1 cup of sugar. Little salt. 2 eggs or 2 egg whites. 3 teaspoons of baking powder. 1/4 cup of shortening. 1/2 cup of milk. 2 scant cups of flour. Flavouring. Method: Mix ingredients altogether and beat 2 minutes. Bake in a moderate oven.

Chinese Chews... 1 cup of sugar. 1 teaspoon of baking powder. 1 cup of chopped dates. 3/4 cup of pastry flour. 1/4 teaspoon of salt. 1 cup of walnut meats. 2 eggs. Method: Mix dry ingredients. Add nuts and dates and beaten eggs. Spread in a thin sheet. Bake. Do not let it get hard on edges. Cut in 1 1/2 inch squares. Cool. When cool enough, roll in balls and roll balls in granulated sugar. This makes 36 balls.

SHEPPARD-ING THE PRINCE

No one doubts the good intentions of "Dick" Sheppard, the very-much-to-the-fore vicar of St. Martin's-on-the-Fields, in handing out to the homecoming Prince of Wales a prim little parish-magazine lecture on the subject of "Royal Dignity." But I confess I can't see the Prince changing his personality at the bidding of his reverend mentor—or the public wanting him to do anything of the sort. Exactly the same kind of criticisms were levelled at his grandfather when Prince of Wales; and King Edward was admittedly one of the best and wisest monarchs this country ever had.

In some dusty drawer I have—or had—a copy of a rhymed attack on the then Prince of Wales, published in the 'seventies in the form of a Christmas annual, and entitled "The Coming King." In this lampoon, which naturally caused a tremendous stir, and I believe, was eventually suppressed, the future King Edward the Seventh was held up to satirical scorn as a mere frivolous, with no real interests in life except sport and the minor theatre. The mistake was a very big one, as the after years proved. There is no need to be guilty of a similar "howler" now.—London Mail.

SCOTT AND NORMALCY

All the world, if not all—the-world-and-his-wife, will be inclined to agree with Russell T. Scott, financier, failure and murderer, that he is not insane but may become so if he long remains in the asylum for the criminal insane at Chester, Ill.

It is to Scott's credit that he never acquiesced in the legal struggle which ended in saving his life by adjudging him insane. Scott is firmly of the opinion that he is being persecuted, punished unduly, for the peccadillo of assisting to put to death a fellow-being, an honest person who worked long hours in a drug store for modest pay. Scott thinks that he was a little wild and ought not to have been sentenced to more than a year's imprisonment.

This strong belief that his crime of murder was a minor offense, about on a par with reckless driving of automobiles, is the best evidence that Scott is not sane. But there are millions of sentimentalists outside asylum and prison walls whose sympathies invariably with the criminals and their families rather than with the victims of criminals and the sobby sympathizers may be the only normal persons. Those of us who hold that stern punishment of crime safeguards civilization perhaps should be sent to the madhouse when Scott and some others are released to be worshipped by the sentimentalists.—Buffalo Express.

OUR ROYAL TRAVELER

Probably one of the greatest diplomatic business and social assets which the British Empire has is the young Prince of Wales, who in his wanderings about the globe has built up a vast amount of goodwill. He is the greatest titled traveler of all time. Now, following on his recent Argentine visit, British trade interests are considering the possibility of forming an association to push the empire's South American trade. This would be a sort of "follow-up" of their envoy extraordinary. Trade follows the flag—and the Prince.

A big electrical company in the United States some time ago had all but obtained the signature on the belted line for a large electrical locomotive order—involving 28 locomotives for Japan. Soon thereafter it happened that the Prince of Wales visited the Island Empire. Subsequently the order for 24 of the locomotives was taken from the American concern and given to a British manufacturer, the American company getting an order for only four. These have recently been completed. Was this shifting of the order merely a coincidence?—Montreal Herald.

In Chicago recently, the sum of \$400 was raised for flowers and a tombstone for a dead dog. And there is a more or less prevalent belief that human life is rather cheap in Chicago. But, it was an unusual dog! It was a fireman's dog, and had a record of having saved at least four persons from being burned to death in nine years. Such a record was probably worth the flowers and tombstone. Certainly flowers and tombstones are often furnished for less valuable service.—Stratford Beacon-Herald.
