Hints for the Household

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Sunday Dinner Menu Halves of grapefruit. Roast turkey. Mashed potato. Giblet gravy. Baked squash. Creamed onions. Pickled peaches. Jelly. Pumpkin pie. Cheese. Coffee. A bowl of nuts, fruit and raisins.

Best Sunday Table Trim

The most appropriate centerpiece for Sunday table is a bowl of fruits or a bowl of nuts and raisins or a pumpkin. This, with turkey place cards, will make an attractive looking table.

COOKING HINTS

Coffee for 36 People 2 1/2 cups of ground coffee. 7 quarts of cold water. Mix coffee with a little egg and crushed egg shell and put in a bag.

Place bag in water. Boil very slowly.

Hint for Cooking Cranberries and Rhubarb

Add a pinch of soda when cooking cranberries and rhubarb. It does away with the extreme acid found in these fruits.

BAKING HINTS

Pumpkin Pie 1 1/2 cups of steamed and strained pumpkin. (Canned pumpkin can be used.) 2/3 cups of brown sugar. 1 teaspoon of cinnamon. 1/2 teaspoon of ginger. Little salt. 1 1/2 cups of milk. 1/2 cup of cream.

Method. Mix in order given. Pour in pie shell and bake. This makes 2 pies. The ingredients will keep several days if poured in mason jar and kept in the ice box.

To Brown a Pie

Brush top of pie with milk before

baking, and top crust will be a beautiful brown.

Baked Squash

Cut squash in attractive size pieces. Remove seeds. Bake same as baked potatoes. Serve this way and the individual may fix his own helping of squash at table the same as one fixes baked potato. Eat squash out of shell.

Ginger Cakes

1/2 cup of butter or lard. 1/2 cup of sugar. 1 egg. 1/2 cup of soup milk or butter milk. 1 teaspoon of soda. 1/2 cup of molasses. 2 cups of flour.

Method: Mix in order given. Bake in shallow tin. Sprinkle top with sugar. Cut in squares. If these are cooked in small muffin tins and nuts added, they are simply delicious.
