WESTERN ONTARIO NEWS IN BRIEF

Life in Western Portion of Canada's Banner Province Told in a Column.

United States Customs officials conferred Friday with railway officials at Windsor and arranged to co-operate in the prevention of liquor smuggling across the border.

The Woodstock war memorial committee received the complete financial report showing total receipts of \$10,057, of which \$9,500 was spent in the erection of the memorial and \$363 on incidentals. The balance will be devoted to installing a flood light.

A broken telephone cable dragging across a hydro power guy has been found to have caused the putting of 450 phones out of commission at Brantford.

Mrs. D. Deacon has been again elected as president of the Stratford branch of the Red Cross. There is a balance of \$316.65 in the bank.

Oxford County Council have voted \$10 to every Reeve on the Council for aid rendered to the Equalization Board.

A Kent County constable was notified late on Thursday night that a moorcyclist had been struck by a car near Louisvile. He investigated and found the machine in a ditch but no sign of the rider.

Frederick Betts, barrister of London, while adjusting his windshield, thrust his hand through the glass and severed the arteries and tendons in his wrist. His condition is rather critical.

Kenneth Wibis and Fred Yarrington, of Hamilton, while riding on a truck, were struck by a radial car and severely injured. Wibis has a fractured skull, and Yarrington was injured about the forehead.

Alonzo O. Snyder, of Fonthill, suffering from deafness, was fatally injured when he stepped in front of a truck driven by Lester A. Myulle. He died almost immediately after admission to the hospital.

The internal management committee of the Hamilton Education Board approved the proposal to teach secondary subjects to patients in the Mountain San.

George McFarlane, the second victim of the fire at Palmyra a few days ago, succumbed late on Wednesday night in Chatham Hospital.

Levi Snider, an inmate of the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital, left the institution while search for him was being made, his body was found hanging from a tree on the outskirts of the city.

The G.W.V.A. of St. Catharines on Wednesday night decided to protest to Ottawa against reduction in the D.S.C.R. grants. J. C. Young was elected president.

The smokestack of the Woodstock waterworks, the highest in the city, is being partially demolished as a menace to public safety. It was erected twenty years ago.

Despite a warning from Mayor McBride that the Council was going beyond its jurisdiction, the aldermen at a special meeting passed a by-law appointing W. H. Whittaker assessment commissioner of Brantford.

North Oxford United Farmers held their annual meeting on Saturday when reports were presented showing an increased membership and activity of women's clubs in community work.

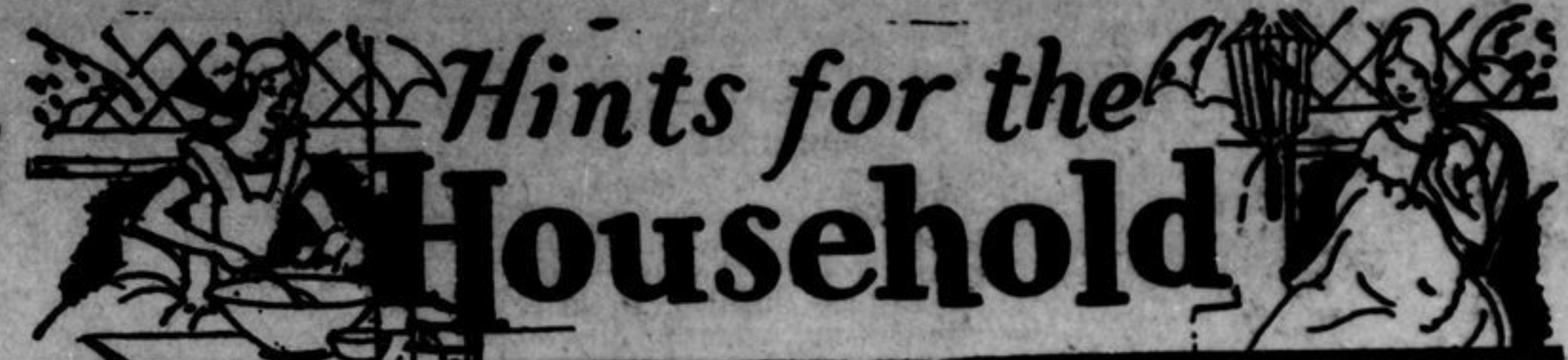

Christmas Gifts

With Christmas not many days away, I suppose most of you folks are busy listing what you're going to get for Uncle John, Aunt Kate, the youngsters and others who are near and dear to you. Save yourself some time in planning. Keep a good notebook handy and, as Gift suggestions come to mind, jot them down. Then—whether the Gift is home-made or bought—wrap it as soon as you have it ready at hand. Make your Gifts individual—something you know the recipient has personal desire for—something you know she or he will appreciate not only for its worth, but for the true Christmas spirit in which it is given.

Take care in selecting Children's Gifts. Far better to make them constructive rather than destructive gifts. And as well night unbreakable as possible—so that the children may find delight in them for a long time to come.

Christmas Decorations

Holly and mistletoe, pretty candles, gold and silver stars, poinsettias. Cranberries make a cheap, pretty trim. Holly wreaths hung outside of windows fresh much longer than when hung inside. Artificial trimmings are pretty and economical. When put away carefully, they will last a good many years. Such as small Christmas trees, cherries, poinsettias, holly.

Place Cards

One can always buy pretty place

cards, but very nice ones can be made with little trouble or expense. It is easy to make Santa Claus place cards, Stocking place cards and Star place cards. COOKING HINTS

Cranberry Hint

When cooking cranberries, add a thin slice of apple to each pint of cranberries. This will take the bitterness away without interfering with the tartness.

Grapefruit Cocktail

Line sherbert glasses with lettuce leaves. Skin and cut up grapefruit. Fill glasses with cut up grapefruit. Sprinkle grapefruit with sugar. Add 1 teaspoon of maraschino cherry juice to each cocktail. Top each glass with a cherry.

Cranberry Apple Sauce

1 cup of ground apples. 1 cup of sugar. 1 cup of chopped cranberries. Method: Mix well. Serve uncooked with meats.

Stuffed Dates

These are always a good addition to a Christmas candy box. Stuff them with nuts, prunes, orange marmalade or fondant.
