FORMER GLENELG MAN DIED AT INVERMAY

Archibald Campbell Was Formerly Well-known in This Vicinity, but Has Lived in Saskatchewan for Past Twenty Years.

There passed away on Saturday November 21, one of the pioneers of the district in the person of Mr. Archibald Campbell of Invermay Sask, who had been a resident of that place for over twenty years.

The deceased was born about three miles east of Durham on the Gravel Road in the year 1855 and received his education in Black's school house, S. S.
