WESTERN ONTARIO NEWS IN BRIEF

Life in Western Portion of Canada's Banner Province Told in a Column.

The Woodstock poultry show, now in full swing, is declared by experts to be fully equal to any held in Ontario.

A residence occupied by W. House of St. Catharines, was destroyed by fire Thursday with all contents. The Dominion Canning Company's plant was threatened.

Mrs. Frank Bennett, residing near St. Thomas, suffered broken legs when she was knocked down by an auto on the London-St. Thomas Highway.

The London Education Board decided to extend the medical inspection of children to all in grade one. Sneak thieves at St. Thomas on Wednesday carried off an overcoat and gloves belonging to two jurymen while court was sitting.

The Western Ontario Conservative Association has advanced the date of the annual meeting in London to January 5 owing to the House of Commons convening on Jan. 7. Hon. H. H. Stevens will speak, and premier Ferguson has been invited. A proposal to standardize school buildings and save from three to four per cent in architects' fees, has been favorably received by the Hamilton Education Board.

Two recounts will be held in Welland on December 15 in the Port Colborne municipal elections, one for Mayor and the other for Deputy Reeve. An alleged mistake in tabulating figures in the same polling booth is the reason of both recounts.

Addressing the members of the Waterloo Canadian Club last week, Hon. J. S. Martin emphasized the necessity of co-operation in agriculture and advocated more vocational training for the young men living on farms.

Struck by an engine and thrown 50 feet with his truck, Walter Black of Windsor is nevertheless expected to live.

Essex County Council will pass a by-law compelling all vehicles on county roads to carry lights.

The Mayor of London has called a special meeting of the City Council to discuss the threat of the Street Railway Company to suspend operation of their cars.

Frederick W. Parker, an employee of the London Post Office, has been sentenced to serve three years in Kingston Penitentiary for robbing the mails.

London's campaign for the Beck Memorial Endowment Fund was re-opened Monday. Already \$78,100 has been raised on an objective of \$75,000.

The Board of Governors of Hamilton's Public Library has selected Miss Lorine McDonald of Toronto as Librarian.

Hamilton Board of Control will confer with the special Street Railway Committee of the City Council with reference to a new agreement between the city and the Hamilton Street Railway Company.

The Medical Officer of Health for Waterloo suggests that all cows supplying milk to vendors in that section be tuberculin tested.

A Bench warrant was issued Monday by Windsor's Police Magistrate for James Kane, a crown witness on a charge of receiving stolen goods preferred against Eric and Garnet Hughill, brothers.

Mrs. Corinne Layton, arrested on Sunday night in a house in Ford, was ordered freed Monday by Magistrate Gunay of Windsor after friends had agreed to take care of her.

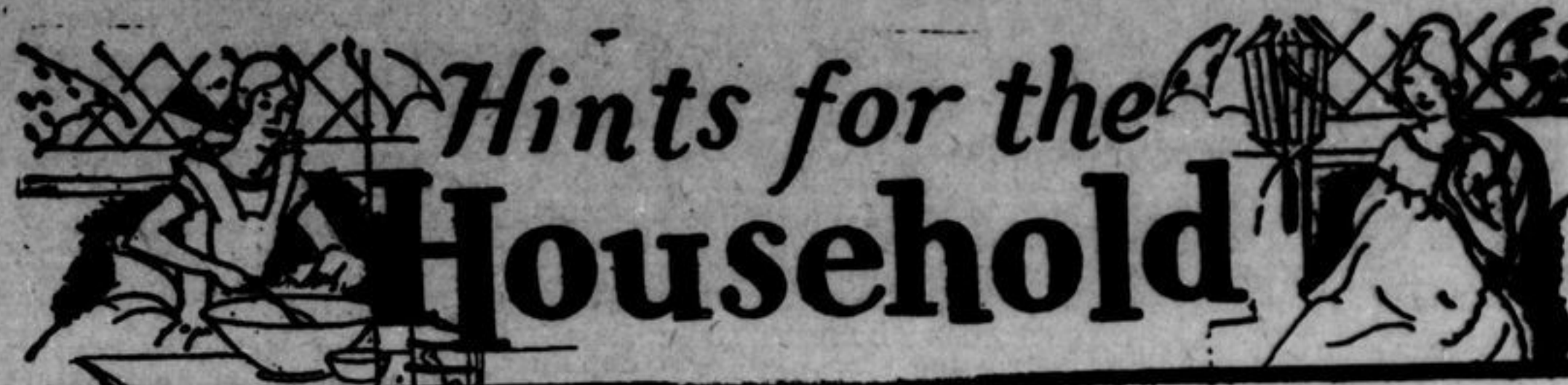

Hints for the Household

For December

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Half of the fun of arranging a happy Christmas for the folks is to set a very tempting and inviting festive table. Knowing what pleases their palates best, it is not very much of a task in perfecting an appealing menu. Allow me to suggest one which I'm sure they'll like. Here it is:

Christmas Dinner Menu

Fruit cups. Roast turkey with dressing. Cranberry sauce. Mashed potatoes. Peas or creamed onions. Perfection salad. Pickles, nuts and celery. Reeve, butter, jelly and coffee. Mince pie and cheese.

How to Prepare Turkey

Wash and clean turkey well. Fill both pockets with favorite dressing. Sew up with stout white string. Tie legs together. Season with salt and pepper. Place in roasting pan. Spread a little bacon grease over top. Put in hot oven without water until a nice brown. Then pour little water in pan. Cover—baste frequently. Be sure and cook turkey a long while.

Colored Pineapple

These are made like apple rings or blushing apples and are served hot or cold as a garnish for platter or salad.

Method: Make a syrup in a frying pan with ten cents' worth of

cinnamon drops, 1/4 cup of sugar and 1 cup of water. Cook slices of pineapple in this syrup until red.

COOKING HINTS

Fruit Cups

1 can of pineapple. 1 can of sweet cherries. 2 grapefruit (cut up). 6 oranges. 6 bananas.

Cover with sugar to taste. Let stand for 2 or 3 hours in ice-box.

Doughnuts

1 heaping cup of sugar. Nutmeg (a little). Butter, size of a walnut. 3 eggs, well beaten. 1 cup of milk. 3 teaspoons of baking powder. Salt. 1 teaspoon of vanilla. 5 cups of flour. If batter is too thin to handle nicely, add a little more flour.

Method: Mix in order given. Roll out. Fry in deep hot fat. When served, sprinkle with sugar.

BAKING HINTS

Candied Sweet Potatoes

6 sweet potatoes. Butter. Sugar. Hot water.

Method: Pare and parboil 6 sweet potatoes. Cut in halves lengthwise. Lay in baking dish. Spread liberally with butter. Sprinkle with

sugar (half granulated and half brown). Add a little hot water and bake until tender. Baste often.

Christmas Pies

1 cup of canned crushed pineapple. 1 cup of diced tart apples. 1/2 cup of seeded raisins. 1 tablespoon of lemon juice. 1 tablespoon of butter. 3/4 cup of sugar.

Method: Mix well. Cook until thick and clear. Pour into cooked pastry shells. Cover with meringue and brown.

Meringue

1 egg white. 2 tablespoons of sugar. Little salt. Vanilla.

Perfect White Cake

Frost—cut in cubes. Letter each cake with red letter. Arrange on platter so that they spell Christmas.

1/2 cup butter (very small). 1 cup of pulverized sugar. 1/2 cup of milk. 1 cup of pastry flour. Whites of 4 eggs.

Method: Cream the butter and sugar. Then add remaining ingredients in order given and mix well. Bake in 2 small square layer pans about 15 minutes.
