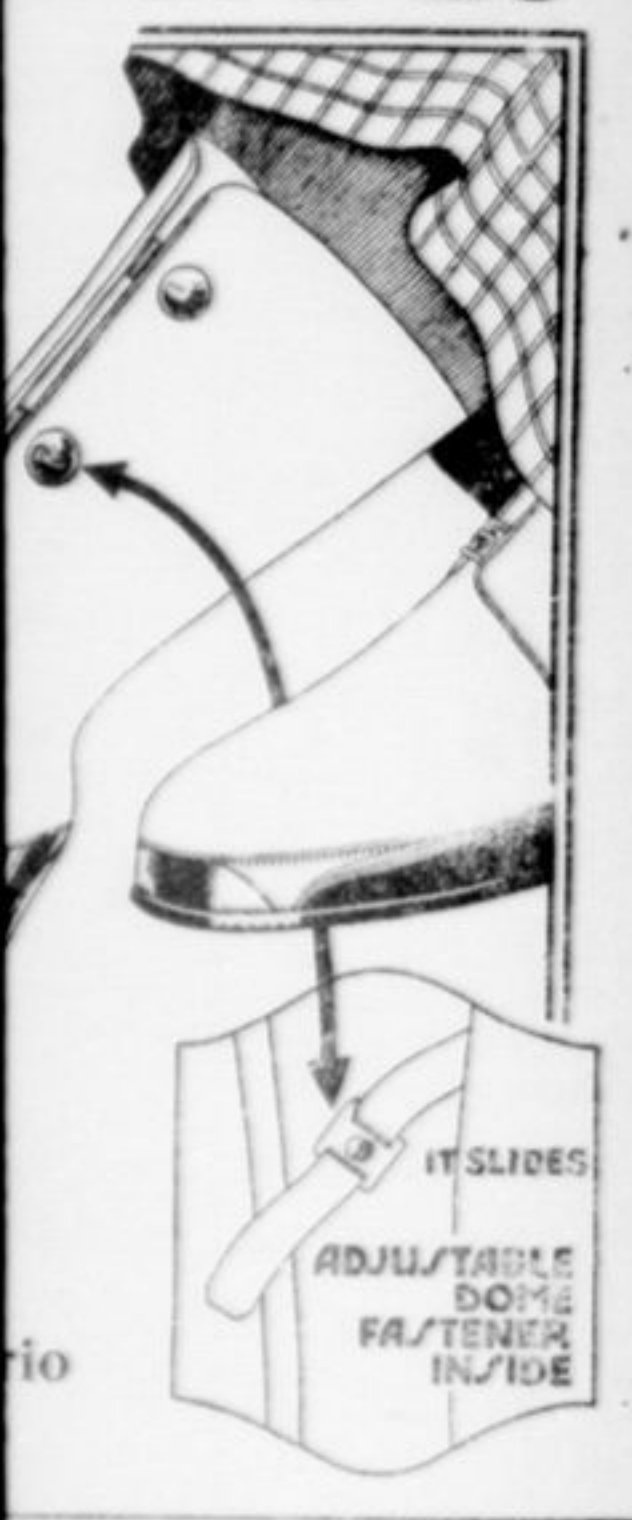

ONTARIO COMMITTEE GRAPPLES WITH BIG MARKETING PROBLEMS

Recommendation for Commodity Co-operative Plan Approved at Inter-Provincial Conference.—Activities of 1925 Reviewed by Chairman.

In many countries, the years 1924 and 1925 have seen agricultural industry releasing itself from the depression that came after the Great War.

It is the habit with all classes of our people when making comparisons of social and economic conditions to look no further than the United States.

The United States was one of the many countries that appointed agricultural committees to consider the rather alarming problems of agriculture in 1924.

The Ontario committee, of which I have the honor of being chairman, brought in a report almost as soon as the Legislature assembled, which reviewed the complex problems of their industry from the standpoint of the farmers themselves.

Interprovincial Meeting I am glad that at the end of another year to say that in the widespread discussions of which these recommendations have been the subject, no direct opposition as a rule, has been encountered.

Hon. John S. Martin (Minister of Agriculture, Ontario)—"So far as Ontario and the department of agriculture of this province are concerned, I may say that we are anxious to work in any way that is possible with other provinces and we will do all that we can do to such an end.

W. A. Amos—"I cannot help but perceive that this committee has been proceeding along the only possible line available to include the various provinces.

Hon. George B. Hoadley (Minister of Agriculture, Alberta)—"My experience over in the old country last year was that it is not a beef question. It is not a hog question. It is not a butter question. It is our place in that question. And I cannot help realizing the possibilities that are in Canada for marketing that are in production, largely in Great Britain.

So the movement gains momentum and more certain direction. Members of the committee have con-

sistently avoided even indirect approach to the political aspects of the marketing question because its political aspects are apt to be confused with party views.

At one of the recent sessions of the committee, I was particularly impressed by the emphasis with which Sir Joseph Flavelle dwelt upon fidelity to quality in supplying Great Britain with our products.

"It may be that our disregard of British market requirements is owing to our situation. We have a population south of us of over 100,000,000. It may look as if we are asked to make a great effort to establish ourselves in the British market when the United States is a nearer market.

Baldwin and Preference In the report of the Ontario committee a year ago, it was said that the market attitude of Great Britain then challenged immediate action by Canada.

Exporters of long experience are able to appraise the comparative value of a market occasionally or in spots very attractive, but unstable, in its relations with a nation consumer.

The utilization of this generous grant has been entrusted to the imperial economic committee, which has already taken evidence regarding the marketing of meat and fruit, both important products in the exports of Ontario.
