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GEORGE MELDRUM DEAD AT CEYLON

Found Dead in Chair by Sandy McFadden After Forcing Door—Neighborhood Greatly Shocked.

Ceylon was greatly shocked on Thursday about 1 p.m. when it was learned that Mr. George Meldrum who lived alone, was dead in his chair, found by Mr. Sandy McFadden who had been in the habit of going in every day to attend to his wants. Mr. McFadden had been in on Wednesday about eleven o'clock, leaving plenty of water and wood. Mr. Meldrum said he had everything he needed and would be all right.

He went over Thursday about 1 p.m. but could not get the storm door open, it being clasped on the inside. Thinking perhaps that Mr. Meldrum was ill and could not answer him, he forced the door open, and on entering, found him sitting dead in the big chair he was accustomed to sit in by the side of the stove.

Mr. McFadden immediately notified Constable Cook, who called Dr. Bibby, coroner of Flesherton, who came at once to the scene and pronounced death due from heart failure. Evidently he had not gone to bed Wednesday night, as his bed had not been slept in, nor the lamps had not been lit.

Mr. Meldrum was in his 67th year and was born in Artemesia. He lived on his farm at Eugenia (ill he sold it to the hydro people, and purchased a farm from Mr. W. Hill on the 4th about eleven years ago, selling it recently to Mr. George Fisher. He purchased the residence here to which he moved about the second week in December. His father passed away about 25 years ago, and his mother who lived with him on his farm on the "Stone Line," died eight years ago.

He leaves to mourn his loss four sisters, Mrs. Pedlar on the 4th, Mrs. McKee, Eugenia, Mrs. LeGard, Toronto, and Mrs. Ben Madill of Glenelg, Sask., and three brothers, Robert of Portlaw, and Jack and Sandy in Colorado. The funeral took place a week ago Monday to Salem cemetery. Rev. Mr. Harrower of Flesherton had the service. Much sympathy is extended the sorrowing relatives. Those from a distance attending the funeral were, Mr. and Mrs. Fred LeGard, Toronto, and Mr. H. Corbett of Proton.—Flesherton Advance.

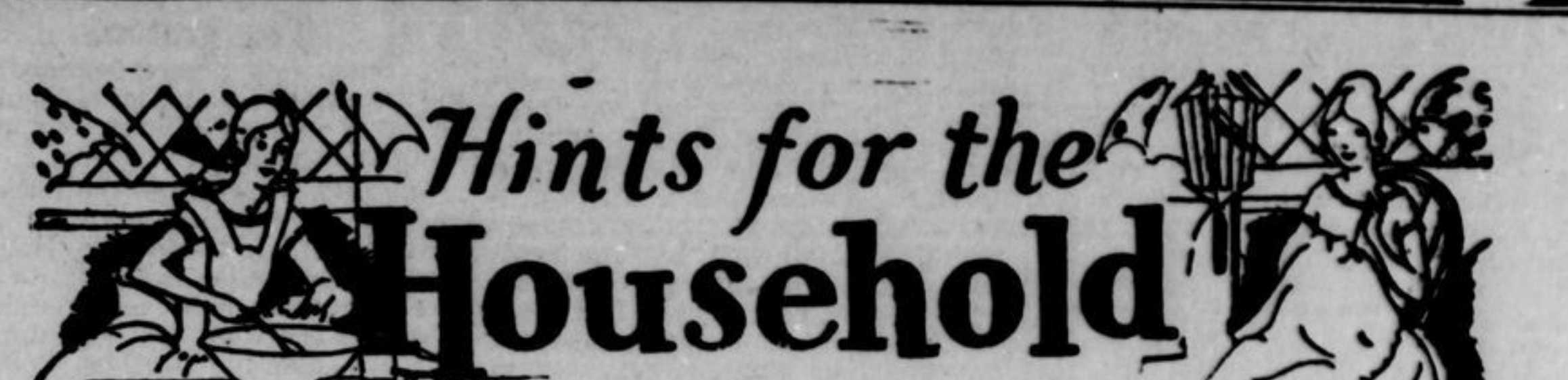

Hints for the Household

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To Keep Coffee Hot and Save Extra Work

In homes where there are late sleepers, it is a nuisance to keep old coffee or make new coffee after one's breakfast is finished. This can be avoided by pouring the left-over coffee into a Thermos bottle. Leave bottle on table, and the tardy member may help himself.

BAKING HINTS

To Cream Cake Easily

Add a tablespoon of boiling water to butter and sugar to be creamed. This lessens the work and makes the mixture very creamy and moist.

Chocolate Cream Icing

Melt unsweetened chocolate over boiling water. Make a white frosting by cooking together 1 1/2 cups of sugar and 1/2 cup of milk. Cook until it forms soft ball in cold water. Remove from fire and beat until creamy—add little vanilla. Spread immediately on cake. Coat this white frosting with melted chocolate.

COOKING HINTS

Valentine Chops

Buy French lamb chops. Buy white paper frills and small red cardboard hearts. Paste hearts to the paper

frills. Broil lamb chops. Place frills on end of each chop.

Then pile small peas in center of platter. Place same number of pieces of ham as chops on platter around buttered peas. Cut ham in heart shape. Place each chop on a heart. When served this makes a very pretty dish.

Washington Pie

1/4 cup of butter or butter substitute. 1 egg. 1/2 cup of sugar. 1/2 cup of water. 1 1/2 cups of flour. 2 1/2 teaspoons of baking powder.

Method: Beat sugar and egg together. Add melted shortening and water. Beat well. Fold in the sifted dry ingredients. Bake in a buttered tin in a moderate oven. When cool split and fill with cream filling.

Filling

1 cup of sugar. 4 1/2 tablespoons of corn starch. Little salt. 2 cups of milk. 2 eggs. Vanilla.

Method: Heat milk luke warm. Mix corn starch with a little water. Beat eggs slightly. Mix corn starch and egg together. Add this slowly to milk and stir constantly until it

thickens. Add sugar and flavoring. Mix well and spread between cake layers. Serve with whipped cream.

Ham Smothered in Sweet Potatoes

Large slice ham. 3 cups of sliced, cooked, sweet potatoes. 2 tablespoons brown sugar. 1 cup of hot water. 1 tablespoon of melted butter.

Method: Cut ham in pieces for serving. Cook slightly on each side. Cover ham with sweet potatoes. Heat sugar, water and butter together. Pour over ham and potatoes. Bake one hour.

Creamed Shrimps and Mushrooms

White sauce. Shrimps. Mushrooms.

Method: Clean and prepare shrimps. Clean and prepare mushrooms. Make a white sauce using as proportions 1 heaping tablespoon of butter, 1 heaping tablespoon of flour, 1 pint (2 cups) of milk. Seasoning. Melt butter, add flour and seasoning. Mix well.

Add the milk slowly and stir constantly until it thickens. Then add shrimps and mushrooms. By making this in a double boiler, this can be made ahead of time and kept warm in double boiler. Canned shrimps and mushrooms can be used. Serve in heart-shaped cases.

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P. C. THOMAS JONES FOR NORTHERN ONT.

Grey County Official Transferred to Kapuskasing District With Headquarters at Cobalt.—Successor is W. C. Oliver, Formerly of Wallaceburg.

Provincial Constable Tom Jones, who has been in charge of the work of the Provincial Police in Grey County for the past three years, received word on Saturday that he had been transferred to Northern Ontario and that his headquarters in future would be at Cobalt. This does not mean, however, that he will be stationed at Cobalt. In fact, it is expected that he will be located at Kapuskasing, a place that was pretty well known during the war, as it was the seat of a camp for German internees.

Constable Jones left Owen Sound on the early train Monday morning, and will go direct to Cobalt, where he will report for duty. During his three years' stay in Owen Sound, Provincial Constable Jones has proved himself to be an efficient and fearless officer, and has had a large number of serious cases to deal with in all parts of the country. His experience here and elsewhere will be of great value to him in the north country, which is not by any means new to him, and his friends in Owen Sound will wish him continued success. Mrs. Jones will remain in Owen Sound at least until the spring opens up.

Provincial Constable W. C. Oliver who has been stationed at Wallaceburg, will be the successor to Constable Jones here, and is expected to arrive in the city during the week. The following dispatch from Wallaceburg in this connection will be of interest:

"Provincial Officer W. C. Oliver has received word of his transfer to Owen Sound and will leave to assume his new duties the latter part of next week. Officer Oliver came to Wallaceburg in October, 1924, after spending several months at Port Lambton. He first entered the police force in 1920, when he was appointed chief of police at Point Edward, which post he held
