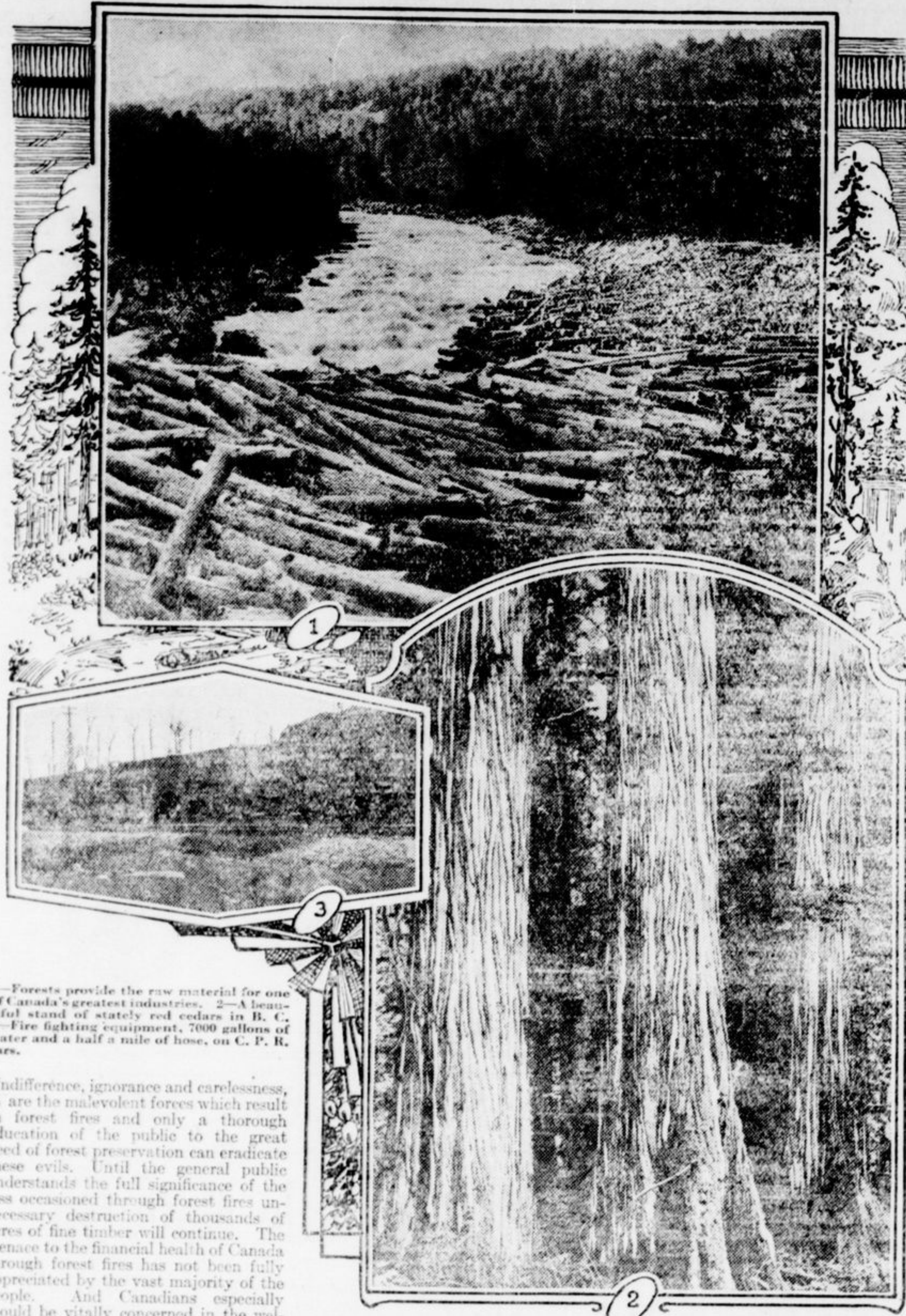


# Save The Forests! Everyone Loses If They Burn!

Indifference, ignorance and carelessness, are the malevolent forces which result in forest fires and only a thorough education of the public to the great need of forest preservation can eradicate these evils. Until the general public understands the full significance of the loss occasioned through forest fires unnecessary destruction of thousands of acres of fine timber will continue. The menace to the financial health of Canada through forest fires has not been fully appreciated by the vast majority of the people. And Canadians especially should be vitally concerned in the welfare of their forests.

The various phases of the lumber industry in Canada represent an invested capital of approximately five hundred million dollars. The associated industries give employment to thousands of men the year through. Further, out of every five dollars the lumber industry pays back to the country more than four dollars for the wood, the labor and the taxes involved in the enterprises.

In the province of Ontario alone, about 20,000 men are employed in the bush while 10,000 are employed in pulp and paper mills. The capital invested in these industries in Ontario is estimated at about \$175,000,000. The organizations employed by the Ontario provincial government for forest fire protection cost \$8,000 a day. Yet with all this forest fires consume twice the amount of lumber which is the life of these huge Canadian industries. In the province of Quebec the value of the lumber cut, including pulpwood, exceeds \$40,000,000 annually.

In co-operation with the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, the Montreal Publicity Association has given generous leadership in drawing public attention to the meaning of Forest Conservation Week, which is held annually in the United States and Canada from April 19 to 25. Scores of public bodies all over North America have joined in the effort to stimulate public interest in the forests and means for their preservation.

When a forest burns everybody loses. The destruction of a wooded area means just so much less of a natural heritage for the generations to come. During Forest week the object is to impress this important fact on the public.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has been doing all in its power to prevent fires by maintaining fire fighting apparatus of the most up-to-date pattern. In order to eliminate the possibility of fires being started by passing trains, locomotives on the Canadian Pacific Railway lines are examined at the end of each trip and great care is taken to see that ash pans and front ends are in perfect condition. Each spring the right of way is cleared with care of all scrap and inflammable material.

Notices dealing with fire prevention and protection, issued by the C.P.R., the Dominion and provincial governments and by various fire prevention organizations are posted in all stations and other buildings where they will be effective.

The mechanical equipment maintained by the Company for fire fighting consists of a number of tank car units and hose, kept ready for immediate operation at convenient points. Each unit consists of two tank cars each of 7,000 gallon capacity, equipped with powerful pumps and about one mile of hose.

The fire-fighting forces maintained by the Canadian Pacific Railway co-operate to the fullest extent with the provincial forces and the other fire-prevention organizations, and do everything possible to assist in the fighting of fires which are at all adjacent to their territories.

## RULES FOR TAKING CARE OF FISH PETS

Almost everybody likes pets. Pets are as varied as the tastes of people who choose them. Dogs, cats, birds, especially canaries, are a close competitor. Many people turn their eyes to the aquarium, however, and find much enjoyment in watching the graceful movements of its occupants.

Not only is the aquarium a source of amusement, but it is also beneficial, for the open tank absorbs the impure air of the room and moistens the dry heat in the winter months. By its artistic arrangement, the tank or globe may be made quite decorative.

The familiar gold fish is none other than the Golden Carp, a native of the ponds and sluggish streams of China. The fish in its native waters is not the lovely red gold in color that we know, for that comes with the intensive cultivation of those who breed them for market. There is the plain, familiar fish, the fan tail, the fringe tail, the telescope, comet and several other kinds that differ in ways not always noticeable to the novice.

A perfectly healthy fish has a plump, well shaped body, of good color, bright, clear eyes, healthy looking tail and fins, these gills and no scales missing. A sick fish is of poor color, has blood streaked or spotted fins, folder dorsal fins, and swims near the surface with nose protruding. Having no eyelids it is difficult to know when the fish are asleep, but if we watch we will see them perfectly still, the breathing apparatus and pectoral fins only moving slowly but regularly. The fancy breeds of the gold fish are much more expensive than the plain fish, but they are very attractive in appearance.

Over feeding and over crowding of fish brings on disease. Sometimes a sick and floating fish can be healed by placing it in weak salt water for a few minutes at a time and then in a bowl of water by itself for a few hours. If the fish has fungus, a deadly disease, it should be put on a soft cloth and gently wiped with a little absorbent cotton dipped in weak salt water to remove the patches, then be shipped into clean, fresh water.

Prepared fish food is the safest food for the fish. Made of rice flour, it softens in the water and the fish thrive on it. A tiny piece of beefsteak may be hung by a string in the tank occasionally for the fish to nibble on, but no bread or crackers or yeast prepared food should be given. The fish should be fed daily a piece of the fish food about three-fourths of an inch square per fish. In cold weather if the tank is placed in a cool room, even less food than that should be given to them.
