about the Council Board, it was evident that the town fathers were favorable to letting the contract to an oil-spraying company. It was shown that while the company charged 3 cents a gallon for spreading the oil, the machine used did the work better, and the oil saved would make the cost approximately the same.

To be exact it was figured out that the spraying company would do the job for about \$25 more than the council could handle it, but would do it so much better that the matter of the cost was not deserving of very long consideration.

Taxes to Be Collected. The Finance Committee passed accounts amounting to \$369.10, which were ordered paid. The treasurer's report showed that there was still an amount of \$2,144.50 in unpaid taxes, and quite a discussion took place as to what to do with the matter.

Some discussion was gone into regarding a sheep belonging to Murray Ritchie of Bentinck being killed. It ended by the bill being passed, and he will receive \$6, the amount of his bill.

HUNTERS REQUIRED TO GET LICENSES TO CARRY WEAPONS

Many Changes Made in Game Act Bill Sponsored by McGrae.

Hunters will be required to procure gun licenses before being allowed to carry weapons in Ontario forests this year, according to amendments made by the Ontario Legislature to the Ontario Game and Fisheries Act.

The amendment stipulates that every resident of Ontario not under 15 years of age must be licensed before he is allowed the use of firearms for hunting purposes. A fee of \$1.75 will be charged for the necessary license, together with a nominal charge of 25 cents for the issuing of same.

Non-residents shall not hunt, kill, wound or destroy any animal or bird, or carry or use a firearm except under the authority of a license, another amendment states. In all actions and prosecutions, the possession of any firearm or gun shall be prima facie evidence that the person in possession thereof was hunting such animals or birds.

Clean Out the Chimneys
