The Home Garden

REAL ART IN SEED SOWING

Sowing seed outdoors, evenly and thinly, is a real art acquired only after considerable practice. The knack, however, is gained by trying out a few packets. The trick is in holding the packet flat between the thumb and second finger, with the forefinger held above it in a position to tap the packet regularly and just sufficiently to cause the seed to feed out. When the packet is opened, the flap is creased to make a little trough down the center through which the seed, under the gentle tapping of the forefinger, will trickle slowly forth so that it is possible to sow it reasonably thinly. More seed is wasted by thick sowing than by any other manner, for when the plants come up in thick tufts from seed dropped in a mass, only a very few of them have a chance to grow.

Sow seed as a general rule with a covering equal to twice its thickness. The finer the seed, the less the covering of earth until the final



est and dustlike seed only be sprinkled upon the surface and pressed in. Vegetable seed, fortunately, is for the most part, of the coarse side and can be sown much more easily than flower seeds, many of which are powder fine.

The ground having been spaded and worked to a fine tilth, make the rows for the seed run north and south so far as practicable as a matter of securing an even division of sunlight. Make the rows with the point of the hoe or with a plant label for the smaller ones or some other convenient pointed instrument such as the bit blade of a jack-knife, and then scatter the seed. The depth of the row for the seed is determined by the size of the seed. Thin sowing will do away with considerable thinning after the seed is up.

Cover the seeds and tamp the earth firmly over them. This aids in germination by bringing seeds and moist earth into close contact at the start. If covered with powdery earth, it will be necessary to wait for a rain to pound the soil and make the contact.

All of the early garden seeds are now to go into the open ground, and transplanting of others will be the order of the day.

LAYING OUT THE GARDEN

Despite the fact that it is always advisable to draw a plan of a garden to scale before planting it, not one gardener in ten does it. He lays out his garden as he goes along with the spaded earth in front of him. With this rule-of-thumb garden planning, it is best to plant the earliest vegetables nearest to the back door, such as radishes, early onions, lettuce and spinach. Often the soil is soft, and this will



oblivate some of the necessary tramping in the mud at this season of the year.

Put in the peas next, as they will not be ready to harvest until the earliest crops are out of the way. Then come in with beets, carrots, early turnips and parsnips. This brings us to the later sowings of long-season crops, such as the string beans, limas and sweet corn. The earliest sowings of the peas and sweet corn go in as soon as the apples are in blossom. That is as good a guide as any. The ancient motto said when the oak leaves were the size of a squirrel's ear but usually there are lacking both oaks and tame squirrels to make the comparison.

Reserve space into which tomatoes, eggplants and peppers may be transplanted later and a patch for cucumber and squash vines if desired. As the radishes, spinach and early lettuce come out, there is a place to set in later tomatoes and other vegetables or for later plantings of sweet corn and beans. Tomato plants may be set among the peas to be flourishing when it is

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Housecleaning Suggestions Are you tired of your house? Does it look old and dingy to you? If so, you can easily change it. Organize your housecleaning. Plan each day's work, figuring only as much as you can finish in one day. In this way, your whole house will not be upset at one time. Cover up the scratches on wood-work with paint to match. Clean the wall-paper. Then to give the final touch of newness, change the arrangement of furniture wherever possible.

COOKING HINTS

Fresh Strawberry Frosting Mash fresh strawberries through a colander to a thick, smooth paste. Add enough confectioners' sugar to make frosting thick enough to spread.

Cheese Turnovers

(Dandy for Parties) Slice bread very thin. Cut off crusts. Spread with butter and then

cheese. Roll up and fasten together with tooth picks. Just before serving, toast carefully. Serve white hot.

Quick Apple Sauce

Wash apples. Cut up with skins on. Boil until tender. Remove from fire and stir apples through colander thus removing skins and seeds. Sweeten. The flavor and food value of apple sauce cooked in this manner is really superior to apple sauce made by peeling and coring apples.

BAKING HINTS

Date Kisses 2 egg whites beaten stiff. 1 cup of walnut meals (chopped). 1 cup of confectioners' sugar. 1 cup of chopped dates. Mix well. Drop from spoon and bake until light brown. Butter pans lightly, as kisses burn easily.

Banana Pudding

1/2 small loaf of bread. 1 1/2 tablespoons of butter. 4 bananas. 2 eggs.

2 1/2 cups of milk. 1/4 cup of sugar. Juice of 1 lemon.

Method: Butter a baking dish. Alternate layers of buttered bread and sliced bananas. Sprinkle bananas with lemon juice. Beat eggs



well. Add sugar and milk. Pour over bananas and bread. Bake slowly 1 hour. Tart jelly may be substituted for lemon juice. Serve cold.

Cheese Biscuits

2 cups of flour. Salt. 3/4 cup of milk. 4 teaspoons of baking powder. 1 tablespoon of fat. 1/2 cup of grated cheese. Method: Sift dry ingredients. Rub in fat. Add milk and grated cheese. Shape and place on buttered tin and bake in a hot oven.
