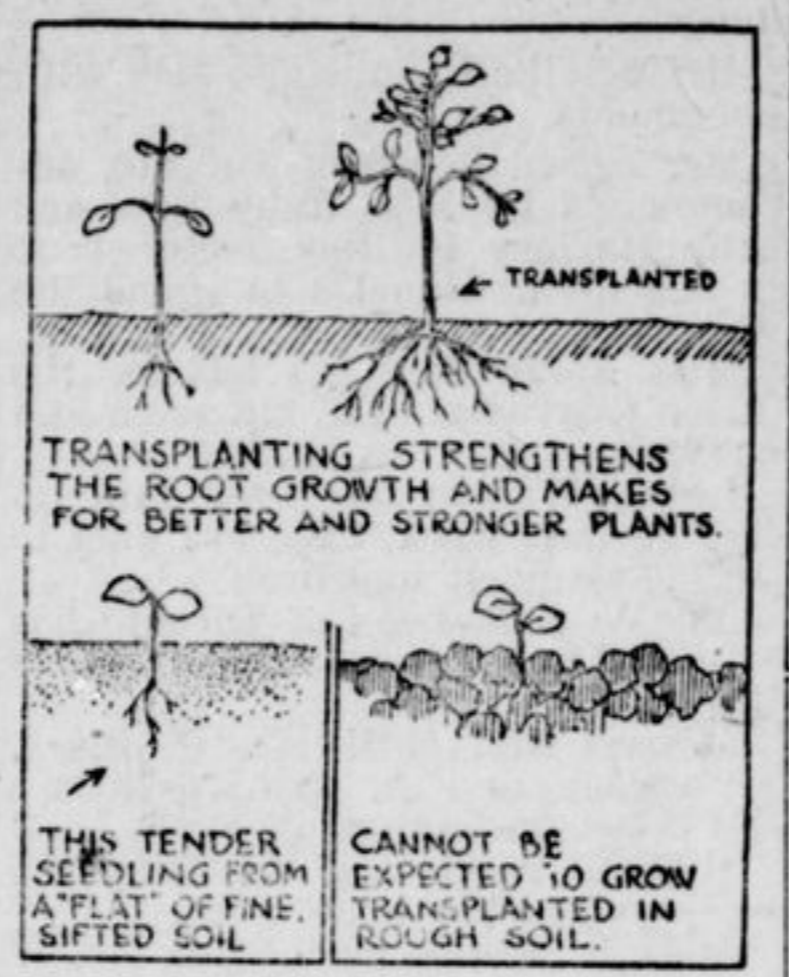

The Home Garden

IMPORTANCE OF TRANSPLANTING

Gardening has now reached a period when transplanting the seedlings which have been grown in hotbeds, cold frames and boxes in the house is the main task. The first of these to go out are the head lettuce seedlings which can stand considerable in the way of cool weather and like it.

In transplanting the lettuce, snip off the ends of the leaves for half their length. This will equalize for the disturbance of the roots in transplanting, and the plants will take hold much quicker. Set the lettuce plants eight inches apart in their beds and let the rows be at least a foot apart. A small bed which can be reached across by hand can

be set eight inches each way to economize space. The wider rows permit hoeing.

Following the lettuce, the seedling onions to give the big onions next fall are due to go in, and they, too, should be snipped off, this rule applying to all seedlings in the vegetable garden. Measure the proper distances between the plants as detailed on seed packets and stick to it even if the little plants look lonesome for the time being in their beds. They will fill their space in due time.

Dig a hole sufficient to let the root occupy its full depth and to spread out the side roots. Don't drop it in a wad. Set deeper in the garden than the plants set in the seed box, almost to the seed leaves. This will be particularly necessary with seedlings that have grown long and leggy. Firm the earth about them carefully after the soil is filled in and soak. Choose a cloudy day if possible, and if it is sunny and warm, it is advisable to shade the transplanted plants with paper, saw-berry boxes or flower pots for a day or so. A board set on flower pots is a convenient method for shading a whole row at once.

For the spring growing plants requiring a rich soil, a little sheep manure may be mixed with the soil at transplanting time so the roots will have food at once. Do not be too generous with the fertilizer, however.

NASTURTIUMS FOR BRILLIANT COLOR

The easiest way to produce a sheet of brilliant color with a minimum of effort in the flower garden is to plant nasturtiums, whether the dwarf or the climbing varieties. There is only one cultural warning to give for this old-time favorite, and that is, do not give it too rich soil. It is at its best on rather poor fare. In rich soil it runs too heavily to leaves. In poor soil, it is a most abundant bloomer.

For boxes of cut flowers in the house in both soft and brilliant colors, there is nothing more convenient in the garden. Ranging from sulphur and pure yellow into rose colors, it also has velvety oranges, scarlets and maroons that are almost black, with many variegated sorts. The nasturtium is an excellent plant to tuck into tulip plantings, delaying the sowing of the seed until the tulips are fading. The nasturtiums will then come up to cover the dying leaves of the tulips with a mantle of their gray-green foliage

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Uses For Turpentine

Turpentine is a marvelous cleanser. A few drops added to suds helps in cleaning and whitening clothes. A few drops in water with which one washes plants makes them especially green.

A few drops in trunks, bags or closets will keep out the moths. A few drops in water used to wash beds or infested wood will rid place of any bed bugs or any other objectional vermin.

Cut your worn table cloths in squares. Make small table covers and napkins. Hem or crochet edge. These will make excellent accessories for picnic baskets.



COOKING HINTS

Wonderful Charlotte Russe

1/2 envelope of gelatin. 1 1/4 cups of milk.

2 eggs. Little salt. 2 tablespoons sugar. 1/4 cup cold water. 1/2 pint whipping cream (2 cups) 3 tablespoons of powdered sugar. Vanilla. Lady fingers.

Method: Scald milk. Add gradually to yolks of eggs mixed with sugar and salt. Cook until mixture thickens. Then add gelatin soaked in cold water. Strain and add whites of eggs beaten stiff. Set in pan of ice water. Stir occasionally until mixture thickens. Then add cream beaten stiff and mixed with sugar and vanilla.

Fresh Strawberry Cream Wash and pick berries. Mash slightly. Sweeten and let stand a few minutes. Whip cream stiff. Stir in sweetened strawberries. Blend well and put in ice box to chill. Serve in sherbet glasses. This dessert is most simple, but good.

BAKING HINTS

Extra Good Hot Water Sponge Cake

6 eggs.

4 tablespoons of water. 1 heaping cup of sugar. 1 cup of flour. 1/4 teaspoon of vanilla. Juice of 1/2 lemon. 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla.

Method: Beat egg whites until stiff but not too dry. Boil sugar and water together until it threads. Pour very slowly into egg whites. Beat for 15 minutes. Add cream of tartar to flour which must be sifted three times. Then add beaten yolks and sifted flour. Add flavoring. Bake 45 minutes. Put in a hot oven for a few minutes only, then turn down heat. Increase heat a little just at the end. This makes an excellent dessert when served with whipped cream.

Fresh Strawberry Pie

2 boxes of strawberries. 1 1/4 cups of sugar. 4 1/2 tablespoons of flour. 2 beaten eggs.

Method: Mix the strawberries with sugar and flour. Add beaten eggs. Place in uncooked pie shells and bake slowly for one hour. It is well to put white muslin band around crust to keep pie from running over.

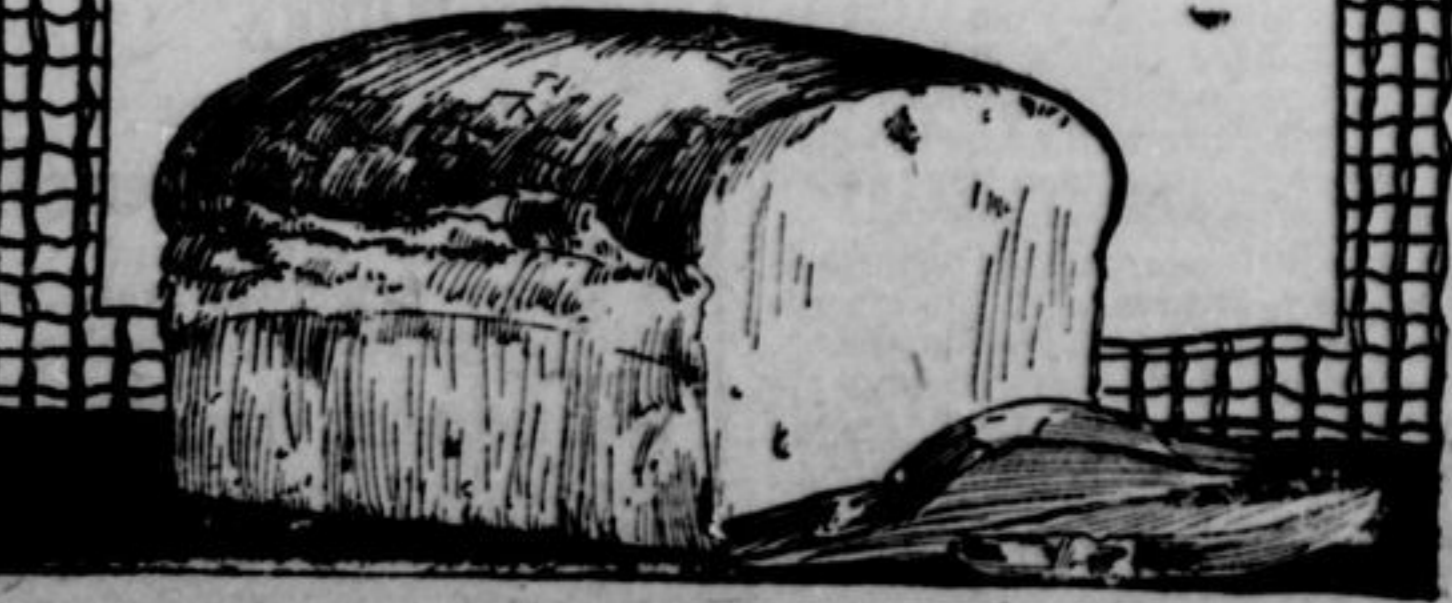
