The system of distribution of pre-natal literature recently arranged by the Child Hygiene Section of the Canadian Council on Child Welfare, and the Provincial Health Departments of the various provinces has proved extremely successful. Upon application to the Provincial Departments of Health or to the Canadian Council on Child Welfare at Ottawa, a series of pre-natal letters is forwarded regularly, free of charge. Applications have been received from scattered outposts, far in the interior of the provinces, scores of miles from the railways and miles from a post office. Other applications come from the large centres of population with well established health services, where doctors or nurses have advised their patients to avail themselves of the excellent information available in these letters.

The letters have been prepared by an especially well qualified committee of medical men, and were distributed only after consultation with the Provincial Departments of Health. They are designed to contribute to the superb effort the Canadian people are making to reduce their infant and maternal mortality rate, and to improve the whole average of infant health across the Dominion by carrying pre-natal advice and information to the expectant mother in the home.

A letter to the Provincial Department of Health of your own province or to the Canadian Council on Child Welfare, Plaza Building, Ottawa, will bring the letter service free.

H. R. KOCH'S DEATH A SHOCK TO TOWN

Well-known Secretary-Treasurer of Durham Furniture Company, and One of Town's Most Prominent Citizens, Passed Away Thursday Evening Last After Only Few Hours' Illness. Funeral Held Monday Afternoon From Knox United Church.

Never in our memory has the town received such a shock in the passing of one of its citizens as when the news was passed around last Thursday evening of the death of Mr. H. R. Koch, Secretary-Treasurer of the Durham Furniture Company. Taken ill only that morning, and most of the citizens being out of town over the holiday, there were few who knew that he was ill, and the news of his death was the first intimation that many of us had that anything was wrong.

The late Mr. Koch had been exceptionally busy during the past month in his capacity as secretary and treasurer, and only the evening before he was taken ill, had been in his office until about 10 o'clock Wednesday afternoon when he complained of a slight headache, thought nothing of it, and outside of this was apparently in his usual good health. Returning to his home about 11 o'clock, Mr. Koch remained downstairs for a short time reading and before retiring, and it was not until about 1 o'clock Thursday morning that Mrs. Koch, noticing that he was unable to get to sleep, asked him if anything was wrong. Receiving no answer, she investigated and was horrified to find that he was unable to speak to her and was unconscious. His physician, Dr. B. Jamieson, was at once summoned and pronounced him as suffering from a paralytic stroke and in a very serious condition.

His condition remained unchanged all through the day until about 6:30 (Continued on page 5)

REV. ARMSTRONG IN MOTOR ACCIDENT

Pastor of Durham Presbyterian Church and Family Have Narrow Escape When Car Swerves in Loose Gravel and Ran into Ditch.

Tuesday's Mail and Empire contained a dispatch from Brampton stating that while motoring on Norval, between Brampton and Georgetown, Rev. B. D. Armstrong and family of this town had been the principals in a serious motor accident which, while it might easily result in fatalities, was fortunately attended by only damage to the car. The dispatch says: "When his car side slipped into some loose gravel on the Provincial Highway at the west end of Norval Village Monday afternoon, Rev. Mr. Armstrong, Presbyterian minister of Durham, lost control of his car, and the car ran off the road into a deep ditch on the south side and turned turtle on its back. The rear end of the machine had to be smashed to get the occupants out. Mr. Armstrong was pinned under the wheel.

"Mr. Armstrong and his wife and two children were all cut, though the Minister was least hurt of all. The car was badly smashed, and the party had to remain over night in the hospital.

The members of the congregation here were naturally quite worked up over the accident, but were unable to get into communication with Mr. Armstrong, who, with his family, are on holidays. They are extremely grateful that the casualties were comparatively light, and that they can get into communication with the pastor, after consulting with him with the thought that they could have been too seriously injured, or they would not have been able to proceed on their way so quickly.
