



## H. R. KOCH'S DEATH A SHOCK TO TOWN

Well-known Secretary-Treasurer of Durham Furniture Company, and One of Town's Most Prominent Citizens, Passed Away Thursday Evening Last After Only Few Hours' Illness .- Funeral Held Monday Afternoon From Knox United

Never in our memory has the town received such a shock in the passing of one of its citizens as when the news was passed around last Thursday evening of the death of Mr. H. R. Koch, Secretary-Treasurer of the Durham Furniture Company. Taken ill only that morning and most of the citizens being out of town over the holiday, there were few who knew that he was ill, and the news of his death was the first intimation that many of us had that anything was wrong. The late Mr. Koch had been ex-

ceptionally busy during the past month in his capacity as secretarytreasurer, and only the evening before he was taken ill, had been in his office until about 10 o'clock Wednesday afternoon he complained of a slight headache but thought nothing of it, and outside of this was apparently in his usual good health, Returning to his home about 11 o'clock, Mr. Koch remained downstairs for a short time reading before retiring, and it was not until about 1 o'clock Thursday morning that Mrs. Koch, noticing that he was unable to get to sleep, asked him if anything was wrong. Receiving no answer, she investigated was unable to speak to her and was unconscious. His physician, Dr. D. B. Jamieson, was at once summoned and pronounced him as suffering from a paralytic stroke and in very serious condition.

His condition remained unchanged all through the day until about 6.3 (Continued on page 5)

Mr. Armstrong, Presbyterian minister of Durham, lost control of his car, and the car ran off the road into a deep ditch on the south side and turned turtle twice. The rear end of the machine had to be smashed to get the occupants out. Mr. Armstrons

was pinned under the wheel, "Mr. Armstrong and his wife and two children were all cut, though the Minister was least burt of all The car was badly smashed, and the party had to remain over night to have it repaired.
