Born in Conestoga The late Mr. Koch, who was 50 years of age, was born in Conestoga, near Kitchener, and was the son of Mrs. Elizabeth Koch and the late Mr. David Koch.

In 1903 he was married to Miss Clara Knechtel of Mannheim, and in September, 1904, came to Durham, where he taught the fourth book class in the Public school here.

Mr. Koch was one of the town's most active and loyal citizens, and there were few things in the life of the town in which he was not interested.

The late Mr. Koch had been in the employ of the Durham Furniture Company for over twenty years and has during that time been in charge of the office and bookkeeping and financial operations of the Company.

Funeral Held Monday The funeral on Monday afternoon from Knox United church to Durham cemetery was largely attended, a remarkable tribute being the large number of his old schoolmates and friends from Conestoga and Kitchener who were in attendance.
