



Of the varieties to be recommended, only two have really been tried at this station; viz., Champion and Duluth. These are both improvements over Progressive and Superb under our conditions. The two other much advertised varieties Mastoden and Rockhill, have not fruited here Rockhill in other places where it appeared to be the most promising
