The rainfalls of the last week have had the effect of delaying work on the new sewer now in course of construction at Thornbury by the F. F. Fry Company Limited, Toronto. But despite unfavorable weather conditions, good progress is being made with the work. The average excavating per day which the powerful digger is capable of doing depends largely on the quality of the soil it encounters at different places along the road. On Thursday afternoon, for instance, the machine ran into a "nest" of boulders a few yards east of the post office which rendered progress exceedingly slow for a time. Every time a larger boulder is encountered, it is necessary to cease digging until a rope is placed around the obstacle by one of the construction gang, and it i lifted from the bottom of the drain to the surface by three, and sometimes four or five of the men employed on the work. An interested crowd of spectators

is always present to watch the big excavator perform its work, as a machine of this kind in active operation is something new to most of the citizens. That the machine is destined to do away eventually with the pick and shovel method of excavating on large drainage or waterworks systems of a public or private nature is only one of the many gradually changing conditions of the times we see in evidence every day. And strange indeed would be our ideas of mechanical achievement it it were not so when it is taken into account that this ponderous machine, costing no less a sum than \$15,000 and weighing 40,000 pounds, is capable under favorable conditions of excavating one thousand feed of sewer or cellar drainage a day to a depth of from 6 to 10 or 11 feet. The overseer of the work at Thornbury informed the writer that in a contract for laying a water main at Bridgeburg, the machine, going to a depth of six feet, excavated one thousand feet of soil in four and a half hours. -Collingwood Bulletin.


