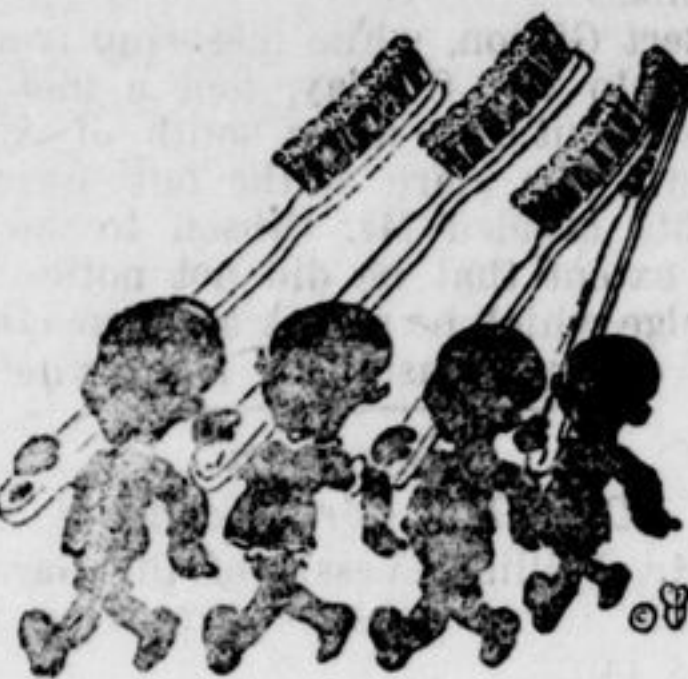

The children nowadays don't sing this song, for since the sudden rise to popularity of the once despised "slicker," boys and girls and grown-ups, as well, can enjoy the rainy days. I think the yellow oil skin is probably the most universally worn, although the coats do come in a variety of colors.

I guess there are not many schools in which the morning tooth-brush drill is omitted from the curriculum. Usually children dislike anything that they know is beneficial. But, the various jingles which have

I was genuinely surprised and horrified, though, when I learned how few people actually own tooth-brushes. I don't think the percentage of non-owners is so great here, perhaps, as it is in very large cities where there are many uneducated people. Indeed, I don't think it ought to be.

RECIPES

Lamb Shanks

Lamb shanks are inexpensive and delicious. When prepared properly, the meat is tender and tastes like chicken. Put the shanks in boiling salted water and allow to simmer for four hours. Then put potatoes, which have been peeled and halved, and string beans into the kettle with the meat and boil for one hour.

Peach Mangoes

Peel large freestone peaches; cut in halves and remove stones. Fill the cavities with maraschino cherries or with the following mixture:
1 cup of preserved ginger, sliced thin

1 teaspoonful of grated horseradish
1 mustard seed.
1 teaspoonful of celery seed
1/2 teaspoonful of black pepper seed

Tie the peach halves together and drop into a syrup made as follows:
1 quart of vinegar
3 pints of sugar
2 ounces of cloves
2 ounces of cinnamon bark

(Put spices in a muslin bag and drop into the vinegar and sugar mixture).
Cook the fruit very gently in the syrup until tender; then lift from the syrup and place in jars. Cook the syrup until slightly thick; pour it over the peaches and seal the jars.

CANADIAN COURTS
AMAZE N. Y. PAPER

Procedure Like That of Some New and Impossible Planet.—Trials Solenn Affairs.—Comment on Article by Justice Riddell, of Ontario.

Justice Riddell, of the Supreme Court of Ontario, is regarded by The New York Times "like a visitor from some new and impossible planet," in commenting on the Canadian jurist's description of the administration of Canadian law in a local newspaper.

Justice Riddell stated in his article that a criminal trial in Canada is "never a game at which the smartest man wins and the newspapers get lots of interesting copy."

"We are poor and busy people and have no time or money to waste on frills and sensation," the judge said. "We view a criminal prosecution as a solemn investigation by the state to determine whether the accused has been guilty of a crime against it."

"To a New Yorker Justice Riddell seems like a visitor from some new and impossible planet when he says: 'I have never known it to take half an hour to obtain a jury.' The Times editorial says: 'From some still more distant and impossible planet he seems to come when he tells us that he has never seen a murder trial that lasted more than a day and a half.'"

"The Canadian judge is not an automaton," the editorial continues. "He comments freely on the evidence, subject only to the restriction that he makes the jury understand that it is for them to judge the facts and for him to lay down the law. Appeals on small technical grounds or mistakes are dismissed. They are not granted unless the court is satisfied that 'substantial wrong or miscarriage of justice has occurred.' The prosecuting attorney, though appointed by the party in power, has no hand in politics. He tries to secure justice by collecting the credible evidence in the case and laying it before the jury fairly and without passion."

"He is not supposed to use his position for purposes of sensation or glory."
"No lawyer acquires a reputation by securing convictions or loses one by failing to do so. We look upon a criminal trial as a solemn inquiry by the state, and any crown counsel who should, in the heat of advocacy, endeavor to bring about a conviction by an appeal to the sentiment or prejudices of the jury, or by unfair comment on the evidence, would earn the reprobation of his fellows, if not a stern rebuke from the judge."

"In the United States, many criminal trials may be said to be treated substantially as matter for the motion pictures. Professor Pound has noted the long-drawn criminal trial with its atmosphere of melodrama, its 'clothes' of eminent counsel, and so on, as a survival of the 'frontier' which got its theater and its novels in the courtroom. A trial was a show, a game, a fight. According to Justice Riddell, Canadian opinion and habit rule otherwise."

"Why does the 'frontier' linger so long in cities and among a rich and busy people?"

CLINTON HOTEL LEASED
BY HANOVER HOTELMAN

The former proprietor, S. S. Cooper, intends to spend the winter in California and leaves for there shortly, accompanied by his family.

LORD BYNG AND THE RESULT

Several British newspapers in their comment on the Canadian election, have taken an erroneous view of the significance of the result in relation to Lord Byng. The London Daily Express, for example, declares that the vote is a sharp censure to the conduct of the Governor-General for his action in refusing a dissolution to Mr. King and afterward granting one to Mr. Meighen.

The Governor-General's course was unfortunate in a Dominion which has steadily moved forward in its self-government, but the intent and importance of his course have been greatly exaggerated. Few Canadians will credit this great soldier and citizen with any attempt to reduce Canada to the status of a "Crown colony."

Mr. King himself, the chief su-

ferer from the refusal of dissolution, repeatedly stated during the campaign that he did not blame the Governor-General, but, rather, Mr. Meighen. At Newmarket on September 7, Mr. King "denied that he had anything against Lord Byng. He believed his Excellency had been moved by chivalry. It was to be submitted, however, that Mr. Meighen had given no grounds for dissolution that he himself had not given, and, moreover, when he had spoken to the Governor-General, he had spoken as one who at the time had never been defeated in the House of Commons."

In the face of this argument, it is difficult to read into the result a "sharp censure" of Lord Byng.—Toronto Globe.
