ONTARIO DENTAL HEALTH DAY

The Ontario Dental Health Day to be held on Wednesday October 20th will include among its activities an undertaking never yet attempted in connection with the campaign of this kind.

This new feature is the free dental examination and advice to be given by the dentists to all who request it at this time. The importance of this service cannot be overestimated. There are many people who find great difficulty in appropriating and applying knowledge given in a general way, they get scant benefit from the public lecture or the printed page. They need individual advice and instruction. The personal free service to be given by the profession will prove of great benefit to all such people. The dentists are making this contribution at the request of the Ontario Department of Health.

Other activities being arranged by the Department are the showing of special dental health films in the theatres, the broadcasting of month health messages from the various radio stations, dental health plays and newspaper publicity. Addresses on mouth hygiene will be delivered before service clubs and other organizations and mass meetings of school children will be held.

The purpose of the undertaking is to inform the general public in regard to the danger of allowing dental infection to remain in the mouth and to give instruction in connection with the prevention of dental diseases. That many systematic diseases are caused by infection at root ends and pyorrhea pockets cannot be denied and it is just as true that many of these conditions can be prevented by sufficient care at the proper time. It has been well established that regular inspection and proper treatment, a balanced diet and sufficient mastication of the food will do much to prevent decay and pyorrhea. The application of this programme to the daily routine of life will be a lesson to be taught on the Ontario Dental Health Day.

Meandering with Marjorie

October days are becoming cooler and, although fresh fruits have solved the dessert problem during the warm weather the men, especially, want heavier things now and pies seem to answer that craving.

A good pie crust is the pride of every experienced cook, the envy of all poor ones and the desire of each



novice. However, there is no reason why, if you can follow directions, your pie crust should not be tender and flaky. At the end of this column you will find two recipes, for the first of which everything must be ice cold and for the second, everything warm and the water boiling. So you see, you have your choice as to method and either ought to make a perfect crust. If you try one or the other I am sure that you will be the object of much admiration from everybody in the community.

Unique Pencils

I saw the cleverest pencils the other day—so easy to make, too, and lovely for bridge parties. Smooth round pencils about four inches long are the bases. These are first dipped into gilt paint and allowed to dry. Then a tassel is fastened to the end of each with sealing wax. Over the red is then dropped black and then gold wax. Of course, you may select your own color scheme but I have found this one very effective with an orange tassel.

Do You Know That:

- 1. Lemon juice added to blueberries when the latter are used in pies, gives a flavor to the otherwise flat-tasting fruit? 2. The white of an egg rubbed over the unbaked crust before a watery filling (such as rhubarb) is added will keep the pie crust from becoming soggy? 3. Pie crust will keep for several days if it is placed in the ice-box?

RECIPES

Pie Crust No. 1 1 1/2 cups of flour sifted with 1/2 teaspoonful of salt 1/2 cup of lard 3 tablepoons of ice water.

Cut the lard into flour and salt until thoroughly mixed; pour water into centre of mixture and mix with fingers until a dry dough is formed. Roll half at a time. More water may be added if necessary but do not get a moist dough, for a moist dough means a tough pie crust. All ingredients should be thoroughly chilled.

Pie Crust No. 2 1 cup of flour sifted with 1/2 teaspoonful of baking powder and salt (about 1/2 teaspoonful) 1/2 cup of boiling water Mix thoroughly and place in a refrigerator until cold. Roll half at a time.

Pumpkin Pie Filling

1 can of pumpkin 1 cup of milk 1 egg 1/2 cup of sugar 1/2 teaspoonful of ginger 1/2 teaspoonful of cinnamon 1/2 teaspoonful of salt. Mix and fill unbaked crust; bake in moderate oven for about three-quarters of an hour.

FISH MEAL AS STOCK FOOD

Fish meal where available is a suitable concentrate for cattle and especially for hogs. If of good quality and properly fed with other meals and with roughages, it is fairly palatable, wholesome, and a good feed for the young growing stock, and also for milk production, having no injurious effects on the meat or milk. It is obtained by the utilization of surplus fish and of fish offal, of which enormous quantities go to waste in Canada every year, and as a cheap feed it should be more appreciated and developed. In discussing the subject in his latest report Dr. F. T. Shutt, the Dominion chemist, warns manufacturers of this product that the fish and fish wastes employed in its preparation must be fresh and sound, and the several operations in the process of its manufacture should be carefully and thoroughly carried out if a wholesome, palatable meal with good keeping qualities is to result. Unsound fish or waste will result in unwholesome and rancid products, apt to cause tainted meats, milk and eggs.
