If possible, the house should be lighted with grotesque pumpkin lanterns and a witch (either one made of a broom-stick dressed in a black skirt and cape and topped by a pointed hat, or a real person so dressed who can act as a guide) should be stationed at the door.

When a I have been seated the first person is beckoned in-purred from one ghost to the other and whisper each ghost's name to his guide, who writes them down. Each person does this in turn and a prize of a deck of fortune telling cards is awarded the winner.

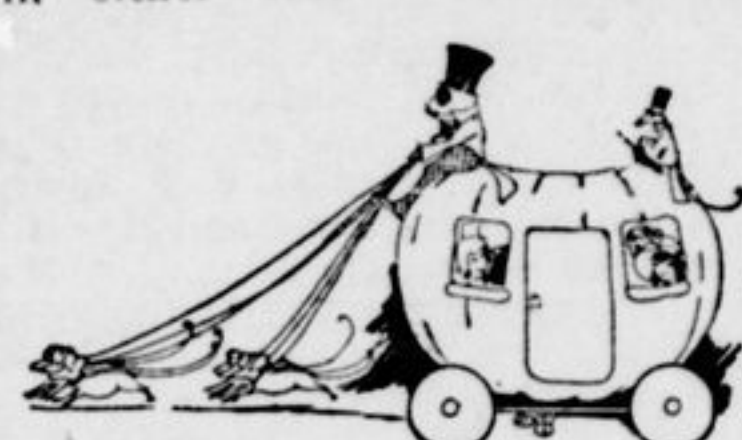
After the game each ghost is given the end of a string which has been stretched through the house and is told to follow without breaking it. These strings may be tangled and, after a strenuous hunt on with a stick of candy or a small box of peanuts.

The masks may be removed at this time if the hostess wishes, and apples hung on strings may be tried; for and the old game of hunting for ring, button, thimble and penny in a bowl of flour may be played.

Refreshments, as always at an affair of this kind, are very important and oftentimes difficult to manage. However, try serving several kinds of simple sandwiches—possibly ham, cheese and ripe olive—pumpkin pie, cider, tiny corn candies and nuts and your problem will be solved.

Novel Coach

A Cinderella coach makes a unique centerpiece and is not hard to make. The tablecloth and napkins should be of paper and the coach, a pumpkin hollowed out, with a door cut in either side to show the doll



seated within, mounted on cross bars of wood with four wheels, stands in the centre of the cloth. The horses are wee candy mice as is a huge green frog, who sits atop the coach.

Preparing for a Hallowe'en party is just as much fun as having one and I know you'll enjoy every bit of this one.

Sandwich bread,

OUR EXPORTS OF LIVE STOCK

British labour conditions have been far reaching in their effect. The coal strike in particular has resulted in a somewhat slack demand for our live stock and its products. Still, the sales for the year up to the end of August have been greater for all except hogs than for the corresponding period of 1925. The figures given by the monthly review of the Dominion Live Stock Branch are: cattle, 539,155 compared with 499,046; calves 228,727 compared with 204,829 and sheep 132,045 compared with 119,028. Hogs show a decline from 876,364 to 640,984. Prices have been well sustained and heifers, cows, stockers and feeders, calves and sheep show an improvement. Hogs are a couple of dollars up compared with 1924, but a little down as compared with last year's quotations. Exports to Britain this year compared with those of last year have been: cattle 59,423 compared with 63,445; beef 1,676,600 lbs compared with 5,258,000 lbs; bacon 59,450,700 lbs compared with 85,665,700 lbs; pork 3,541,400 lbs compared with 6,250,900 lbs. Exports to the United States show an increase this year compared with last of 37,955 cattle to 26,808; 49,773 calves to 49,284; of 8,282,300 lbs of beef to 5,171,900 lbs; and of 63,000 lbs of mutton to 43,800 lbs. In bacon and pork there has been a decline, particularly in the latter which fell away from 5,240,900 lbs. to 3,139,700 lbs.
