Do You Know That?

1. Silver into which tarnish has been cleaned by boiling for five minutes in an aluminum vessel in which salt has been placed? 2. Painted furniture ought to be washed with soap and water once a week to keep it fresh and new looking?

RECIPES Pie Fillings

Apple Peel and cut into small pieces about three tart apples; mix them with about a teaspoonful of flour one-half to one cup of sugar, and a little salt. Fill pie crust, sprinkle with cinnamon; dot with butter; add a little water. Cover with top crust and bake in medium oven for about half an hour.

Butterscotch

1 cup of brown sugar 3 tablespoon flour 1 cup of milk 1 egg yolk 1 tablespoon of vanilla Cook in double boiler until thick; turn into crust already baked; cover with stiffly beaten white of one egg sweetened with one tablespoonful of sugar. Place in oven and brown lightly.

Blueberry

Fill unbaked crust with washed berries; sprinkle with flour and about half a cup of sugar, squeeze the juice of half a lemon over all. Cover with top crust and bake for about half an hour in moderate oven. By omitting the lemon juice

Corn Fritters

1 cup of flour, sifted with 1 heaping teaspoonful of salt, 3/4 cup of milk 1 tablespoonful of melted shortening 2 cups of corn. Mix ingredients and fry as pancakes. If you wish to fry in deep fat, use 1/2 cup of milk and one cup of corn. This recipe will make twelve fritters.

STORING HONEY

There is a right and a wrong place for everything and the ice-box is the wrong place to store honey. Honey, like other highly concentrated sugar solutions, will keep well for a long time with the proper care, as it does not readily ferment, mould or spoil. It will, however, absorb moisture and if exposed to a moist atmosphere may become diluted to the point where fermentation occurs. It should therefore be kept in a dry, warm, airy place. Temperature, however, is not so important in the storing of extract honey. Where large quantities are stored it is frequently necessary, owing to the enormous weight, to use the cellar, which though it may be cool, must not be damp. The containers of extracted honey ought always to be tightly closed to exclude moisture and incidentally ants should they gain access to the storeroom. Well ripened honey will keep for years if stored where it will not attract moisture.

Where comb-honey is kept in quantity there should be a free circulation of air. With this in view the storeroom is frequently located on the sunny side of the house or it is placed in the attic near the roof. Windows must be opened only in dry weather, for ventilation is of no value unless the air contains less moisture than that already present. Variation in temperature is to be avoided, as it causes condensation of moisture in the cappings of the cells which, in turn, is absorbed by the honey.

To determine whether the place is suitable for the storage of honey test it with salt—where salt will remain dry it may be stored safely. If kept at a low temperature, honey will granulate more readily. As many persons do not care for granulated honey, it may be liquefied by placing the pail containing it into hot water, the temperature of which is approximately 150 degrees F.

Where moisture has caused honey to ferment slightly, it may be restored by melting it over hot water when the ferments will escape with the foam.

NO DEADER THAN THE O.A.L.A.

The Ontario Amateur Lacrosse Association, which finds itself today without a single representative team east of Toronto, with but one or two north of that city, outside of those taking part in the senior series, and with but a handful in Western Ontario, where there used to be teams in nearly every hamlet, has pulled off another "home" in its latest dealings with the intermediate team from the little village of Bradford, in Simcoe County. There are just as good men, just as good players, just as good officials outside the bounds of that collection of huts build around Toronto City Hall—even though half a million of its inhabitants may think otherwise. In the old days of the Canadian Lacrosse Association we played the game in Bradford, and against some of the boys of the team which has just been expelled. We fought the villagers tooth and nail and butted, but after all we had to admit that in little old Bradford our national game was always first in the estimation of everybody, and it was played fair and square and no quarter asked nor none given. For two years we sat on the O.A.L.A. Executive, but for what purpose we never had any means of finding out. We knew no more about what was being done for the game than the man at Hershell Island. Some self styled Toronto "lacrosse boosters" shadowed the meetings of the executive and had their say, regardless of whether they were wanted or not. They had a finger in every pie. They were the little Johnnie Wiseburgers who thought all the boys from the small towns were a bunch of ricks. That is the outfit—the Toronto Rasputins—who have quered the game in so far as the country towns of Ontario are concerned. They may know their "onions" in the big burg, but they lack the small town point of view—they must be told that lacrosse is fighting for its life in this country, and that a great many little trifling things must be overlooked to help it back—they must be educated to the fact that any organization that fields a lacrosse team of ten or twelve players in a small town is a hard-working, courageous body of men, and should be helped in every way possible. Bradford is "down and out" in so far as the game of all games is concerned, but it is not any deader right now than the O.A.L.A. which is doomed unless, it is completely reorganized from stem to judgdon and barnacles scraped from its old weather beaten hull.
