RECIPES

Escalloped Potatoes
6 medium sized Potatoes sliced 2 tablespoonsful of flour 1 tablespoon of salt Pepper Butter Milk
Put a layer of sliced potatoes in casserole. Sprinkle with flour, salt and pepper and dot with butter. Repeat until all ingredients are used and pour on milk to fill dish. Cover with bread crumbs and bake one hour.

Blueberry Muffins

4 egg 1/2 cup sweet milk 1/2 rounding tablespoonful of sugar 1/2 teaspoonful salt 1 scant cupful of flour 1-3 cup of blueberries
Beat egg; add milk and then dry ingredients sifted together. Save a tablespoonful of the flour to flour the blueberries and add fruit to mixture. Bake 15 or 20 minutes in hot oven. Dates, figs or chopped nuts may be used instead of blueberries.

Dumplings

1 cup of flour sifted with 1 teaspoonful of baking powder and 1/2 teaspoonful of salt. Stir in 2-3 cup of sweet milk.
Have liquid boiling and drop dough by tablespoon which is dipped in boiling liquid. Cover securely and cook ten minutes. Then remove cover and at the same time take from fire. This process insures light, fluffy dumplings.
For apple dumplings pare: 4 tart cooking apples. Bring to boil and add 1 cup sugar. When at boiling point again drop in dumplings. Follow this recipe for blueberries, black berries, cherries—adding or scattering sugar as needed.

ARCHBISHOP FAVORS FERGUSON POLICY

Most Rev. David Williams Declares Government Control Is the Only Sane System for Ontario

Government control is the only sane system of dealing with the liquor traffic in Ontario, in the opinion of Most Rev. David Williams Archbishop of Huron, who finds nothing to retract in what he said publicly, more than two years ago, regarding objectionable features regarding objectionable features associated with the Ontario Temperance Act.

At the Synod of Huron, some months before the 1924 referendum was taken, his lordship's charge dealt fully with the O. T. A., its benefits and defects, and declared that if that legislation were allowed to go unamended the last state of the province might well be worse than the first.

In view of the proposed legislation now submitted by the Ferguson Government, The Free Press sought a statement of Dr. Williams' present attitude upon the question and was informed that nothing has occurred in the interval of two and a half years to cause change in his viewpoint.

Conditions Growing Worse
"I see no reason," he said, "to retract anything that I said about the O. T. A. in my charge to the Synod of Huron in 1924. In spite of the enormous sum of about \$400,000 a year spent since on the enforcement, conditions have grown steadily worse than they were then. The millennial blessings promised by the advocates of the O. T. A. have not been realized; but, on the contrary, our jails are more crowded, crime is on the increase, especially among the young, and there are more deaths directly traceable to alcoholism than in the days before the O. T. A."

Only Sane System
"Government control, with individual permits is the only sane system. Even with government control, it will take many years for the people of this province to recover from the demoralizing effects of the O. T. A."

Upon the subject of the O. T. A., in his charge to the synod in 1924 Bishop Williams said in part: "On the one hand the saloon and the bar have been abolished—abolished, I hope never to return. That is unquestionably a great gain materially, morally and socially. Whatever gains have been made in the social life of the people, directly or indirectly must be retained. On the other hand, we know by this time that the wonderful results promised by its advocates have not materialized. The act has created irritation and resentment. Sumptuary laws are always dangerous. There are thousands of people who, though they may seldom drink themselves, yet do not believe that it is wrong in itself to take a drink if the need arises. If the Legislature passes an act declaring such a thing to be illegal that does not change the right and the wrong of a thing."
"Then, there is the medicinal use of liquor. Why raise the price so that none but the wealthy can afford to buy? The falacy of trying to stop the traffic by raising the price has been the most futile and demoralizing feature of it because it has been the chief incentive to bootlegging. So long as the price of liquor remains at the present high level there will always be found numbers of people who will risk their liberty for the sake of the easy money that can be made. The Government loses by it financially and the country, I am told, is flooded with poisonous concoctions. Surely the most effective way of stopping the traffic is to take away the incentive and so make the traffic unprofitable."

"We must aim so to frame our laws and regulations on these things, which, in themselves are neither right nor wrong, that they will receive the moral backing, not only of extremists, but of the large mass of moderate but often silent members of the community, who do not consider the question one of right and wrong, but simply one of personal expediency. If we fail to do this, I fear that the result will be not only disrepute of this particular law, but of other laws, a general lowering of our character as a law-abiding people."
