JAMIESON SHOULD WIN

If service to his constituency and business ability counts for anything, then the election of Dr. Jamieson should make him an easy winner at the polling next Wednesday.

At the nomination at Markdale on Saturday, in Durham last night, and during the campaign at various places throughout the riding he has appeared and on every occasion has given a most carefully thought out address on the administration of the affairs of the province by the Ferguson Government.

Has he ever in his private life given any evidence that he is a man of such outstanding ability that he is capable of representing a business and farming community like South Grey in the Legislature? These are about the only questions that a voter need worry himself about.

So far as the Ontario Temperance Act is concerned, there is little need for worry, and absolutely no necessity for the agitation that has crept into the campaign, an agitation that has been carefully planned by those opposed to the Ferguson Government.
