Children, especially those of kindergarten and primary school ages—love to make ornaments for the Christmas Tree and even house decorations. No matter how simple, anything made by their own hands is more attractive to the little tots than the most lavish "bought" things.

Of many things the easiest to make and the prettiest are the chains made of links of colored paper. Strips of the paper three-quarters of an inch wide and three inches long are used for the links. All children like to use paste, which is essential in the manufacture of the gay colored bits, and will enjoy watching the chain grow.



These chains may be used effectively on the tree or may be festooned about the house. Cornucopias, too, are fascinating things for the little hands to develop. The triangular sheet of colored paper is easily formed into a cone when filled with candies and suspended by a bit of cord or ribbon from a branch of the tree will prove a never ending source of delight to the maker.

Frozen Chicken Salad 1/2 package of unflavored gelatin 1/4 cupful of cold water 1/4 cupful of hot boiled salad dressing 1 cupful of chicken meat, diced or minced 1/2 cupful of chopped celery 1/2 green pepper, chopped 1 pimiento, chopped 1/2 teaspoonful of salt 2 teaspoonful of vinegar.

Soak gelatin in cold water for five minutes; add to hot boiled dressing. Cool and add other ingredients in order named. Turn into six individual molds, first dipped in cold water, and chill. Remove from molds to nests of lettuce leaves and garnish with celery tops and strips of pimientos. Any cold meat, crabmeat, lobster, tuna fish or shrimps may be substituted for the chicken in this salad and 2 tablespoonful of stuffed olives, either sliced thin or chopped may take the place of the green pepper and pimiento. If served either with or without salad dressing and accompanied by a-boiled potato, garnished with chopped parsley, a slice each of tomato and hard-boiled egg covered with a spoonful of salad dressing to which enough catsup has been added to color and a hot roll, this salad makes a delicious and surprisingly inexpensive luncheon. By the way, it is not necessary to chill the mixture for more than an hour. Of course the longer it stands the more closely it seems to be like its name but all hostesses have to hurry at times and it is rather nice to know the minimum length of time necessary to complete any dish.

Waldorf Salad 6 apples 1/2 cupful of chopped walnuts 1 cupful of chopped celery 1 cupful of salad dressing Peel, core and dice apples; add nuts and celery; mix with salad dressing; serve on lettuce leaves. This will serve six to eight people.

Cranberry Jelly Cook one quart of cranberries and one cup of water in a covered pan for five or six minutes. Remove from fire and press through a fine sieve. Stir in two cupfuls of sugar and turn into a mold to harden.

Dear Mr. Editor: A spirit of warm friendliness towards the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto exists all over the province and it increases with the years. Your readers, in common with the people in all other progressive communities are interested in the Hospital and what it is doing. The keen interest in crippled children manifested by the Rotary, Kiwanis, Y.W.O., Lions and other service clubs, throughout the province, has been of grand assistance in bringing in unfortunate children, often from remote districts to the various centres, where the members of the Hospital staff have attended and have been able to hold huge clinics with the result that there has been a steady stream of children admitted to the Hospital from all over Ontario, for a long time.

This is but one branch of the thorough service rendered by the Hospital. It is the best equipped institution of its kind on the continent for the treatment of all child ailments. No Ontario child requiring its services is refused admission and all that medical and surgical skill combined with loving care can accomplish is bestowed upon the sufferer, without distinction as to religion or nationality, or because those responsible for the child are in poor circumstances.

Heavy expense is involved in this merciful work, Mr. Editor, as you can realize. Ordinary sources of revenue, including grants, fail to cover the actual cost of maintenance of the little patients, notwithstanding thrifty management. Old friends and new ones are relied upon to help in paying the difference and they include the members of your valuable paper. The Hospital for Sick Children does not share in the funds of the Toronto Federation for Community Service, because it takes patients from all over the province. USES OF SOYBEANS

(Experimental Farms Note)

In Canada the soybean is used chiefly as a forage crop, for seed, or for pasturing to hogs and sheep. Sometimes the crop is used also for soil purposes and as a green manure, but its high value makes its use for the latter purpose impracticable. Soybean hay compares favorably with alfalfa hay in feeding value. It is high in digestible protein and therefore can be used to replace costly foods to some extent. Being an annual legume, the soybean is an excellent crop to substitute in the event of clover or alfalfa failure. They may be fed to all classes of live stock.

The use of soybeans alone for silage is not recommended. The common practice is to use a combination of soybeans and corn, one part of soybeans to three parts of corn. The two crops may be grown together or grown separately and mixed when the silo is being filled. Growing soybeans for seed is carried on to some extent in Canada, chiefly in Western Ontario. The seed is much higher in oil and protein than other legume crops such as peas and beans, and has therefore a higher feeding value. Too high a percentage of the beans in the hog-fattening ration will produce a soft fat which is discriminated against on the market. In

the United States the oil is extracted from the soybean seed on a commercial scale and the resulting cake is used as a concentrated feed, similar to oil cake for live stock. Soybeans make excellent pasture for all classes of live stock, especially sheep and hogs. The pasture is valuable when used alone, but it is best when used as a supplement to corn.
