Meandering with Marjorie

Vegetables and salads—although outshone by the turkey at the Christmas dinner—are necessary adjuncts and can do much towards the success of the meal. Potatoes probably "pop" to mind first—and mashed potatoes and candied sweet potatoes are the order of the day. Most of us consider mashed potatoes so easy to prepare that we pay little attention to them. However is there anything worse than watery ones? I have never been able to eat this delectable dish with the proper relish because at one time during a very impressionable time of my life I was served some so gray



Mashed Potatoes

Peel potatoes and boil slowly in salt water (barely to cover) until soft; remove from fire and pour off water. Mash with wooden or metal potato masher. When potatoes are reduced to a pulp, add warm milk or cream slowly so as not to have the finished dish too soft and a tablespoon of butter. Beat with a spoon (preferably perforated) until creamy pepper and salt to taste; remove to dish; garnish with bits of parsley and butter; sprinkle lightly with paprika, if desired and serve. As for the candied sweet potatoes there are several methods by which good results may be procured. However I like this recipe best because the sweet syrup seems to penetrate the potatoes more thoroughly in boiling than it can if it is poured over them and all the cooking is done in the oven:

Candied Sweet Potatoes

Peel rather small sweet potatoes and cook until tender in a syrup composed of one cup of sugar and one cup of water. Remove from fire and add one tablespoon of butter. Then, place in a baking dish and brown in the oven. Celery, crisp and cold, is another indispensable part of the repast. Some persons like to stuff the stalks with pimientos, or Roquefort cheese but on this day I think the cheese adds too much to the general heaviness of the meal and is best omitted.

Beet Recipe

If you desire another vegetable, why not serve beets? Cook the beets slowly for two or two and a half hours until a fork will pierce them easily. Remove from water, skin and cool. Slice and place in a dish season to taste with salt and pepper and cover with vinegar. If you like hot beets better than soured ones, slice while warm, season with salt and pepper and pour melted butter over the vegetable. A nice salad to serve is either the cabbage salad, the recipe for which I gave you some time ago or a Waldorf salad. Either of these is cool and refreshing and may be served with the fowl or as a separate course, as you prefer.

Cranberry Sauce

I suppose that we must include the cranberries with the vegetables although it is a matter for the hostess to decide as to whether these will be in the form of a sauce or a jelly. The recipe for the jelly appeared last week and I'll tell you now, how to prepare the sauce—
